

Texas Schools Face Increased Numbers

AUSTIN — Texas schools are facing one of the most critical periods in their history, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers association, said recently as he outlined pressing needs for new buildings and more teachers over the entire state.

The school population, particularly on the elementary level, is growing at an alarming rate, he pointed out. For example, births in Texas in 1945—this year's first graders—numbered 156,000. In 1947, births in the Lone Star State jumped to 197,000, an increase of 65,000. If this additional group could be divided into classes of 30 children each, Texas would still

need 2100 additional teachers and classrooms in just the first and second grades.

And the birthrate continues to climb. In 1950, live births numbered 203,672, and the number for 1951 will exceed that figure.

In addition to the birthrate, educators worry about the size of the graduating class as compared to the number of children entering first grade. For instance, this year 156,000 youngsters crowded into first grade rooms over the state, but only 90,000 graduated from the eighth grade. This left already over-burdened teachers with 66,000 additional children to accommodate in one year.

"The gain is going to continue to increase until at least the 1956-57 school year, Tennyson added. "By that time, the elementary schools must take care of 300,000 children in addition to the ones now enrolled. If 75 per cent of this number enters public schools, it will mean 8654 additional classrooms."

The average cost of each classroom and related facilities now exceeds \$28,000. Thus Texas must spend \$242,312,000 for buildings and facilities alone if the children are to have desirable schools. And this does not take into consideration the need for new facilities to replace undesirable buildings and to relieve already over-crowded conditions. A recent survey made by the Texas Education Agency shows that Texas needs to spend \$504,294,500 to bring school buildings, facilities, sites and busses up

to ideal conditions.

After the 1956-57 school year, the elementary enrollment over the state should begin to level off, but high schools will then face the problems of increased enrollment.

Texas does not face the educational problem alone. A nose count among elementary children over the entire nation showed that grade school population rose nearly three million from 1947 to 1950. In October 1950, the U. S. Census bureau reported that enrollment in all schools and colleges was at an all time high of slightly over 50 million persons. This represents a fifth of the nation's total population and half of the population between 5 and 29 years of age.

ORDINANCE

An Ordinance prohibiting Peddlers without Permits, within the City Limits.

Be it remembered that a regular meeting of the City Council, of the City of Eldorado, Texas, was held on this the 12th day of February, A. D. 1952, at the regular meeting place, with members present To-Wit,

Constituting a quorum, and among other business transacted, an Ordinance was passed, regulating the peddlers of any and all merchandise as follows:

Section 1 No Person, Firm, Company, Corporation or Association shall be permitted to peddle fruits, vegetables, dry goods, silverware, or any other type of merchandise, without first being issued a permit from the City of Eldorado, Texas.

Section 2 No Person, Firm, Company, Corporation, or Association shall be permitted to sell or solicit subscriptions to magazines of any kind, without first being issued a permit from the City of Eldorado, Texas.

Section 3 It shall be unlawful for any Person or Persons, to allow chickens or any kind of fowl to run loose within the City limits of the City of Eldorado, Texas.

If the above laws are not adhered to there shall be a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

These Ordinances will take precedence over any other Ordinances previously passed.

Gas Shut In

The Fort Chadbourne field northeast of Bronte was shut in last Friday morning to prevent the flaring of approximately 11 million cubic feet of gas daily.

The shut-in was ordered by the Railroad Commission of Texas and will remain shut-in until the operators can show either that pressure maintenance is not feasible in the field or that pressure maintenance is being undertaken.

A Railroad Commission engineer inspected the field Friday and re-

ported that all producing companies had complied with the order. All of the field's 217 producing wells were shut in with the exception of two Humble wells which furnish gas for the Humble camp.

Officials of the producing companies had not announced their plans earlier this week.—Bronte Enterprise.

New Building Planned

The Sonora National Farm Loan Association will begin construction on an office building Monday located on the company's property between the office of Dr. Charles F. Browne and the Sonora Men's store.

Construction is to be of clay tile

and stucco, with the front of tan Roman brick. A wide aluminum strip is to run across the front, and aluminum and plate glass door will be installed.—Devil's River News.

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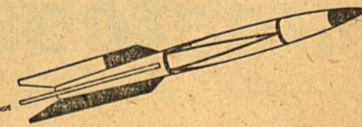
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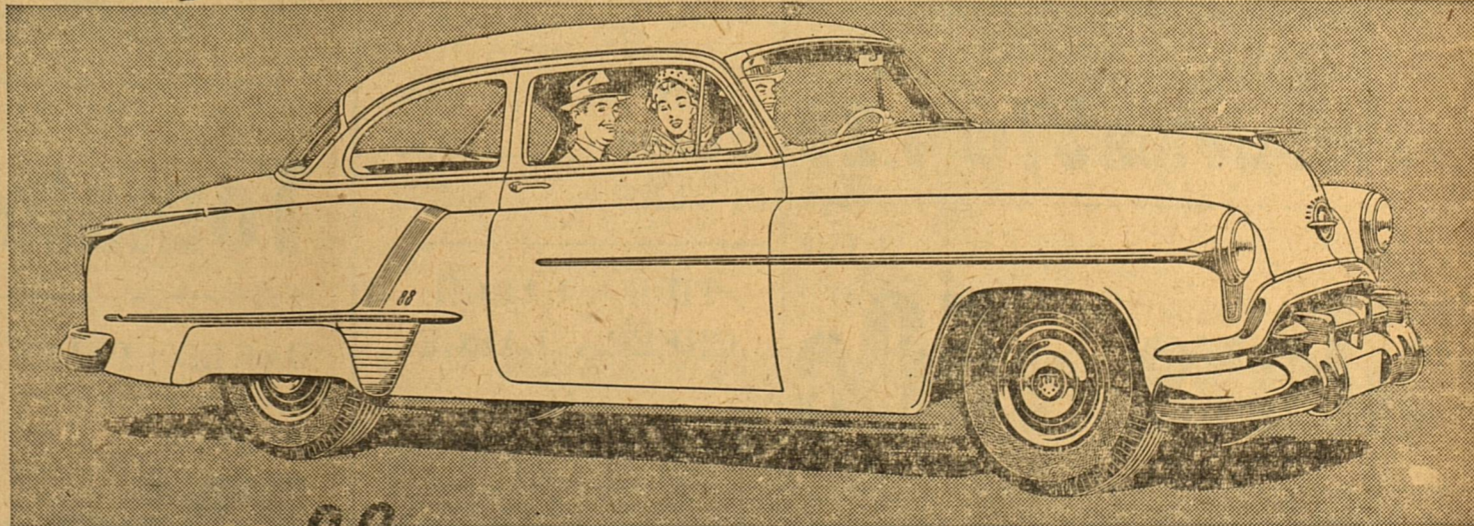
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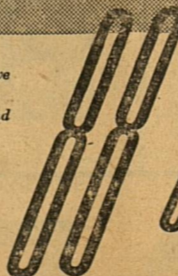
