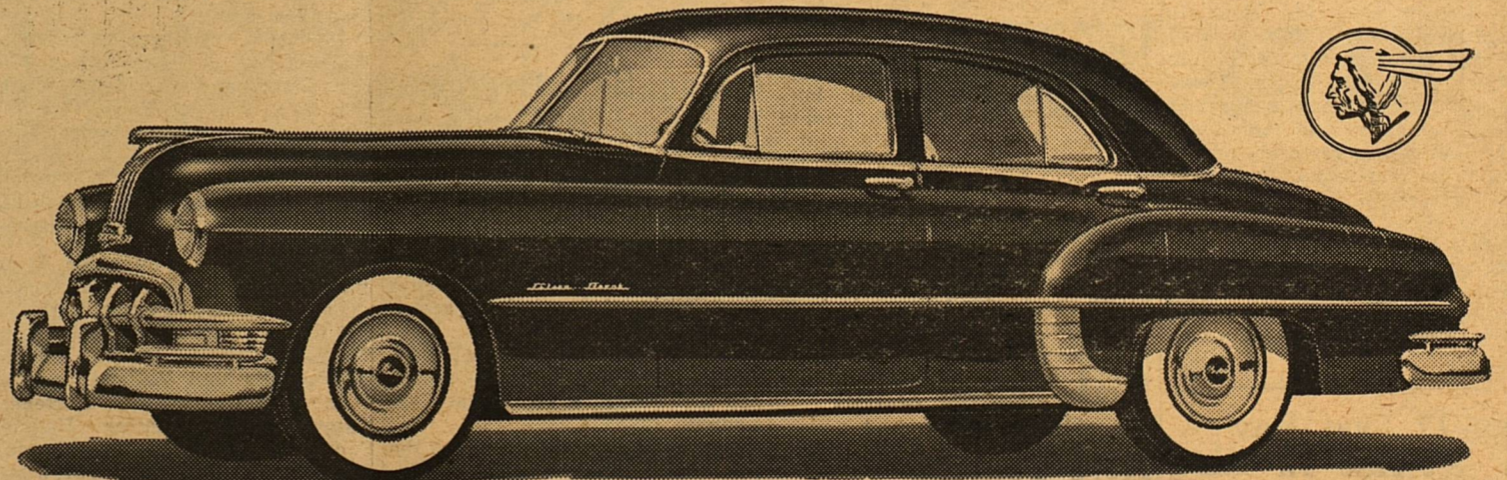

Farmers Protest Acreage

Farmers of this county met together at Robert Lee last Monday to decide the best course to take in

their protest against the unfair cotton acreage allotment which they have received.

A re-allocation of the acreage was made some time ago, but the benefit to Coke county farmers was so small it was hardly noticeable, a spokesman for the group said. The additional acreage was allocated according to the same formula which was used to allot the original acreage, giving the big cotton farmers of the Plains and South Texas even greater percentages than they already had.—Bronte Enterprise.
