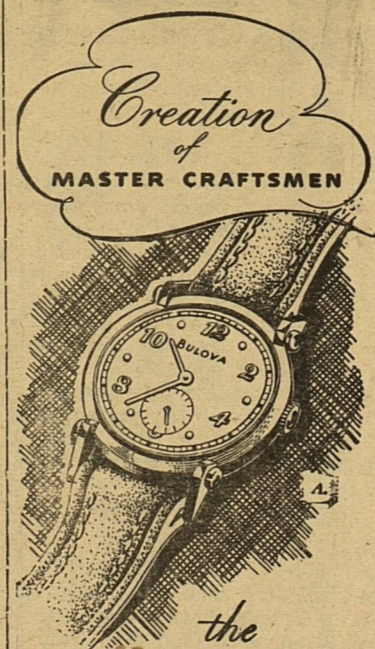

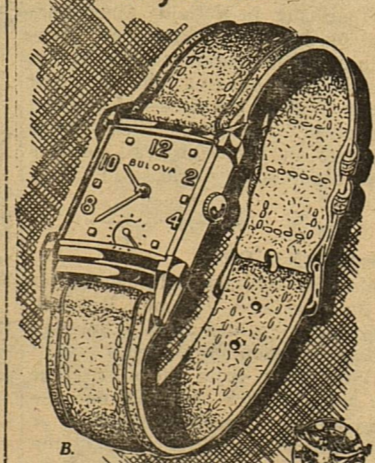



Washington News Letter

By Cong. O. C. Fisher

Most economists say a tax rate can be at a point where it is bearable and yet not repressive of the use of risk and venture capital. Expansion and employment comes from more business ventures and the creation of more jobs in an ever expanding economy. Risks are taken because of the profit incentive. The extent of the burden upon individuals in different income classes is apparent from the amounts paid under the existing law.

All taxes paid—federal, state and local—amount to about 30% of our national income. In other words, about one-third of the average person's working time and effort goes to the government. Government costs can be reduced. The budget can be kept balanced, and above all, an orderly debt-retirement program can and should be set up.

The House has just adopted a Senate resolution to trim the existing budget by \$2½ billion. The effect of this measure is to create a goal to shoot at—a general objective. Any actual reduction will have to be reflected in the various annual appropriation bills as they are passed. I voted for this because it should help to keep the subject of further reductions in non-essential expenditures squarely before the members of Congress. It is hoped that the saving may be even more than this amount indicated.

Steel Necessary To Avert Butane Scarcity

Some 65,000 tons of steel will be necessary to build sufficient facilities if Texas is to avert another serious shortage of butane next winter, Railroad Commissioner Bill Murray, Jr. pointed out to a subcommittee of the National Petroleum Council last week.

Murray blamed the butane shortages during the past two years on huge increases in demand and a shortage of storage facilities owned by distributors and consumers.

He recommended that dealers increase their bulk storage facilities in order to store butane during the summer. He also said that consumers should increase the size of their storage tanks to a minimum of 300 gallons, adding that 500 gallons would be preferred.

When the shortage became acute this winter, Gov. Beauford Jester appointed Murray chairman of his Emergency Fuel Commission, an organization which obtained the release of several million gallons of butane which was going into industrial uses.

"A shortage next winter can be averted only by wholehearted co-operation of producers, distributors and consumers," Murray said.

CHECKING OF OLD-AGE INSURANCE ACCOUNTS IS RECOMMENDED

Checking on your old-age and survivors insurance account is a good deal like having your bank account balanced and is just as good business. This was the advice of George D. Clark, manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration, in reminding workers of this free service of his agency.

"We urge all workers to check at intervals on their accounts," Mr. Clark explained, "so that they may be sure of receiving credit for all wages they earn. We take every precaution to insure the accuracy of our records but faulty reporting by employers still causes trouble. Most errors on reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account number or to failure to show any number. Sometimes the wrong amount of wages is reported and occasionally no report at all is made."

Mr. Clark pointed out that there is no charge for furnishing wage statements and that any worker can obtain one merely by sending in a request card. These cards, called Form OAR-7004, can be secured by writing, telephoning, or calling in person at the San Angelo office. The address is 307 Federal Building.

MISSION STUDY CONCLUDED AT METHODIST CHURCH

The concluding chapters of the study, "One Hundred Years of Christianity in China", were given in a review by Mrs. C. E. Bludworth of San Angelo, following a covered-dish supper at the Methodist Church Sunday evening.

Mrs. Bludworth, an outstanding speaker who is well known for her splendid book reviews, brought the book to a dramatic close in a summary of the mission work. She told how a small beginning has grown until it is felt throughout the huge country, and from whose source have sprung many Christian leaders, among them General Chiang Kai Chek and his wife.

Mrs. Bludworth, wife of the pastor of the Trinity Methodist church, was accompanied by her son, Charles.

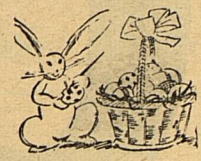
Rex McCormick is still under treatment at a San Angelo hospital and his condition is still satisfactory. It is not yet known when an operation will be performed.

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ORDINANCE
PROHIBITING THE DUMPING OF ANY RUBBISH, TIN CANS BRUSH OR ANY OTHER WASTE COLLECTED AROUND THE HOUSE, WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Eldorado, Texas that hereafter, it will be unlawful for any person or persons to dump rubbish, tin cans, brush or any other waste within the City limit of the City of Eldorado, Texas (streets, alleys, or vacant lots).

Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

Motion was made by Jack Hext seconded by Sam M. Oglesby, Jr to set aside all rules and pass the above ordinance, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication as required by law, and shall precede any and all ordinances controlling the above ordinance.

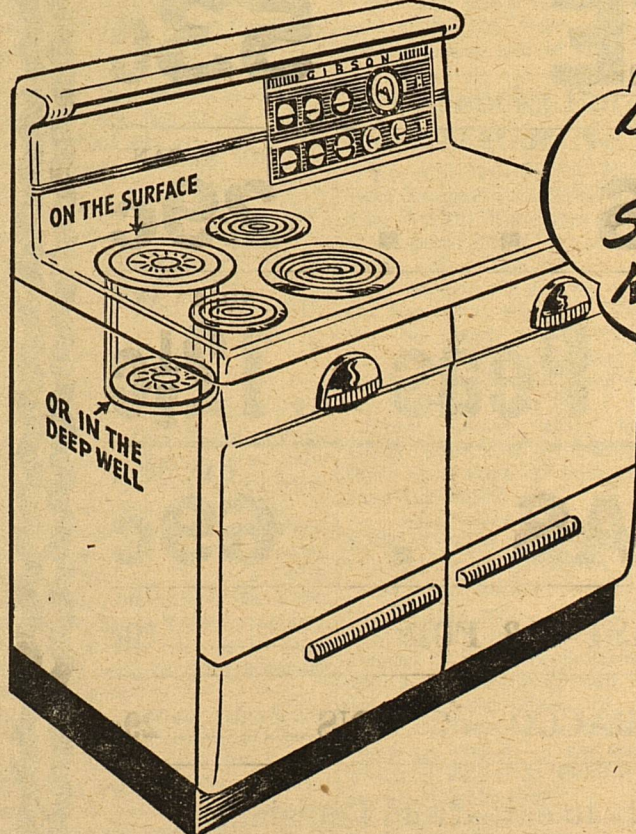
