NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF SCHLEICHER
To the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Schleicher County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 30th day of June, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an election order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 11th day of June, 1951, which is as follows:

"WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court deems it advisable and necessary to submit to the qualified voters of Schleicher County, Texas, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the propositions hereinafter set forth:

THEREFORE, be it ordered by the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas:

That an election be held on the 30th day of June, 1951, in Schleicher County, Texas, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NO. 1
Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and to have assessed and collected a tax not to exceed thirty (30c) cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within said County, such tax to be used for the construction and maintenance of Farm-to-Market and Lateral Roads in said County, as authorized by Chapter 464, Acts 51st Legislature, Regular Session.

PROPOSITION NO. 2
Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of \$15,000.00 payable serially within ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three (3%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of purchasing fire fighting equipment to be used for the protection and preservation of bridges, county shops, county warehouses, and other county property located in said County, but without the corporate limits of any incorporated city or town, as authorized by Chapter 575, Acts 51st Legislature, Regular Session.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
FOR the tax of not exceeding thirty (30c) cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) Valuation, as submitted in proposition No. 1.
AGAINST the tax of not exceeding thirty (30c) cents on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, as submitted in proposition No. 1.

FOR the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in proposition No. 2.
AGAINST the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in proposition No. 2.

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the two propositions, respectively.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County and attested by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted at a public place in each voting precinct in said County, which posting shall be done not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to said election.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County, on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

POST - SCRIPT

Now Gulf Station Proprietor C. N. Shaw has something new to beef about. He and the Mrs. took a trip to Arkansas—he says just ONE TIME did he have his windshield cleaned and the floor boards swept.

More improvements; Dr. M. G. Holcomb has just completed installation of the latest type of X-ray machine.

The last strip of highway, going west from the west Schleicher Co. line, is being paved—and the opinion is expressed that Schleicherites will drive straight through to Big Lake by July.

More road news: The commissioners, in session Monday, approved a letter from the highway department designating an 8-mile strip of Mertzson road for building in the near future. The strip would lead eight miles out from Eldorado, going toward Mertzson.

Also the commissioners voted to help with the road bed, on a proposed extension from the Susan Peak field, in Tom Green County, through the east end of the county to the Menard road near Ft. McKavett. A committee from San Angelo, boosting the project, met with the commissioners. It is understood that after right-of-way is obtained and fences built, Schleicher would prepare the road bed, which might later be surfaced by the state.

The lighting project which is under way in Eldorado was at a standstill for a few days, while the West Texas Utilities crew did some emergency repair work in San Angelo. Some of the poles are up and some of the wire strung—about half of the project, it is estimated today.

Lucky folks in the Forest Runge neighborhood had some rain Monday afternoon. Runge reports .35 and Carol White, who has had probably more rain than anyone else in the county, got .5, following his 1.1 inch rain of Saturday night.

How's Business?

By Roger W. Babson

Around the first of each month this column is devoted to a discussion of the volume of business as distinguished from the value of business. The value of business today, as measured by our depreciated dollar, would give a distorted picture. With the purchasing power of the dollar down to fifty-four cents, it takes almost two dollars to do the work of one. This would make the value of business today in terms of our dollar very high. The volume of business—the actual units of goods produced—represents the real added wealth.

The volume of business today, as measured by my Composite Business Chart, is 27% above normal; just one point lower than it was last month. Business has been

quite stable for the past twelve months, fluctuating only ten points. The high for the past twelve months was 37% above normal, and 27% above normal was the low point. The year opened at 36% above normal and has held 30% above with the exception of the past two months. The slight dip in the volume the past two months is due to shortages of materials and reconversion of certain plants to war production. The allocation of certain metals is affecting peacetime production. This will be felt more as additional war material is produced.

Business should remain relatively high throughout the year; but increased wages, higher costs for materials and higher taxes will be reflected in lower profits. Since business is the chief source of Government revenue, the Administration may learn that taxes increased too much may reduce the Government's income from business and from the individuals—owners and laborers—who carry on the business of the nation. Non-military expenses should carefully be scrutinized and reduced or eliminated altogether wherever possible in this

period of the survival. "Is this expense necessary?" is a question that should be asked of every non-military item.

JOHN CARRICO DIRECTS BANDS AT TW COLLEGE

EL PASO, Texas—John Carrico, formerly of Eldorado and band director at Sul Ross College in Alpine for the past six years, has been appointed director of bands at Texas Western College, it was announced by Dr. W. H. Elkins, president.

Mr. Carrico is known throughout the Southwest as a pioneer in the introduction and development of spectacular football half-time events by using brilliant electrical and fireworks effects with his bands. High school bands over Texas are now using effects introduced by his bands. Carrico is the author of a master's thesis, "A Study of the Lighting Effects for the Marching Band."

The new Texas Western College band leader holds the bachelor of science and master of arts degrees and in addition he earned the master of music degree at Northwestern University. Besides his college band work, Carrico has instructed high school bands at Eldorado and Alpine, Texas. During World War II he served in the Pacific Theater as an army warrant officer-band leader, having graduated from the U. S. Army Music School in Washington, D. C.

A native Texan, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Carrico, reside at 1706 Hermine Blvd., San Antonio. His father is a former prominent band and orchestra musician of Dallas. A brother, Bill, is band and chorus director for the Pecos, Texas, schools.

At Texas Western, Carrico will direct activities of the Marching and Concert bands and the Girls' Drum Corps. He will also organize a new ROTC band which will serve with the Antiaircraft unit on the campus.

One of Carrico's first assignments will be finding the most outstanding drum majorette in the Southwest for the purpose of offering her the \$500 Exchange Club Scholarship to Texas Western. CONG. FISHER'S LETTER

In a historic decision, the Supreme Court last week upheld the conviction of the 11 communist leaders for conspiracy to overthrow the United States government. Heretofore there has been constant confusion regarding the legal status of American communists and what could be done about them without bumping into constitutional road blocks.

The opinion written by the Supreme Court does not make it illegal for a person to be a member of the Communist party, but it does make it a violation for such party members to conspire together by words and deeds with a design to overthrow the government by force or violence.

Heretofore the courts have been hampered by some Supreme Court decisions regarding the rights of individuals who were communists. Only a few years ago an attempt was made to deport Harry Bridges, the West Coast left-wing labor leader on the ground that he was an undesirable alien. A tremendous amount of evidence was collected pointing to his communist status, and the Attorney General ordered him sent back to his native Australia. But the Supreme Court nullified the order and Bridges was released, much to the elation of the CIO and other organizations that fought to keep him here.

Bridges was then given citizenship. But two years ago, as a result of a collection of incriminating evidence collected by Congressional committees and from other sources, the Department of Justice obtained an indictment against Bridges for perjury, claiming he lied when he swore he was not a Communist at the time his citizenship was granted. A jury convicted him and the case is now on appeal.

An unfortunate thing about the case of the eleven Communists is the very low penalties meted out to them. Their prison sentences were up to five years and fines of \$10,000 to each. They should be executed or put away for life. I plan to introduce a bill to provide much higher penalties for such treasonable acts when and if others are convicted in the future.

The effect of the Supreme Court ruling should be very helpful in future prosecutions of this character. It will put the fear of God in every communist who collaborates with his fellow-travelers to destroy our government. And it will discourage the millions of Communist sympathizers who blather about civil rights and constitutional rights every time a communist is flushed out of cover and his treasonable plans are exposed.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF SCHLEICHER

To the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Schleicher County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 30th day of June, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 21st day of May, 1951, which is as follows: "WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas, on November 7, 1944, the qualified voters of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9, of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in the event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the County taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain County taxes as herein provided:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY, TEXAS: That a special election be held in said County on the 30th day of June, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Proposition
Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Forty-five (45) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes:

Not exceeding Fifteen (15) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges:

Not exceeding Five (5) cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding Fifteen (15) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and attested by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Court House door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication of said notice in a newspaper published in Schleicher County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.
