

transacted, an Ordinance was passed, regulating the peddlers of any and all merchandise as follows:

- No Person, Firm, Company, Corporation or Section 1 Association shall be permitted to peddle fruits, vegetables, dry goods, silverware, or any other type of merchandise, without first being issued a permit from the City of Eldorado, Texas.
- Section 2 No Person, Firm, Company, Corporation, or Association shall be permitted to sell or solicit subscriptions to magazines of any kind, without first being issued a permit from the City of Eldorado, Texas.
- Section 3 It shall be unlawful for any Person or Persons, to allow chickens or any kind of fowl to run loose within the City limits of the City of Eldorado, Texas.

If the above laws are not adhered to there shall be a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

These Ordinances will take precedence over any other Ordinances previously passed.



Mr. Kendrick said the weather balloon and instruments had been turned loose at the Big Spring Municipal airport the day before. -Eden Echo.






