



### Schleicher County Oil News

Special from James C. Watson Midland, Texas

Eleven miles east of the Huldale-Strawn field of north central Schleicher county, E. B. Fletcher of Dallas spotted location for a 6,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat. It will be drilled as his No. 1 Mary O'Harrow Robinson 660 feet from north and east lines of section 39, block I, GH&S survey and 20 miles northeast of Eldorado.

The eighth producer for the Huldale-Strawn field was indicated this week at Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 2-1 H. F. Thomson estate.

The project is now at total depth of 5,780 feet. Operator cemented seven and five-eighths inch casing at 5,710 feet and is waiting for cement to cure before drilling out and making a completion attempt from open hole.

No. 2-1 Thomson flowed oil by heads at a rate estimated at 10 barrels hourly during the last 90 minutes of a 3 1/2 hour drillstem test from 5695 to 5730 feet. There was no water. The Pennsylvania pay was topped at 5692 feet, elevation 2338 feet. Location is one location north of Delta Gulf Drilling Company No. 1 Thomson, the discovery well of the field.

Sinclair No. 1 Davis Estate, one location south of the discovery well of the Huldale field, is at total depth of 5702 feet in lime waiting for cement to harden on 5 1/2 inch oil string cemented at that point.

The project indicated as the 4th producer in the field on a drillstem test from 5619 to 5652. Tool was open four hours. Gas surfaced in nine minutes. No fluid surfaced during the time tool was open. When nine stands of drillpipe were pulled it started unloading.

Recovery was 50 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 4120 feet of oil cut with 25% water and 630 feet of salt water. Operator will drill out plug and attempt to complete the well as the fourth producer in the north field.

Southwest of Eldorado Stanolind was drilling below 7600 in lime at its No. 1 R. J. Hill, 7,700-foot Ellenberger test. The well is now several hundred feet into the Ellenburger. Drillstem tests were being attempted Tuesday, but packer failed to hold.

Stanolind No. 1 Williams, wildcat in extreme northwest Schleicher, is progressing below 7967 in lime. It is contracted to go to 8100 feet. Drillsite is 16 miles northwest of Eldorado.

American Republics No. 2 Thomson Estate is at total depth of 5596 feet preparing to take a drillstem test in lime pay of the Huldale-Strawn field. This project is one location east of the closest production in the field. A core from 5580 to 5596 had interesting shows of possible production.

The Ohio No. 5, one location north of American Republics No. 2, is at total depth of 5786 feet in lime and ran a drillstem test with packer at 5700 feet. The Pennsylvania pay was topped at 5701 feet. Drillstem test No. 2 from 5696 to 5786. Tool open 45 minutes with 15 minute shut-in. Strong blow of gas in 5 minutes. Oil to surface in 13 minutes. Flowed 63 barrels oil in 30 minutes. Gas-Oil ration was 500 to 1. Running tests and setting pipe are the next scheduled steps.

Ohio No. 6 at 2018 in shale. Ohio No. 7 drilling below 3798 in lime.

Ohio No. 10 drilling below 2018 in lime and shale.

Ohio has filed application for a permit to drill No. 11 Thomson—one location east of Ohio No. 5.

Frank Barrett, supervisor of drilling for the Ohio Oil Co., in the Huldale field, has left with his family on a vacation trip to Wyoming. His duties are being looked after by F. A. Nunnally.

## College Deferment Must Be Requested Draft Board Warns

Austin, May 31.—A July draft quota of 367 men for Texas was received today from national headquarters, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced.

This is the state's share of a national quota of 15,000, announced several days ago from Washington. The Texas quota is the smallest monthly quota received since beginning of the conflict in Korea.

Local board quotas for the July call are presently unavailable at state headquarters. Quotas will be sent to local boards some time after June 15, according to present plans at state draft headquarters.

The July call brings the Texas total of men called for since the beginning of the United Nations fight in Korea to 27,207. During the same period, the entire nation has been called upon to furnish 565,000 men.

At the same time he made this announcement, the state Selective Service director passed on some advice to college students.

Students who plan to request deferment to continue their studies should notify their local boards immediately after the close of their current academic year.

"To get deferment consideration from local boards," General Wakefield said, "student registrants have to request it. Taking the college qualification test or ranking high in their classes won't assure consideration for deferment unless they ask for it in writing."

The Selective Service college qualification test is an examination to demonstrate high educational aptitude. It is estimated that 400,000 college students have registered for these tests. An estimated 175,000 already have taken it.

Failure to furnish information showing intention to request deferment, in some cases, may result in a student's being inducted into service at the end of the 30-day postponement period commencing at the end of the current academic year, the state director said.

General Wakefield said responsibility rests upon a draft registrant to supply his local board with any information affecting his draft status.

Ella D. Spears, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Spears, is the first young person from the Eldorado negro community to graduate from high school. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Spears.

She lived here with her family until she completed eighth grade, then went to San Angelo, where she has been working her way through Blackshear High School. She graduated in May.

An outstanding athlete, she won honors for herself and her school in track, basketball, and other departments, in addition to paying her way with jobs on the side. In 1949 she attended the AAU meeting in Odessa.

She expects to go to Tilliston, at Austin, next fall, and while in college to major in physical education, taking courses leading to a teaching position.

She states that Eldorado families for whom her mother works, such as Mrs. Bert Page, Mrs. Hill and others, have encouraged her to go on and complete her education.

## Another Oil Co. Puts In Office Here

The growing importance of Schleicher as an oil producing county, was shown this week when the Standard Oil Co. of Texas opened a field office in Eldorado to handle its oil operations in this area.

A. L. Hayner, geologist, coming from Snyder, has moved here with his wife and has rented a house. P. I. Youngkin, petroleum engineer, also from Snyder, is the other member of the local office staff at present. Mr. Youngkin has taken a room at Kenos Courts.

The new office in Eldorado is located in the Hext Frozen Foods building about a block west of the bank. Additional office equipment is expected in this week.

Standard of Texas, this week was in the process of completing its first producer in the Huldale field where it farmed out the lease on which the discovery well was drilled by Delta Gulf. The company is drilling on another test, and is building roads to its third location. Standard has several more tentative locations. The company is contracting the drilling of its Schleicher county wells, so the Eldorado office will not include a drilling department.

## MERTZON MAN IS NEW OWNER OF HOOVER DRUG

O. E. Deal of Sterling City has bought the Hoover Drug Store, and has re-named it Deal Drug Co. The new owner assumed management of the business yesterday with the help of Mr. Hoover, who will be employed by Mr. Deal until he becomes familiar with the store.

Jim Hoover, who has been associated with his uncle in the business will devote all of his time to farming and stock raising.

Mr. Deal was reared in Mertzon, the son of Dr. Deal, who first established his business at Sherwood and who is still practicing part-time at Mertzon. Mr. Deal operated a drug store for some time in Sterling City, and moved directly to Eldorado from Abilene. The Deals have one son who will start to school next fall.

Mr. Deal states that he feels very much at home in Eldorado as he already knows many of the people of the county. He expects to continue to maintain a first class drug store, carrying good-quality merchandise as his predecessor has done.

Mr. Hoover opened for business in Eldorado January 10, 1910, running a total of 50 cents for the day's business. He was born and reared in Burnet County, was educated at Centenary Methodist College at Lampasas, operated a grocery store in Brady with a partner, then entered the school of pharmacy in Galveston, graduating in 1909. He clerked for a Houston druggist a few months, then came to Eldorado, purchasing the drug store from B. E. Bearle, and operating it in the present Success location for many years.

He is a Mason, a prominent Baptist, and has held important civic positions.

The business deal does not include sale of the present building, which was put up in 1928, the new druggist renting it from Mr. Hoover.

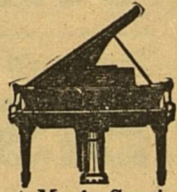

### NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF SCHLEICHER.

To the Resident Qualified Property Tax-paying Voters of Schleicher County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 30th day of June, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 21st day of May, 1951, which is as follows: "WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas, on November 7, 1944, the qualified voters of the State, voting on the proposition, approval of the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9, of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county at a general or special election and in the event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the County taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain County taxes as herein provided:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 30th day of June, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Proposition

Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Forty-five (.45c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Five (.5c) cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

A CAUTION: RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES.

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.
