## Ozona Man Attends Farm Loan Assn Meet

Of the board of directors of the Sonora National Farm Loan Association attended the Federal Land Bank of Houston's annual stockholders meeting in Houston on Feb. 11-12 as the association representative.

Mr. Robison stated that the Land Bank, which is owned entirely by the 144 national farm loan associations in Texas, is celebrating its 30th anniversary this spring.

The Sonora Association which serves Crockett, Schleicher and Sutton counties now has \$99,870 in farmer and rancher-owned capital and surplus of \$57,753.10. B. E. Moore and Jno. I. King of this county are members of the board representing Schleicher County.

## Taylor Construction Completes Sewer Job

Taylor Construction Co., who have been working on the sewer extensions for the city of Eldorado, have completed that part of the project and are leaving for another location. They expect to return in April when pipe will probably be available for the water lines which they will lay.

Six inch lines from Glendale to the Mexican community and a large line also from Texaco Station to Keeney addition are among the main sections which will be built. Taylor Construction, under contract for this work, are having to leave Eldorado and return later for this work, because of scarcity of material.

## Reynolds Attends Area School Meeting

Supt. C. A. Reynolds attended a meeting of area school administrators in San Angelo last Friday evening at which more than 50 educators representing 30 West Texas counties, were present. The program opened with a banquet and entertainment furnished by members of the San Angelo High School Chorus and band.

Speakers on the program included J. R. Stalcup, superintendent of the Brownwood City Schools, and president of the Mid-Texas Educational Association, who outlined the purposes of the general District 2 meeting of teachers and administrators to be held in that city Feb. 28: Frank Jackson, superintendent of the Tom Green County schools and president of the Texas State Educational Association, who discussed matters relating to teachers and school administration now pending in the legislature; and Rodney Kidd, an executive of the University of Texas Interscholastic League, who spoke on work of his organization with county and city schools.

A. E. Wells of Sonora, chairman of the group, presided at the meeting.

## Conservationists In This Week's News

Joe Kreklow of the Reynolds Community one and a half miles northwest of Moore's Gin applied for District assistance in planning a coordinated conservation program on his farm Tuesday, February 4.

L. Moore cooperating with Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, 20 miles northwest of Eldorado in Reynolds or Moore Gin community, is constructing approximately 6 miles of broad base level terraces, in his north field. Taylor Bros. contractors are constructing the terraces and farm road. Moore says this field has been seeded to small grain for three years and sheet erosion is evident. This year's crop will be grain sorghum in rows and tilled on contour.

## Crippled Children Entitled To Aid

In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, harelip and cleft palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, muscular dystrophy, supernumerary fingers and toes, wry neck, elephantiasis, spina bifida, brachial palsy, Pott's disease, congenital anomalies, spondylolisthesis, amputation, webbed fingers, epiphysitis, and sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the crippled children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit.

Full information about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, 'Handbook on Agencies.' Surface casing for Cooper-Koy 1C, 1300 ft. north of Koy 1, is being cemented in this week, in preparation for Western Drilling's rig to take over. Delay in oil activities in the field has been occasioned by moving away of Parker Drilling Co equipment to a location at Cisco, and moving in of equipment by Western Drilling Co., who are now under contract with Cooper.

Today, Thursday, the surface hole for Cooper-Koy 2c, Geo. Morgan trustee, has been started by Campbells, on a location just north of Cooper-Koy No. 2. Both of these are on Sec. 28, recently acquired from Shell, in two deals.

The rotary which Western Drilling Co., moved in recently has encountered trouble on Cooper-Page 2, but drilling has now been resumed. Another rotary will be brought in in a few weeks.

## REFUNDING OF CO. BONDS SAVES \$4,000

Effecting a saving of \$4,000.00 to Schleicher County, the commissioners are completing a refunding program, which was started in 1943 to take care of old courthouse bonds. Of the \$60,000 in bonds, dated July 10, 1923, only \$11,000 remain. Under the refunding program interest will be 3%. Signatures on required legal papers were C. L. Meador, J. E. Spencer, L. C. ## SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

D. C. Davis of the Cliff community, a cooperater with the Eldorado Soil Conservation district, has 75 acres of oats planted in 36 inch rows on the contour. It is furnishing grazing for 231 ewes. The small grain looks like it will stay ahead of the ewes even if it fails to rain soon.

W. A. Schuller, cooperater with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, eight miles west of Eldorado, plowed to his newly constructed terraces last week. Schuller has 2.4 miles level terraces constructed on 105 acres of his farm land in 1946. The terraces were constructed to 18 inches unsettled height with a 24 ft. base width. Schuller is plowing to the terraces to improve the base width and prepare them for planting this year.

Soil Conservation Service technicians ran level terrace lines last week for Oddest and W. W. Sudduth in the 98 acre field on Mrs. Charles Spencer's place, 11 miles southwest of Eldorado. Sudduth marked the lines with his plow to avoid losing them. He is listing on the contour prior to planting.

effective and aggressive floor general. The lone Sophomore candidate Buddy Baker, has made excellent progress his first year and opportunity will give good account of himself next season.

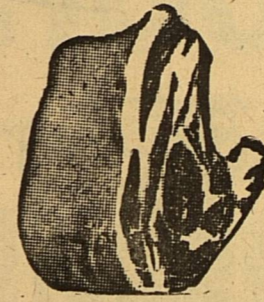
Other veteran team members with another year of seasoning behind them will have better opportunity to distinguish themselves in the bitter inter-conference rivalry of 21-B next season.

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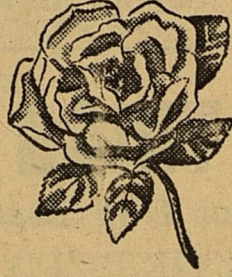

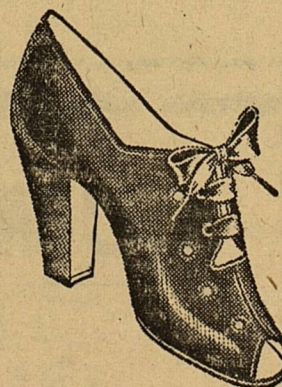

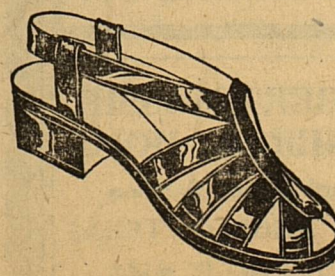

### Teacher Shortage Is Caused By Low Pay

Education in the United States is a big business. Out of a total population of more than 130,000,000 people, some 30,000,000 are children of school age; 930,000 teachers are employed, many other thousands are janitors, bus drivers, clerks and general maintenance employees. What about Texas? Out of our 6,500,000 people, 1,500,000 are children of school age between 6 and 18. 46,000 teachers, 4,500 bus drivers, 6,000 janitors, and a large number of clerical employees, cafeteria workers, etc., are employed.

Public attention is focused today on the public schools in the United States to a degree never before witnessed in the history of our country. The exodus of teachers from the classrooms of our public schools has been going on at such a rapid pace as to cause general alarm throughout the nation. It should create alarm, for all superintendents throughout the nation will tell you that the situation is grave.

Since 1941, 350,000 teachers in the United States have left the classrooms. They do not intend to return under present standards. This mass exodus of teachers from the schools has created the most dangerous shortage of teachers in the history of our country. Some of the vacancies have been filled by new graduates, and many more by old teachers coaxed out of retirement. The gap, however, shows no signs of improvement.

In Texas the situation is in many instances even worse. One out of six teachers in the state are rated as sub-standard in qualifications; 10,000 teachers are in their present job for the first time; 1500 emergency certificates will be granted this year in order to get "someone" in the classrooms. 2,400 classrooms have enrollments of 40 pupils or more. Since 1941, forty per cent of the teachers in Texas have quit; more than 7,000 members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas during the school year 1945-46 signed under oath a statement that they were quitting the teaching profession and withdrew their deposits from the retirement fund; 1,300 classrooms were vacant in September when school opened because they couldn't get a teacher to take the job. Out of the tens of thousands of students in Texas colleges and universities, fewer than 10 per cent are preparing to be teachers.

These conditions are not common to country schools only. Cities are hit just as hard. Their populations have grown rapidly and beyond the school facilities available. Many cities operate a part of their schools on a double shift basis; many classrooms are so overcrowded that several students will be found having to stand during the class period, teaching aids are scarce for the requirements in many instances.

Low pay is the chief reason for such conditions as now exist in the Texas public schools. In Texas, there are approximately 43,500 classroom teachers. Their average salary last year according to pay records in the State Department of Education was only \$1493 a year. The "take home" pay for a single teacher, after withholding taxes and five per cent deposits to the Teacher Retirement System, was only \$111.35 a month or \$25.70 a week, or \$3.67 per day. This will not even buy food; pay rent; and buy decent clothes; much less take care of many other necessities of life. The beginning pay in practically any field of employment today is far greater.

What is Texas going to do about the situation? Are the people willing to pay teachers more? It takes money to do the job. Money means taxes. We just as well face the issue in the very beginning. If the salaries of Texas should be increased an average of say \$750 each, the cost would be \$34,500,000. This is exactly what will be asked of the Legislature of Texas now in session.

The Texas State Teachers Association will request the Legislature to provide for a beginning minimum salary of \$2,000 for a teacher with a Bachelor's degree; \$2,200 for a teacher with a Masters degree, and \$2,400 if the teacher has 6 years of college work. For the first 12 years of experience, an annual increase of \$54 per year will be requested. Local school districts under the Association's plan can supplement salaries if they desire to do so.

### Washington News Letter

Budget-slashing, legislation to help fight foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico and hearings on labor bills now claim major attention on the Congressional front.

When Congress was "stream-lined" last year, it was provided for the first time that at the beginning of each Congress a joint committee of the House and Senate would get together and establish a sort of ceiling over expenditures. That was done last week when the President's budget was slashed from 37½ billion dollars to 31½ billion. This action must now be approved by the House and Senate.

The economy drive is a good thing. The war has been over nearly two years, and half a million put on during wartime can be taken off of the federal payroll without affecting the efficiency of the Government. Moreover, there are yet a number of wartime bureaus that we can get along without.

But it seems dangerous to cut much from the Army-Navy budget. During these unsettled times, it is important that we maintain a strong America. Unreasonable cuts would weaken our position at the peace tables. We cannot afford to take that chance.

Both the House and Senate committees on Agriculture have reported bills to authorize appropriations of funds to fight the foot and mouth disease now prevalent in the interior of Mexico. The measures would allow our experts in the Bureau of Animal Industry to operate in Mexico, cooperate with Mexican officials, and join in a program that can be devised. The big job will be to get full cooperation on the other side of the river where the menace of the disease is not so fully recognized as it is in this country. However, reports are encouraging, and our experts think they can get the job done with enough money and time.

A number of Texans have been in Washington pushing the foot-and-mouth legislation and attending to other business. From the King Ranch came ex-congressman Dick Kleberg, and from Uvalde came Dolph Briscoe and his son, Dolph, Jr., accompanied by their wives. The Briscoes attended committee hearings and conferences in the State and Agriculture departments.

The hearings on labor legislation are continuing and will not be concluded before the middle of March. Hundreds have requested permission to be heard by our committee. Already we have heard scores of stories of extortion and virtual robbery by strikers led by radical union leaders. This is especially true right now in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, and New York where the Teamsters Union has been operating in a most ruthless manner, demanding that their terms be met or the victim's businesses would be closed. The Union leaders, when they go into action, import hundreds of professional pickets who are tough and vicious. They then terrorize the business man, and often even the community. Stockades are set up if an attempt is made to resume business; employees are set upon and beaten, trucks are wrecked and sometimes burned, and right now in the Pittsburgh area scores of fire and explosive bombs are being used by the strikers and their imported gangsters. Until you listen to these stories of violence and terror, it is not easy to fully comprehend how ruthless and mad-with-power some of these union bosses are. They must be dealt with by effective labor legislation which we hope to secure during this session of Congress.
