## Students Will Register Tomorrow; Classwork Starts Monday Morning

Registration tomorrow will kick off another year for Schleicher County's consolidated public schools when the busses make their regular runs, it was announced this week by T. E. Holcomb, superintendent. Classes start Monday morning, September 3, and will run until 3:45 in the afternoon.

The schedule announced last week still stands, it was stated: Seniors register tomorrow at 9:00 a.m.; Juniors, 9:45; Sophomores, 10:30; Freshmen, 11:15; grades 7 and 8, 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. Grade school students register at 9:00 in their home rooms.

School opening assembly will be held in the auditorium Tuesday, Sept. 4, at 9:00 a.m. School officials have invited the public.

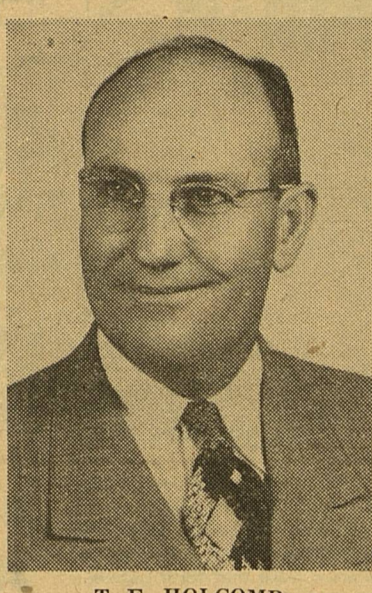
### Colored School

## Dr. Maginot Prescribes For Ecuador Patient via Radio

Dr. Robert Maginot had the experience Saturday afternoon of prescribing treatment for a patient suffering from an illness in Ecuador, South America.

It all started when E. H. Topliffe, one of Schleicher County's ham radio operators, happened to turn on his short wave receiver and heard a planter in Ecuador trying to reach the Canal Zone to get medical advice for a patient. When no one in Canal Zone answered, Topliffe answered to see if he could be of help.

At the request from Ecuador for medical advice, Topliffe called Dr.

Maginot, who subsequently came down to Top's ham shack and prescribed treatment and medicine for the patient, thousands of miles away, over the two-way short wave hookup.

Top says this is the first experience of this kind for either him or the doctor, and that he was glad he happened to turn on his receiver when he did.

Ecuador is not the farthest country Topliffe has picked up on his short wave, he says. He once tuned in a station in New Zealand, and believes he once received an operator in England, very faintly.

## Pan Am Providing Huldale Oil Outlet

Pan American Pipe Line Co., of Houston, is providing a pipeline outlet for the two Huldale fields.

Known as the Huldale Gathering System, Pan American Pipe Line Co.'s outlet for the time being will consist of approximately four miles of 6-inch main line and approximately six miles of 4-inch laterals. It will deliver crude to the Republic Pipe Line Co., which already serves the North Huldale field, with six completed wells. The short lines from both Huldale fields connect with Republic's 4-inch, 38-mile carrier that extends from the Susan Peak field in southeastern Tom Green County past the Huldale fields on the west to Shell Pipe Line Co.'s Eldorado station.

The Huldale Gathering System has been built under the direction of V. T. Tracy, division superintendent for Pan American Pipe Line Co. at Snyder. Eventually, Pan American will lay a line about 15 miles long from the Huldale Gathering System to the Rancho Pipe Line Co.'s projected 24-inch trunk carrier from McCamey to Shell's Deer Park refinery on the Houston ship channel. A 26-inch Pan American line leads from the Deer Park refinery to Pan American's refinery at Texas City.

The Rancho Pipe Line from McCamey to the Houston ship channel will be built by Shell, Sinclair, Pan American, Crown Central Petroleum Co. and Eastern States Petroleum Co., with Shell the operator. It virtually will parallel a Shell 10-inch line and a Humble 18-inch line.

## Work Started On Drive-In Theatre

### Oil News

Early this week the fifteenth producing well was added to the Huldale-Strawn field of Central North Schleicher County.

The new oiler is Delta Gulf Drilling Company No. 3-B H. L. Thomson estate.

It was completed for a daily flowing potential of 288 barrels of 39.9-gravity oil and no water. The final was taken on a 3-16-inch tubing choke. Production is from open hole between 5,725 and 5,745 feet. Tubing pressure was 710 pounds. Pressure on casing was 1,250 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 820-1.

Location is 1,671 feet from north and 2,748 feet from east lines of section 82, block TT, TC survey.

G. W. Strake No. 2 Forrest Runge, indicated seventh producer in the North Huldale field, recovered 2,250 feet of oil following a 16-minute drillstem test from 5,533 to 5,611 feet. There was no formation water.

This test has flowed oil at the rate of 15 to 20 barrels per hour. When completed it will extend the field one location to the east. Casing, five and one-half-inch, has been cemented on bottom at 5,611 feet.

The Grey-Wolfe Company No. 1 Mrs. W. F. Edmiston, wildcat in the center of the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 34, block K, GH&SA survey and 16 1/2 miles southeast of Eldorado, is at total depth of 409 feet waiting for cement to cure on 10 3/4-inch surface pipe.

Hiawatha Oil & Gas Company and Dan Auld No. 1 Jeff Harkey, wildcat at the center of the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 77, block H, GH&SA survey and seven and 3/4-miles east of the North Huldale field, was at total depth at last report with operator pulling tool after a drillstem test of the Canyon sand.

On the test, tool was open two hours. Gas surfaced in 45 minutes. When operator had pulled 300 stands of drillpipe it started mud and some oil. No estimate has been made on the amount of oil.

The Canyon sand was topped at 4,845 feet.

The test was made in the interval from 4,832 to 4,982 feet.

In the Huldale field, Ohio No. 12 Thomson was drilling at 5,579 feet in lime. Ohio No. 14 Thomson was drilling at 3,051 in lime. Ohio No. 15 Thomson was drilling below 2,475 feet in shale. The same operators No. 17 Thomson was progressing below 2,891 feet in lime.

Standard No. 17 Thomson is being drilled below 5,643 feet in lime and shale.

American Republics No. 4 Thomson is being dug below 5,522 feet in shale.

Ohio took on Mertzon and both teams played fast and tight ball. The score resulted finally in Ohio 4 and Mertzon 1. In the next game the City did not do quite so well, and came out with the short end of a 13 to 6 score against Christoval.

### \$100 SHY

A pretty nice collection was taken up in the crowd, and the money was used to apply on the cost of installing the lights. The managers say they are still shy about \$100, but with continued public support they expect soon to be out of the red.

On Sunday Ohio Oilers played Christoval and Ohio was again the winner—13 to 9.

Delbert Edmiston announced late last week the purchase of seven acres of land near the Menard highway, and completed arrangements with Alex McKenzie, manager of the Southwestern Theatre Equipment Co., of Houston for the installation of a complete drive in theatre for Eldorado.

The new theatre will be located on land lying north of the new county barn, on land which Edmiston bought from the county. In the deal for the land the county will provide for a 4-lane driveway for entrance and exit, and the county agreed to level off the land, since part of the 7-acre tract has been a caliche pit. A county bulldozer has been at work on the block since last week.

It was expected that construction of the screen tower would get under way this week by local carpenters.

Mr. McKenzie stated that his company had signed a contract for complete installation of theatre equipment, and that he would be here to give the job his personal attention. According to the manager of the supply company, the equipment selected by Edmiston is the best that can be bought. The theatre will be designed for 400 cars, with individual loud speakers for each car and each speaker having its own volume control.

Edmiston reported that the name selected for the theatre will be "The Eagle Drive-In Theatre" and he predicted that it would be open for business on or before the first of October. He also stated that film producers have already been contacted and a supply of films has been assured of a type that the patrons will enjoy.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, need blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including his spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1951, who has disposed of bona fide real property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy blind persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State under a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor therefor.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11a, thereof to be designated as Section 11b, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested in any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 2

proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 28, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature, provided that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 28, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest."

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teachers' retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board."

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation."

All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War I, and to Texas Veterans of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law."

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds provided for in this Act, and ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay the principal interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the principal interest on the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, constitute an all county obligation of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds hereafter authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

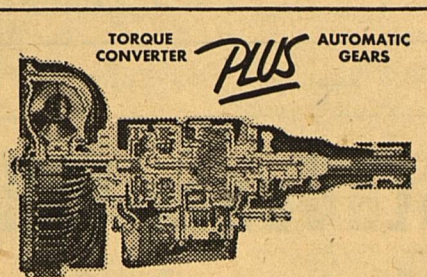
"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation therefor.

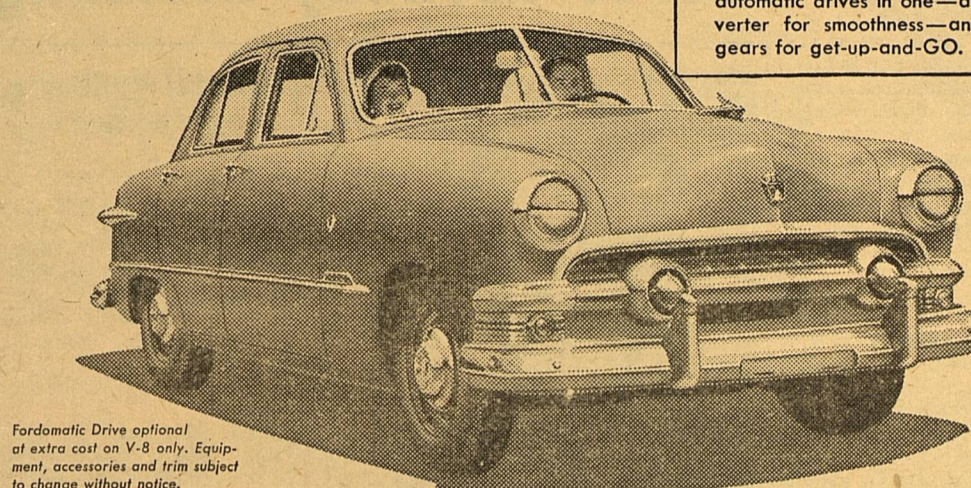

**Farmer-Rancher Open Meeting Is Announced**

You Can Help Determine It  
The Department of Agriculture thinks the family farm is so vital to the economy, prosperity, and military defense of the nation that it is reviewing all of its programs and activities to make sure that they are serving the family farm well—and to find out how they can serve it better.

We need the help of everyone interested in agriculture. You can start helping by reading this.  
**What Is Family Farming?**  
In a country as diversified as the United States, farms and ranches vary widely from place to place, but the pattern of agricultural production and living which has been known for many years as "family farming" lends itself to the following brief definition:

A family farm or ranch is one which provides the main source of income for the farm family, or which the farm operator (owner or tenant) or members of his family make most of the managerial decisions, participate regularly in farm work, and normally supply a substantial part of the labor needed to operate the farm.

This covers probably 98 percent of the farming units in the United States, as of the 1945 census, excluding part-time farms, share-crop units, and other operations which may be farms in name only and do not contribute to the bulk of their operators' incomes.

Ownership is not absolutely required for family farming, but it is definitely a goal. Family farming is not only the traditional democratic pattern of land occupancy, but it is also desirable because production increases as security of tenure increases. Ownership by the family operating the farm has historically brought better stewardship of the soil and water resources through sounder attention to conservation.

Measured in acres, family farms or ranches differ in size, even within a farming area, influenced by the crops and livestock produced and the productivity of the land. In fact, one characteristic of family farming is its adaptability to the changing patterns of production. Another is that the home activities of the family are combined with operation of the farm. The family farm builds strong communities—communities where tolerance, co-operation, self-reliance, and a love of freedom thrive.

**Purpose of This Review**  
Because the family farm is the center of the goal for improved agriculture in peace or in war, we are reviewing the farm programs to be sure that they are effectively serving the family farm. This is just one phase of the constant appraisal and reappraisal of our programs, policies, and operations that are essential to the Department's rendering maximum service to the farmers and the nation. In this period of mobilization, the well-operated family farm is the target at which we must aim in making the wisest, most efficient use of such critical items as farm machinery, pesticides, and fertilizer. In the hands of such farmers, the tools of production will be used effectively and conserved carefully, for the well-operated family farm can be depended upon in good weather or bad, famine or plenty, and war or peace.

The American family farm is one of the nation's main exhibits in the world struggle for men's minds and one of the examples we hold out for all the world to see. We seek to extend the benefits and advantages of our system to rural populations elsewhere. To be successful in this, we should make sure that our own pattern is the best possible one. Hence, we must hold the mirror up to ourselves, while we urge people of other countries to view the American family farm picture.

**The Next Step**  
We're asking that everyone who is seriously interested in agriculture take a new look at all the farm programs and activities, using the family farm concept as a measuring stick. Perhaps you won't agree in all, or even in most, essentials with the thinking of the Department's committees. That's democracy. The important thing is for you to think about this matter and express your thoughts.

Please do YOUR part in thinking about the needs and problems of family farms in your neighborhood. How do YOU think our farm policies and programs should be improved to help family farms and farm families make their full contribution to the strength and security of a free America?

Agencies of the Department of Agriculture, serving the farms and ranches of Schleicher County are: Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Production and Marketing Administration, Rural Electrification Administration, and the Farmers Home Administration, and Farm Credit Administration.

Other agencies of the department included in the review are Agricultural Research Administration, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Office of Information, Forestry Service, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, and Commodity Exchange Authority.
