An iron lung respirator was used by the San Angelo Fire Department for an hour and a half in a fruitless effort to revive the child. Funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. Monday at the Mertzton Methodist Church with Rev. Atkinson officiating. The baby was the only child of the couple.

Mrs. Robertson is a sister of Mrs. Berle Woodward, who with her husband attended the services for the boy.

FIRST IRRIGATION PROJECT IN CO. IS OFF TO A GOOD START ON HENRY MITTEL'S PLACE WEST OF HULLDALE

A 25-acre tract on the Henry Mittel place has assumed importance all out of proportion to its size—it will be the site of Schleicher County's first irrigation project, which if successful will possibly revolutionize agriculture in this county.

Mittel was in Eldorado Wednesday afternoon to receive delivery on 1000 feet of aluminum pipe, which will distribute water to 25 or 30 acres.

Much preliminary work has preceded purchase of materials, for the project has been conceived and carried out under direction of the personnel of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation office, who will explain the project later when all details have been worked out.

The farm which Mittel owns lies west of the railroad at Huldale, and the strip to be irrigated is virgin soil, now cleared and plowed. Mittel dug an irrigation well recently, and is justly proud of the water which he struck at 1000 feet. He expects to put down a second well soon, and if he strikes water,

SONORA CHILD IS ILL WITH FIRST POLIO CASE

Aurelia Lira, age 11, of Sonora, has been hospitalized, since diagnosis of her illness as polio, the child being the first polio case in Sonora. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Lira and is a second grade student in the L. W. Elliott school.

The district in which the child lives has been sprayed with DDT, in an effort to reduce spread of the disease.

Runge Re-Elected as SC District Supervisor Here

Forrest Runge was re-elected supervisor of Zone 5 of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District at the election meeting held Tuesday, Oct. 5.

In connection with the election of Mr. Runge as supervisor, a short field trip was conducted under the supervision of work unit technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and W. G. Godwin, County Agent.

Identification of grasses and the difference between having a range with a high per cent of good and choice plants as compared to a range composed of fair and poor plants was explained. Specimens of the different grasses were on hand for close observation and discussion.

Immediately after the grass identification and discussion, an assimilated rain maker was set up by fixing two three-legged stands to hold up a five gallon can with holes in it. One of these stands was placed over an area without grass, litter, or any cover at all. Another stand was placed over an area which had a good cover of side oats grama, curly mesquite and litter.

Both cans were filled with water and allowed to empty through holes in the bottom falling in the form of rain drops. When the cans were empty holes were dug to note the penetration of moisture. Moisture penetrated 8 inches on the area with good cover and litter compared to only 3 inches penetration on the barren area. During this time the Work Unit Conservationist explained the churning effect of rain drops upon the bare ground, how muddy the water gets, and of the water which runs off into our ditches then to our draws and rivers thus causing flood damage when the water reaches a high point of concentration.

Thermometer readings were made on an open space and on an area with a good cover of grass. There was approximately 4 degrees difference in the two readings. It was explained that good cover in the summer helps to hold and conserve moisture and to keep the temperature from getting so low in the winter.

The different range condition classes were discussed by the Work Unit Conservationist, and a deep

soil improving in condition was observed. During this time the ranchers were asked, "What's your range condition?" A thin upland site in poor condition was observed by the group and the small percentages of the good and choice grasses were discussed.

The King Ranch strain of Yellow Bluestem planting on Carrol White's ranch was observed. This plant was described as being a perennial warm-season mid grass which is drought and cold resistant. Clippings from different sections of the country show that this grass under dry weather conditions will produce some 7000 pounds per acre of forage. Carrol White remarked that cattle and sheep don't hesitate to graze it.

Technicians of the Eldorado-Divide District explained the merits of the planter which the district has on hand. It is available to co-operators of the district at no expense to them other than minor repair which may need to be made from time to time when being used on their respective places.

In conclusion some of the groups drove over to Forrest Runge's to observe a pasture approaching good and excellent condition. Mr. Runge explained how the pasture had been treated and managed in order to get the decided improvement. Good and choice grasses growing out in the open in vigorous condition and producing large amounts of good choice feed were noted.

County Agent News

Plow Under Cotton Stalks
The sooner that Schleicher Co. farmers plow under cotton stalks, the more boll weevils and pink boll worms will starve and freeze during the year. Producers have a good opportunity to put into effect a proven practice.

Records show that in some parts of the State that a fair clean up in the fall of 1943 resulted in a 26% infestation of boll weevil the next year. A poor clean up in the fall of 1944 showed a 51% infestation the following year, while a good clean up showed only 8% infestation. An excellent clean up showed 3% infestation in 1946. A delayed clean up shows 22% infestation in 1947.

Eliminating the food supply of the boll weevil before he goes into hibernation, by turning the cotton plant under green, is the most economical and surest way of holding boll weevil damage to a minimum. —W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent.

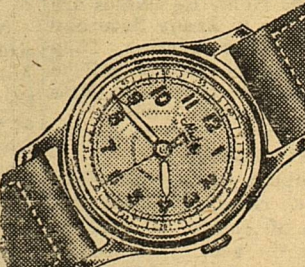
Mr. and Mrs. Van O'Harrow visited Sunday in San Angelo with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Byrd.
