## Heavy Rain Hits Parts of County

Rains which in spots totaled up to five inches, and which averaged about three inches in the part of Schleicher covered by the precipitation fell Monday morning. The heavy rains brought needed moisture to about a third of the county, including the dry eastern part, which had had little rain in many months.

Washing caused some damage, especially to fences and roads. Night crews working on the wildcat at McBurnetts were delayed in getting out to the highway by many hours because of the rapid rise of the draws—and longer delays were occasioned at Huldale when two draws on the cut-off road and others in the interior of the field made the roads impassable to cars for many hours.

Crews waded out when they could, leaving their cars. Waters subsided during the afternoon, revealing extensive damage to the Huldale cut-off road by washing into the road bed.

Ranches in the area are materially helped by the moisture, though most ranchers express the opinion that the rain fell so hard that not half of it was absorbed, much of it running off, taking some topsoil with it.

The heavy rains and the flash flood waters brought the South Concho up, bringing more water to San Angelo which until recently was experiencing a serious water shortage.

## Big Job Going On

A visit to the Huldale field this week shows an extensive system of ditches being dug and pipe lines for a gathering system being laid. On the highway near the Earl Cathey gate the line was being run under the road, and on the other side it looks as if it were taking off in the direction of the new Mittel field. Over in a Runge field near the Strake well, a 10,000 barrel tank is being erected. It seems that there is an extensive gathering system in the process of rapid construction, but the reporter was unable to find anyone on the job who was authorized to make a statement about the system.

## Four Transformers Knocked Out Monday

The "flash flood" which hit a large part of the county Monday morning between the hours of 4 to 8 o'clock caused extra work for all who deal in public utilities, including the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op (REA) here.

The local office reports that four transformers went out; one at Case Ranch, one at Bill Edmiston's, one at Jim Tom Roach's, one at Dan Adams'.

Work crews had service restored in all places by 5:00 p.m. the same day.

## West Road Closed Off At County Line

Contractors working on the west road from the Schleicher line to Midway Lane, have found it necessary to close the road to traffic, it was reported to the Success last night.

The work now going on consists of laying the caliche base, and it is estimated that this will be accomplished and the road ready for topping by October 1st. The 12-mile section of road is barricaded at both ends and will not be open— they said—until the black top has been applied.

The job of seal coating the Menard road has been moving rapidly and is nearing completion today. Motorists report that the new highway is open from Menard to Brady—providing a shorter and faster route from here to Brady, Brownwood and points beyond.

## MRS. EDMISTON, 77, DIES FOLLOWING MONTH'S ILLNESS

Mrs. W. F. Edmiston, 77, pioneer resident of Schleicher County, widow of a prominent local rancher, died Saturday night, August 18, 1951, in the Sonora hospital. She had been seriously ill one month, but had been in failing health a year.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the West Side Church of Christ with Travis Williamson, San Angelo minister, officiating, assisted by V. B. Allen of Benton, Arkansas, who has been holding a meeting here. In charge of the music was Davis Murr of Junction, who directed a quartet composed of Vernal and Charlie Sudduth and Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Peel, and a mixed choir who rendered several vocal numbers.

Ratliff directed the burial in the Eldorado Cemetery. Pallbearers were John I. King, Ernest Finnegan, Rance McDonald, H. Belk, Vernal Sudduth, W. C. Doyle, and Eddie Peel of Eldorado and Bill Sweat of Big Spring.

Present for the funeral, in addition to a large number of relatives and friends from this immediate locality, were most of her nieces, nephews, and other relatives from Mason, Loma Alta, San Angelo, Brady, Del Rio and many other places. The floral offering was large and beautiful.

### Native of Mason

Martha Ellen Lindsay was born on March 15, 1874, in Mason county. In 1890 she was married to W. F. Edmiston in Mason, and the following year the couple moved to Schleicher County, taking up residence on their ranch in the Mayer Community. ## Registration For School Next Friday

Busses will make their regular rounds Friday morning, Aug. 31, to bring in Schleicher county school children to register for another school year, it was announced this week by T. E. Holcomb, superintendent.

Grade children will register and receive school books during the morning, while high school and junior high students register in the morning and early afternoon.

Mr. Holcomb announced the following schedule for registering in high school: Seniors, 9:00-9:45 a. m.; Juniors, 9:45-10:30; Sophomores, 10:30-11:15; Freshmen, 11:15-12:15; grades 7 and 8, 1:00-2:00 p.m.

Lunch will be served in the school cafeteria at noon on registration day, it was stated, and school busses will take the students home at 2 o'clock.

The school opening assembly program will be held in the auditorium Tuesday, Sept. 4, at 9:00 a.m.

Wyndell Hall, grade principal, pointed out that birth certificates would be required of all beginners showing that they were six years old before Sept. 1, 1951, and that no "unders" would be accepted. Book cards and report cards will be required of all others, it was stated, and all transfer students will see the principal before enrolling.

Grade- and high-school faculty appointments will be announced next week.

Of interest to Schleicher friends of education is the fact that a building has been put in good repair for use of the negroes. The old building serving the negro district was sold and moved off. The Latin American building was then moved to the negro district, as the Latin Americans are all attending the main public school and were not using their school building.

The building has been completely renovated, and has running water, modern rest rooms, electric lights, and fresh coats of paint indoors and out. The roof has been repaired and the building is on its new foundation a little to the west of the old one. Bertha Mae Miles teaches the one-room school.

## Porosity High In Delta Gulf

Delta Gulf No. 3B Thompson, which cemented casing several days ago, is today in the process of being brought in—and probably will have kicked off by the time this paper reaches the readers.

Operators report that porosity was higher than in any other well in the field.

Other Delta operations: The rig which is coming off the Spence well is to be set up for the Mary Fowler No. 2.

Two more locations have been made on the Delta Gulf Thompson lease in Sec. 82. One will be 467 feet from east and 467 from south lines of Sec. 82. The other location in the same 80, will be 467 feet out its NW corner.

A 24-hour flowing gauge of 582.91 arrels of 45 gravity oil, with no water, was filed with the Railroad Commission's District 7-C office in San Angelo last week for Wesley W. West of Houston No. 1 Mrs. Christina Mittel, Pennsylvania lime discovery in northern Schleicher County.

The gauge was through an 18-64 inch tubing choke and 116 perforations from 6,317-37 feet in 5½-inch casing cemented at 6,370.2 feet. The section had been treated with 500 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 849-1. Flowing pressures were 780 pounds on the tubing, 275 pounds on the casing.

With elevation 2,324 feet, No. 1 Mittel topped the pay at 6,090 and drilled to 6,372 feet, according to information filed with the potential gauge. Application was made for a new field designation, the name Neva West for Mrs. Wesley West being suggested, and for discovery allowable.

The oil is being trucked from two 500-barrel tanks in Pan American Pipe Line Co., trucks to the Eldorado pump station on Shell Pipe Line Co's line.

No. 1 Mittel is in the C SE NE 71-TT-TCRR, 2¼ miles north of Huldale. It is only 2 3-4 miles west and slightly north of the North Huldale field, but is considered to be on a separate structure owing to a much lower lime top. A northwest offset by West, an east offset by Standard of Texas and a southeast offset by Pan American are preparing to start.

Seven-inch casing had been cemented on bottom at 5,747 feet in Pennsylvanian reef lime in Standard of Texas No. 2-1 Mrs. Frances May Thomson in the North Huldale field.

The 7-inch casing will be perforated and the lime acidized.

If production is not developed the project will be drilled deeper.

In the Huldale field, Ohio Oil Company No. 12 Thomson was drilling 5,008 feet in shale. Ohio No. 14 Thomson at 1,585 feet in lime. Ohio No. 15 Thomson at 1,842 feet in shale and Ohio No. 17 Thomson is at total depth of 2,100 feet waiting for cement to cure on 9 5/8-inch casing cemented at that point.

Hiawatha Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Jeff Harkey, wildcat in Schleicher, was drilling below 4,475 feet in sand and shale.

Los Nietos No. 1 C. C. McBurnett is preparing to drill below 563 feet after setting 8 5/8-inch casing at that point.

E. B. Fletcher of Dallas No. 1 Mary O'Harrow Robinson, wildcat in Central-North Schleicher County, has been plugged and abandoned as a failure on total depth of 6,050 feet in the Ellenburger. Drillsite was 20 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Delta Gulf Drilling Company No. 1 F. B. Spence, wildcat in North-Central Schleicher County, has been plugged and abandoned at 5,613 feet in lime after recovering 180 feet of mud only on a one-hour drillstem test at 6,342-6,513 feet. The rig was being moved by Lone Bros., back to the Huldale field this week. Trucking was delayed by the heavy rains Monday.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under sixteen (16) years; and State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions, herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1951, and who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1951, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible for such assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it is shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy blind persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

Proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

Proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper for investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be part of the proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

Proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as are now prescribed by said Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest."

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds shall be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board."

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State: (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation."

All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans for repayment of land as provided to the known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such other regulations as may be now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law."

"All moneys received and which have not been received and which have not been used for payments, or land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or land as provided as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be provided by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall strike or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation therefor.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State.

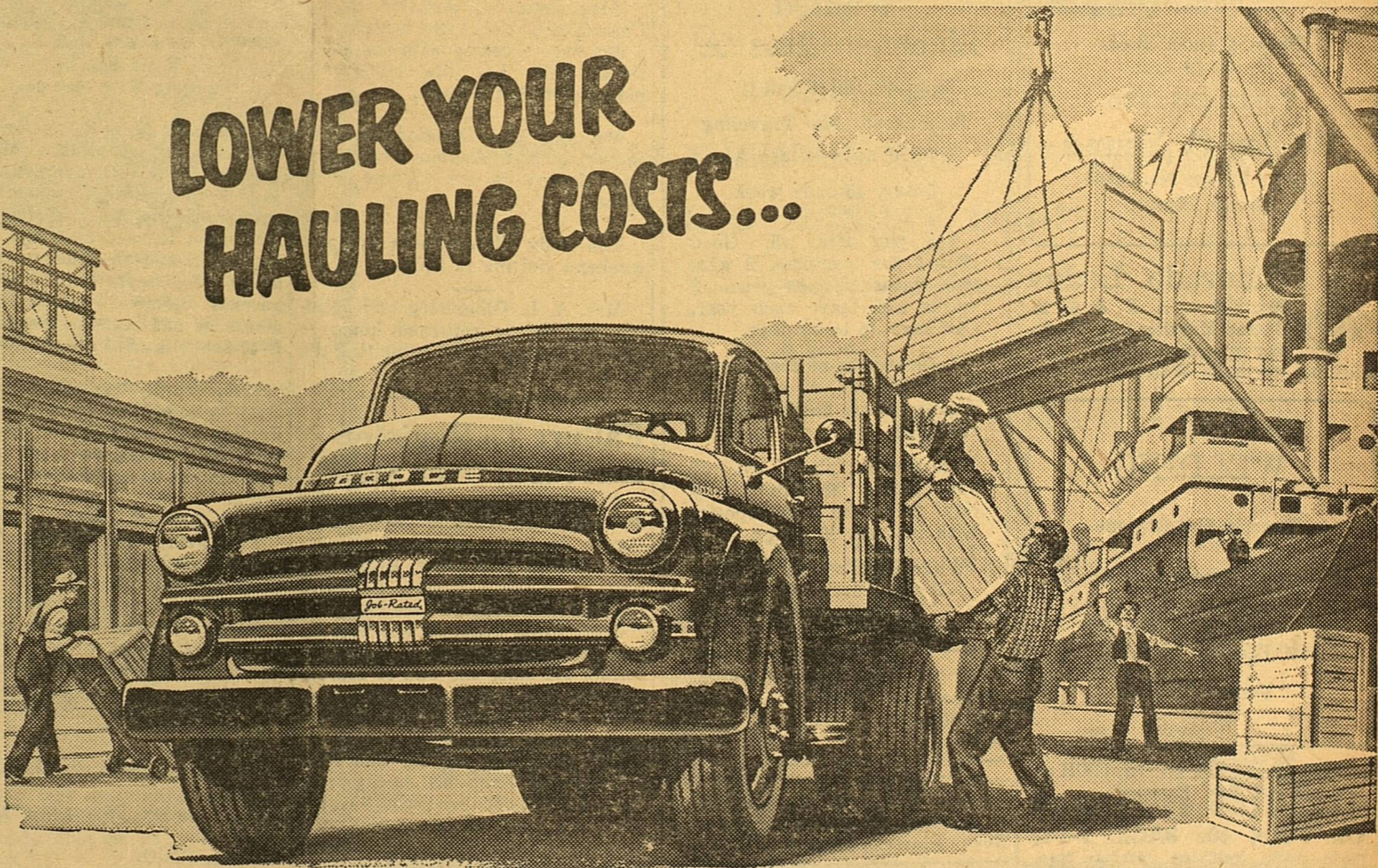

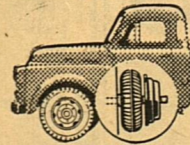

Failure To Register Increases Over State

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 18.—The number of 18-year-old Texans failing to register under the federal draft law is increasing, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said here today.

State draft headquarters records indicate that registration has been falling off since the end of March. General Wakefield estimated that 2,000 to 2,500 18-year olds currently are unregistered.

"We've been watching this situation closely since late spring with the hope that the trend would stop," the state draft director said. "We have asked the local draft boards to act under a provision of the regulations whereby a letter may be sent to men in their communities suspected of being delinquent under the law."

General Wakefield reminded males subject to registration of penalties if convicted of failure to comply with the law. He quoted from a section of the law providing maximum penalties of fine up to \$10,000 and imprisonment up to five years.

Under the draft act, all 18-year-old males are required to register with the nearest draft board on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

"It's up to local boards whether or not they want to turn any man over to federal district attorneys for prosecution," the state Selective Service director said. "Our board members are patient, considerate men, and usually give a man better than a fair chance, if he's willing to co-operate."

"If the registration record does not improve within the next two or three months, we're going to advise the boards to be a little tougher than in the past. After all, the man who doesn't register on time isn't pulling his share of the load our people are carrying. He isn't being fair to the man who does register on time."

"A man is dealing fairly with his neighbors if he obeys the law just as they do. We hope parents and public-spirited citizens will keep 18-year-old men reminded of their responsibilities under the law," General Wakefield concluded.

**U. S. Officials Aiding Back-to-School Plan**

SAN ANTONIO — With most public schools opening next month, officials of the U. S. Department of Labor already are turning their attention to the labor and employment of young citizens, particularly those under 16.

Despite the national crisis, they want boys and girls to continue their education because prominent figures everywhere contend that good schooling makes a happier adult, a better wage earner, a finer citizen, and, if necessary, a more efficient soldier.

Jack G. High, supervisor of the Wage-Hour and Public Contracts Divisions of the U. S. Department of Labor here, points out that Federal laws prohibiting child labor now apply in all states to all children under 16 years of age employed on farms producing crops for interstate commerce (other than their parent's farm) when school is in session.

Local resident children as well as migratory alien children are covered by the law, he said. Neither may be employed in agriculture during school hours if they are under 16.

"School hours" as used here, are hours when the school is in session for the district where the child under 16 is currently living, he explained. The law, amended by Congress in 1949, gives children in agriculture its full protection during school hours if the crop is for interstate commerce.

Official figures show that more than three million teen-agers held summer jobs this year. In the past, two-thirds of those employed in the summer continued to work full- or part-time during the school year. They didn't go back to school.

THE LAST chapter in one of the biggest political upsets in recent years was written last week when a Senate committee reported its findings following a prolonged investigation of the Butler-Tydings senatorial campaign in Maryland. The report found that Butler defeated the veteran Tydings by the use of skulduggery galore last Fall, but decided there is nothing that can be done about it.

But lessons are learned, though belatedly so far as the public is concerned. The Committee found that Butler and his crowd (one of whom has been convicted) engaged in a dirty, shabby political campaign, marked by violation of law, cynical disregard for truth, pure fakery and flim-flam designed to mislead and confuse the voters.

The report condemns the lies and slanders used against Tydings, and says: "Such campaign methods and tactics are destroying our system of free elections and undermine the very foundation of our Government."

One of the deceptions employed was the use and distribution of hundreds of thousands of "composite" pictures of Tydings and Wm. Z. Foster, Communist leader. It showed the two in close pleasant conversation, whereas in truth it was photographic trickery by merging pictures of each man, thus showing them face to face. Actually Tydings and Foster were never together and their pictures were never made together.

The Senate Committee, by unanimous approval of both Republicans and Democrats, concluded that while the Butler campaign violated the rules of ordinary decency, with Senator Butler's knowledge, standards of decency in political campaigns are not defined in Senate rules. Therefore, to make such rules and attempt to convict Senator Butler for their violation now would, the Committee found, contradict the spirit if not the letter of the Constitution relating to ex post facto laws. The Committee then urged the Senate to consider the establishment of some basic rules of decency which candidates for Federal office must adhere to during a campaign, or suffer the consequences.

In fact, the report went so far as to suggest that the use of "defamatory literature" in a campaign should be grounds for disqualifying the winner.

It just goes to show how the innocent public may, by such tactics, be misled and defrauded out of their votes if they don't watch out.
