Brain Tumor Is Fatal to Lorraine Dildine

Lorraine Dildine lost her valiant two-year fight against illness, her death occurring early Saturday morning at the family home where she had been invalided following two brain operations. A high school student when she first became ill, she was only a little past 16 when death claimed her. The odds had been against her from the start.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2:00 at the Ratliff Funeral Home, and the body was later taken to Johnson City for a second funeral Sunday, and burial. Rev. Clifford Nelson and Rev. Roy Shilling were the pastors in charge here, the former reading the scriptures and offering prayer and the latter delivering a short sermon. Rev. Nelson also read some of the poetry which she had written during her illness, in which she expressed her faith and her confidence in an after-life.

At Johnson City, the Rev. Warren Capps was the officiating pastor at the funeral, which was held in a funeral home there. Pall bearers were Cecil Oren, and W. B. Dildine of Llano and Nolen Haley of Johnson City, cousins of Lorraine, and Herman Heckel of Bertram and Rector Heckel of San Antonio. The honorary pall bearers were Len Cox, and Tom Johnson of Johnson City and Ferd Bremer and Adolph Wolfe of Blanco. A choir from the churches sang three of Lorraine's favorite hymns. Make Me a Channel of Blessing, Beyond the Sunset, and Asleep in Jesus. The pastor read some of her poems and comments on the Scriptures.

Among those attending attending the funeral was the nurse who was present at Lorraine's birth, and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Sank Wood, of San Antonio.

She was born in San Antonio, September 17, 1935, to Mr. and Mrs. Thad Dildine, second of the three daughters born to the couple. When she was a month old the

family moved to Johnson City where they lived several years, then moved to Burnet for several years' residence, after which they moved back to Johnson City. Lorraine started to school a day before she was five years old. Her father, T. B. Dildine, was sheriff at Johnson City for six years.

In November, 1948, the Dildine family moved to Schleicher county, and took up residence on the Thomson T Circle Ranch, where Mr. Dildine is still employed. Lorraine entered school here, enrolling in the Freshman Class.

During her sophomore year she began to show signs of the illness from which she never completely recovered. In the summer of 1950 she was taken to San Antonio for removal of a brain tumor; by autumn she was able to return to school, but again her health failed, and she stopped school after six weeks in her Junior year. Last May she had a second serious operation which was similar to her first one; from this she did not recover, and she had been in a coma much of the time through the autumn months, with the exception of a short period during which she seemed to rally.

She is survived by her parents, an older sister, Mrs. Lowell Elles of San Angelo, and Romona, who is younger. Also surviving is a step grandmother, Mrs. O. J. Nowotny of Blanco.

She was a member of the First Baptist church of Eldorado, joining during the ministry of the Rev. Jim Hays. A good student, she occupied her time while ill with writing of poems and prayers, one of which she left for her parents when she underwent surgery the second time. This reads:

"Do not weep for me when I am gone beyond the blue,
I'll be up there waiting for you
In that lovely mansion in the sky
Where we'll all meet again in the
sweet bye and bye."

Oil News

C. L. Norsworthy, Jr., of Dallas start drilling this week on a new Southwest Schleicher County wildcat. It is No. 1 W. A. Davis Estate, 660 feet from north and east lines of section 61, block D, GC&SP survey. That puts it 11 1/4 miles southwest of Eldorado.

The wildcat is spudded with cable tools and will commence drilling to contract depth of 8,000 feet as soon as surface pipe is cemented into the hole. The 8,000-foot destination is calculated to take the venture into the Ellenburger.

Stanolind farmed out 10 quarter section to Norsworthy for drilling of the wildcat.

Taylor Refining Company and Charles B. Renaud of Dallas No. 1 G. C. Crosby, 18 miles southeast of Eldorado has been spudded as a wildcat and is now drilling below 100 feet with cable tools. This exploration will be taken to around 5,500 feet for a test of the Pennsylvania.

Gray-Wolfe No. 1 Margaret W. Hicks, three-quarter-mile south outpost to the lone producer in the Oliver-Strawn field, is digging below 100 feet.

Taylor Refining Company No. 1 Tissue Wardlaw, wildcat 20 miles southeast of Eldorado, was making more hole below 1,352 feet in lime. This test is slated for a 6,000-foot bottom.

Skelly, Monarch and Southland Royalty No. 1 W. A. Davis Estate, project at the east side of the Huldale pool, 10 miles north of Eldorado, is drilling below 3,020 feet in lime.

Also in the Huldale area, Ohio Oil Company No. 16 Thomson is drilling below 3,741 feet in lime and shale. The same operators No. 22 Thomson, in the same area, was drilling below 3,451 feet in sandy lime and shale.

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 1-2 Fowler, is reaming at 580 feet in red beds.

Fullerton Oil Company No. 1 Lea Allison, wildcat in Central Sutton County, is drilling below 5,323 feet in the Strawn reef lime. That formation was topped at 5,323 feet, on a datum point of minus 3,717 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 65, block B, HE&WT survey. That puts it 11 miles southeast of Sonora.

Fullerton No. 1 McIntosh, wildcat 11 1/2 miles southeast of Eldorado, is drilling below 2,504 feet in sand and shale.

The Gray-Wolfe Company of Houston plugged and abandoned its No. 1 Al P. Groebel, Central Schleicher County wildcat on total depth of 6,012 feet in the Strawn.

Recovery on the last drillstem test, from 5,755 to 6,012 feet, was 240 feet of mud, 480 feet of gas-cut mud and 960 feet of gas-cut salt water. The Strawn was topped as 5,752 feet, elevation, 2,404 feet. Location was at the center of the southeast quarter of the north-southwest quarter of section 5, block M, GH&SA survey.

ATTEND NEPHEW'S FUNERAL

A. J. Halbert has returned from Ft. Worth, where he attended the funeral of his nephew, Clifford Donoho, who was killed, along with his fiancée, in a car accident. The driver of the car, W. D. Courtney, also injured, is another nephew. Relatives from Buchanan brought Halbert back after the funeral, which was held on Saturday.

Dr. Robert Maginot announced this week that he has made arrangements to move in and take over the Holcomb Clinic, upon the departure of Dr. Holcomb, who announced last week that he was moving to El Paso.

The change-over is tentatively set for January 1, but Holcomb is in El Paso this week working out details there, and it is possible that the move may be made some time before the first.

"I am ready," said Maginot, "to move in the minute Dr. Holcomb is able to leave."

Dr. Maginot explained that the equipment he now has in his own clinic will be moved to the new location—most of Holcomb's equipment going with him to El Paso. The building which Maginot now occupies—known as the Roach building—will be up for rent to a suitable tenant.

"I shall expect to keep about the same staff that Holcomb has employed," Maginot said, "and will be prepared to take care of emergency surgery and obstetrics."

The Holcomb Clinic and Hospital has built up a wide practice in the past several years under the direction of Dr. M. G. Holcomb, and the people of this county will be glad to learn that the establishment will continue in competent hands.
