In order to find out what is on the producers' minds in regard to the failure of mohair to move in quantities and at prices comparable with that of wool and to see if they want to ask for government help with support prices, Clayton Puckett, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, has called the Board of Directors of the association to meet in special session in the court house at Rocksprings on April 7. The meeting is called for 10 a. m. This special session was voted by the directors at their regular quarterly meeting in Ozona, March 27.

"It is very important that all mohair producers attend this meeting," Mr. Puckett stated. "The Association is anxious to take whatever steps the majority of the growers desire. There will be a full discussion of his problem, and we want the producers to express their opinions."

GIRL WRITES OF CONDITIONS IN D. P. CAMP

A letter of thanks, which gives a description of conditions in a Displaced Persons' Camp in Germany, was received Tuesday by Lola Beth Ballew, in appreciation for packages mailed by the school last fall. The letter reads:

Mattenberg D. P. Camp, 16th February, 1948.

Dear Benefactors, Last summer, my daughter Irena, 8 years old, got a parcel from you and she was extremely glad. After having got that parcel we sent you a letter of thanks, and now I would once more like to take this opportunity to say you many cordial thanks for it.

Our family consists of four persons: we, the parents, daughter Irena 8 years old, and daughter Johana 9 months old.

The last cruel war has brought us from our beloved native country to this hostile country of Germany. Although the war is over long ago, but we are not yet able to return to our native country of Lithuania because of the cruel and bloody Russian communistic terror which has been established in Lithuania.

Here in Germany, at a D. P. camp we are starving together with our children. The food we get from IRO is so poor and scarce, that we have become sick and particularly our children have been weakened by such a poor food, and now they are very feeble.

Addressing you by this my letter I kindly ask you not to forget us and help us your goodhearted hand, so that we would be able to escape our children from the threatened hunger, and to save them.

We thank you very much and pray not to forget us in the future. May the great God of Heaven protect and bless you and your country.

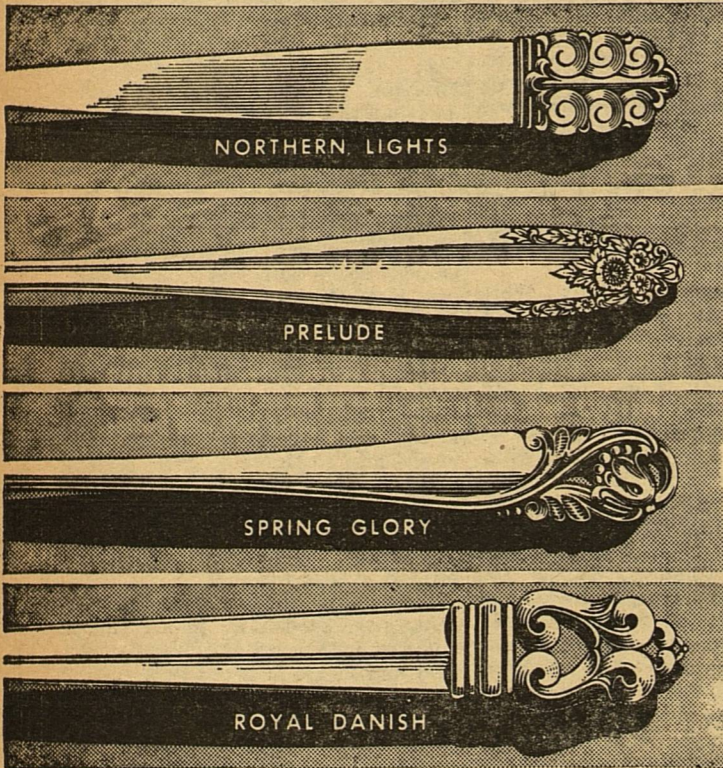
Interscholastic League
