## ALLIANCE PLANS THANKSGIVING JOINT SERVICE

The Ministerial Alliance of Eldorado will sponsor a joint Thanksgiving service, Thursday morning, at 8:00, November 22, in the high school auditorium. The pastors who have made the plans state that the service will be one hour long.

## Schleicher County Oil News

The recently opened Neva West-Pennsylvania field of central-north Schleicher County gained its second producer this week with the completion of Wesley W. West of Houston No. 2 Mrs. Christina Mittel. This new well completed for a daily flowing potential of 608 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil through an 18-64 inch tubing choke and from perforations at 6399-54 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing cemented at 6376 feet. Those perforations had been treated with 500 gallons of acid.

Gas-oil ration was 818-1 and flowing tubing pressure was 325 pounds on tubing and 835 pounds on casing.

No. 2 West is 1,650 feet from north and 1667 feet from east lines of section 77, block TT, TC survey. That puts it one location northwest of West No. 1 Mittel, the discovery well of the field.

Pan American and Taylor Refining No. 1-B Mittel, southeast offset to No. 1 Mittel, was flowing to pits to clean at last report after 20,000 gallons of acid was injected into the Pennsylvania through perforations at 6290-6310 feet.

Location is at the center of the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 78, block TT, TC survey.

Bobby Manziel of Tyler and Skylar Oil Corporation of Shreveport No. 1-53 University, wildcat in northwest Schleicher County, has been temporarily abandoned for the second time after failing to find production in the Wolfcamp section from 1,820-26 feet. Five hundred gallons of mud acid and 1,000 gallons of regular acid were injected into the above zone. Swabbing tests failed to develop commercial production. Previously the wildcat had been abandoned in the Ellenburger at 8036 feet.

Delta Gulf Drilling Co. No. 2 Mary Lee Fowler, project on the north side of the Huldale-Strawn field of north-central Schleicher County, flowed naturally 36 barrels of oil the first hour of a production test through a 1/4 inch tubing choke. At last report the assured oiler was still testing.

Other Schleicher County projects and their progress are: Ohio No. 9 Thomson is drilling at 4431 feet in shale. Ohio No. 13 Thomson is drilling at 4514 feet in shale. Pan American No. 1 McWhorter is drilling at 4300 feet in shale. Standard of Texas No. 2-2 H. F. Thomson, drilling at 2297 feet in shale and Standard No. 2-1 McWhorter, drilling below 458 feet in shale.

G. W. Strake No. 1 Mrs. C. R. Judkins, wildcat in southeast Schleicher, has been plugged and abandoned at 6015 feet in lime, dolomite and shale. Location was nine miles east and slightly south of the south end of the Page-Strawn field.

Hundreds of Schleicher County fans made the 80-mile trip to Junction Friday night and were well repaid for their trip as they watched the Eldorado Eagles grind down the strong Junction team to a score of 14 to 6.

It was a hard-fought game, and most of the fans declared that they didn't "feel easy" until the end of the third quarter. Junction made more first-downs than Eldorado, and more yards on rushing, but the Eagles took advantage of the breaks when the breaks came and made them pay off.

The first quarter ended with no scores for either side. In the second quarter Craig intercepted a Junction pass and ran it 16 yards back for a touchdown. Nixon, as usual, kicked the extra point.

Early in the third period, Eldorado began a sustained march from the 29 yard line with Nixon making the payoff run from 11 yards out.

In the middle of the fourth quarter, Bennett Ragsdale smashed over from the one-yard line for Junction's only touchdown. Ragsdale had set up the winning drive when he returned a punt from his own five to Eldorado's 45. Horsey Murr attempted to buck across the extra point but was stopped at the line of scrimmage.

The Junction team has been considered one of Eldorado's more critical opponents in the District 6-A competition. Now, with Junction out of the way, there is only one team left that has an undefeated record to match Eldorado's and that team is Eden.

The Eden-Eldorado game is the last district game of the season and will be played at Eldorado on November 18.

**Oil Helps Country**

Coke county citizens join the state and nation in observing Oil Progress Week, October 14 to 20.

Texans know the oil story well. As home folks in the oil country they share the oil industry's pride in supplying the resource that powers a major share of the country's industries, all its airplanes and automobiles, most of its ships and trains.

The greatest benefit to the public as a whole is the enormous increase in taxes. This year oil properties have a taxing valuation

which is two thirds of the county total. Coke county's combined assessed value is \$14,991,010, and oil pays on \$10,002,230 of that amount. Sun is by far the biggest of the oil concerns. Its taxing valuation this year is \$6,451,350, and it will pay the Coke county tax collector the enormous sum of \$178,550.60. —Robert Lee Observer.

Pecos County, second largest in area in the State of Texas, seventh in rank in total production of oil, and 10th largest producer for the calendar year 1950, observes Oil Progress Week, with new development on many fronts. —Fort Stockton Pioneer.
