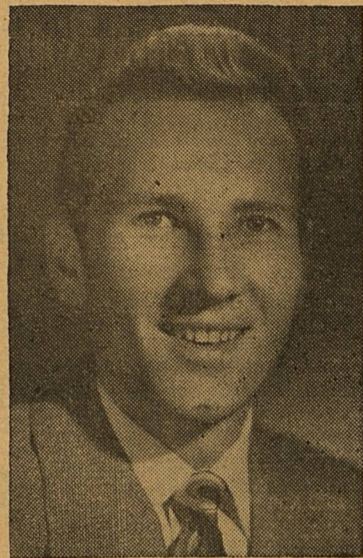
## 8-Day Youth Meeting at First Church To Close Sunday Nite

## WORK STARTS ON RENOVATING OF COURT HOUSE

Funds voted this winter by Schleicher County voters will be used to renovate the court house.

The voters provided a fund of \$15,000 for repair and improvement of the court house, when they passed that proposition by a small majority and voted down the propositions for swimming pool and memorial building maintenance tax, in a bond election in January.

The exterior court house improvements will include a sand blasting job on the native stone removing the old cream paint and exposing the original white surface. This work is under way, but was stopped temporarily because of the rain. When completely cleaned, the stone will match well with the new Austin stone finish on the memorial building.

The remaining funds will be used on the interior, for re-finishing of walls, and making of all repairs which the bond issue funds will finance.

## 4-H Boys Are Hosts For Wool, Mohair Day of Instruction

Christian, owner of the mill, will show them the machinery, explain its operation, and discuss processing of the wool. The group will adjourn at 4:00.

Counties which have indicated that their 4-H boys would be present include Coke, Coleman, McCulloch, Menard, Nolan, Sterling Taylor, Tom Green and Sutton. Eight or ten county agents will be present.

W. G. Godwin, Schleicher county agent, urges all members of the Eldorado and Christoval veterans vocational classes to be present if they are free to do so. Several have already indicated that they plan to attend, and all are welcome.

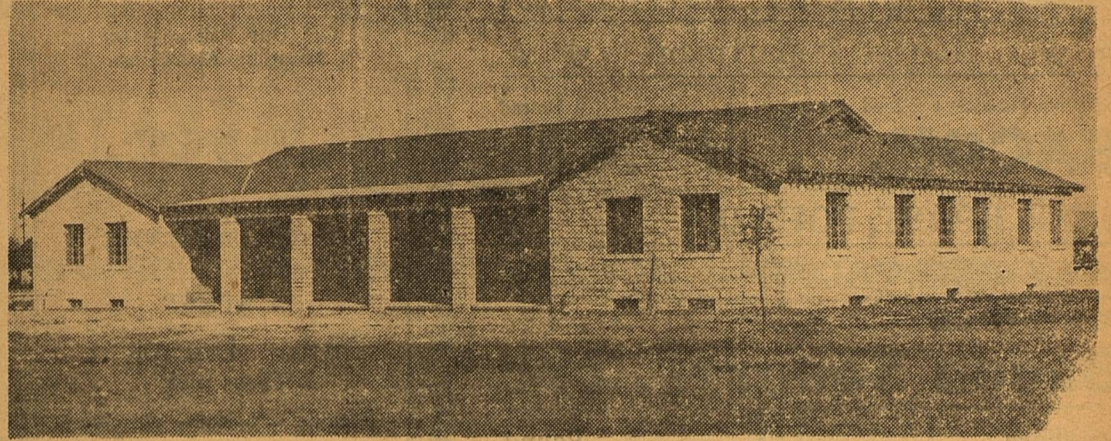

### Describes Atlantic Pact As Deterrent To War

A formidable deterrent to war took shape last week when the representatives from 12 countries met in Washington and signed the historic Atlantic Security Pact.

The Nations included are: the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Denmark, Norway, Iceland, Italy and Portugal.

To make the agreement effective the United States Senate must ratify it, as must the parliaments of other signatories.

The importance of this move cannot be overestimated. It is a bold effort to promote the cause of world peace and to counteract the power and program of Russia and her Communist allies.

This collective action was forced upon the western powers by the Soviets who, by the abuse of the veto power (they have cast 30) in the United Nations, have thrown road blocks in the way of efforts to use the U. N. as a means of settling international disputes.

Groping for an alternative to which the western powers could rally their united efforts for security and peace, the Atlantic Pact turned out to be the answer. For it provides a possible means of concerted action which cannot be subjected to an arbitrary veto by the Soviet Union.

Briefly, the pact provides that an armed attack on any one or more of its members shall be considered an attack against all, and the promise to assist the victim of attack with such action, including armed force, as is deemed necessary to restore and maintain the security of all. The life of the pact is 20 years subject to review and renewal after 10 years.

The real purpose behind it all is, of course, to provide a formidable deterrent to war. It is a warning to any potential aggressor that it is unsafe to start a war.

As was expected, the Pact has been bitterly denounced by the Kremlin, and that attack was echoed in the United States by Henry Wallace, leader of the Commugres-

sive Party. The latter spoke over a national hook-up, demanding that we appease Russia and do nothing that might hurt her feelings.

Of course, Wallace has never raised his voice in criticism of the agreement of the Soviet Union and her six satellites of Iron Curtain Europe, when those countries met in Silesia in October of 1947, and agreed to act in unison thereafter, and named the Marshall Plan nations as their target.

Just the signing of an agreement, of course, will not do the job. It will take more than that. The United States will be called upon to provide some military equipment to the other nations. There is a limit to our ability to do that. But observers are saying that surplus materials left over from the war with some added, will be a lot of help in the hands of our allies.

In any event, Uncle Sam, if the Senate ratifies, will have taken another firm stand for world peace, and this will put the Kremlin on notice that if she attempts to knock off western nations, one at a time, that kind of monkey-business will mean war.

## ELDORADO SOIL SCREAMING FOR CONSERVATION

By William M. Rountree, Work Unit Conservationist

I'm sure it's hard for a clerk or business man in Eldorado to understand and realize that he has a big stake in the care of the soil of our district. Perhaps he hasn't thought much about it, other than the fact that crops fail, and prices are higher in the grocery store. Surely things will be better for the farmer next year, he figures, if they can just get a little rain.

It hasn't been too many years ago that agriculture here didn't amount to much more than "hoping for rain". That was when our soils were new to grazing and cultivation.

There was good grass as far as you could see and most soils had enough minerals and were in good enough shape to grow a good cotton crop, maize crop, and small grain.

Have we thought much about how long the land will keep producing?

It's already a pretty familiar story about what is happening.

Cotton fields which have produced from half a bale to a bale per acre are having a hard time making a half or even a quarter of a bale.

Our pastures, in which livestock could be turned and almost forgotten, are beginning to play out. Weeds are beginning to take over where the good grasses grew. The stock left the weeds alone and have been grazing the good grasses until there are very few left to graze.

A "good year" will come along and things will brighten a little and encourage the farmer and rancher to keep going — but the general trend is downward all the time. It still is.

Farms and ranches referred to as "rundown places" are beginning to appear. Such places have unproductive cultivated land, overgrazed pastures, low yields and poor livestock.

History books have been written giving plenty of evidence of how people have suffered from failing to take care of their soil.

Starvation in Europe is not altogether the result of war. But we do not have to leave this district to see a lack of conservation.

Look at most of our pastures and see what kinds of grasses we are growing. Most of it will be needle grass, hairy triodia, and red grama which live stock cannot profitably utilize.

There are several danger signs which are showing up if one just looks for them. As an example, just because a pasture has grass in it is no sign it's a good pasture. There are good grasses and poor grasses, and more poor than good grasses are growing in this district.

Outside of a few acres of land under good agricultural management, every acre in the district needs conservation.

Our soil is basic and is more important to more people than any other item. Our food comes from the soil.

However, much of our soil is blowing and washing away while we "eat hearty" and worry about income taxes.

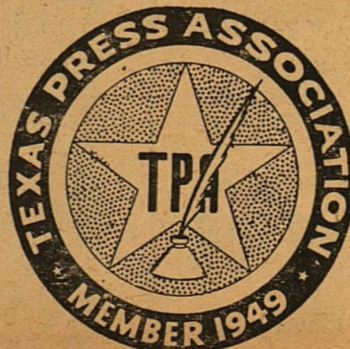

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

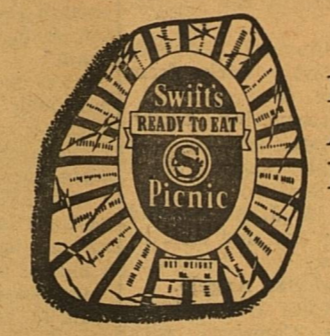
