





Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (.15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be-construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.


