## Know Your School

By C. A. Reynolds

THE SCHOOL BUDGET

Each school district is required by law to furnish the state depart ment of education a budget of its expected expenditures and income for a school year. The president of the board of trustees is the legal oudget officer and it is his duty to see that the budget is prepared In many cases the chairman of the board delegates the making of the field to Eldorado. estimated burget to the school superintendent or secretary of the board or to both. In the case of the local school system, the latter is the case. The school budget is pre pared during the early summer months and at a regular meeting of the trustees a budget hearing held. This hearing is publicized b notices in the local paper and open to the public, as are all meet

Independent districts are requir ed to file one copy of the budge with the State Department of Education and one with the County Clerk. This is done by Sept. 1 each year. We prepare four copies of the budget, and in addition to the requirements mentioned above, one copy is kept by the secretary to the school board and one by the school superintendent. Any individual can examine the school budget at any time by calling at one of the mentioned places.

The budget is made on an approved form for Texas public schools which is furnished by the State Department of Education. The budget is divided into parts: disbursements, and revenue for current expenses and debt service. There are some 50 items that come under disbursements, but the main headings and the amount appropriated in

this year's budget are:
1. Administration \$9000. This includes \$1200 for salary of secretary of the board, \$2200 for tax collector's commissions, \$5000 for superintendent's salary and \$600

for office supplies, auditing, etc. 2. Disbursements show \$60,833.00 -\$3200 for school principal, \$30, 958 for white elementary teacher \$21,575 for high school teachers, \$2400 for substitutes and special teachers, \$900 for clerical assis-

tant, and \$1800 teaching supplies. 3. Instruction for colored calls for \$2300-\$2200 for salary and

5. \$2500 is appropriated for maintenance of the school plant. This includes supplies, repairs, and contract services.

> 7. For fixed charges and current interest we have \$3000. \$1500 of this is for interest on short time loans. Often it is necessary to borrow money for short periods to meet payrolls, etc. until state money and taxes come in. \$1500 is for insurance.

> 8. The second main heading under disbursements is for capital outlay. This is for new sites, new ouildings, furniture and equipment, \$1700 was appropriated for this.

> The third main heading under lisbursements is for debt service. We have \$6000 for payment on usses. Paper on school busses held by a bank in Cameron and to be retired in five years. \$1137.50 for interest on serial bonds, and \$4000 principal on building debt. There is still \$45,000 owed on the present buildings.



The House has just adopted a Senate resolution to trim the existing budget by \$21/2 billion. The effect of this measure is to create a goal to shoot at-a general objective. Any actual reduction will have to be reflected in the various annual appropriation bills as they are passed. I voted for this because it should help to keep the subject of further reductions in non-essential expenditures squarely before the members of Congress. It is hoped that the saving may be even more than this amount indicated.

## Steel Necessary To

**Avert Butane Scarcity** Some 65,000 tons of steel will be necessary to build sufficient facilities if Texas is to avert another serious shortage of butane next winter, Railroad Commissioner Bill Murray, Jr. pointed out to a sub-committee of the National Petrolum Council last week.

Murray blamed the butane shortiges during the past two years on nuge increases in demand and a hortage of storage facilities owned by distributors and consumers.

He recommended that dealers ncrease their bulk storage facilities in order to store butane during the summer. He also said that consumers should increase the size of their storage tanks to a minimum of 300 gallons, adding that 500 gallons would be preferred.

When the shortage became acute this winter, Gov. Beauford Jester appointed Murray chairman of his Emergency Fuel Commission, an organization which obtained the release of several million gallons of butane which was going into industrial uses.

'A shortage next winter can be averted only by wholehearted cooperation of producers, distributors and consumers," Murray said.

### CHECKING OF OLD-AGE INSURANCE ACCOUNTS IS RECOMMENDED

Checking on your old-age and survivors insurance account is a good deal like having your bank account balanced and is just as good business. This was the advice of George D. Clark, manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration, in reminding workers of this free service of nis agency.

"We urge all workers to check at ntervals on their accounts," Mr. Clark explained, "so that they may be sure of receiving credit for all wages they earn. We take every precaution to insure the accuracy of our records but faulty reporting by employers still causes trouble. Most errors on reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account number or to failure to show any number. Sometimes the wrong amount of wages is reported and occasionally no report at all is

Mr. Clark pointed out that there is no charge for furnishing wage statements and that any worker can obtain one merely by sending in a request card. These cards called Form OAR-7004, can be secured by writing, telephoning, or calling in person at the San Angelo office. The address is 307 Federal Building.


