## RECORD VOTE IS EXPECTED AT ELECTION

An all-time high in absentee voting has been established, with a total of 148 absentee ballots cast in Schleicher County up to closing time Tuesday.

Basing their conclusions on the above figures, political dopsters in Schleicher County are predicting that Saturday's voting will be the heaviest in many years.

Voting boxes in the county are located at the following places:

Precinct No. 1: Main floor in the Memorial building, with Joe Edens in charge.

No. 1A (known as the school-house box) will be held at Tisdale Chevrolet building, with Walter Ramsay as election judge.

Reynolds: Reynolds school house, Buck Davis, judge.

Vermont, at Bob Anderson home, Oran Enochs, judge.

Rudd, at Rudd school house, Otto Williams, judge.

Mayer, at Mayer school house, W. A. Edmondson, judge.

Cliff: at Runge residence, with J. Forrest Runge as judge.

### Four Contests

There are four spirited races for county offices:

C. L. Meador, Jr., the present county judge, is up for re-election against E. W. Craig, who is making his first run for that office.

H. T. Finley, county clerk, has W. A. Schuller as an opponent.

These two races promise to be interesting since all the above candidates have been working hard in the closing weeks of the campaign.

In the commissioner precincts there are two contests: In Precinct No. 1 Halbert, Nixon and Speck are running for first term. (Edgar Spencer, present commissioner, is not up for re-election.)

In Precinct No. 4 we have H. A. Belk, L. Moore and T. C. Meador running for the job. (Moore is the present commissioner.)

Two commissioners, L. G. Edmiston and Carrol White, of Precincts 2 and 3 respectively, are unopposed, as is also Mrs. Mebel Parker, county treasurer, and E. H. Sweatt for Sheriff.

For local and district races, our readers may again review our announcement column on page 4, which is carried for the last time this week.

The polls will be open 13 hours, beginning at 7:00 a. m. and closing at 8:00 p. m. The polls will be open continuously during those hours.

### New Voting Rules

New voting rules require careful study on the part of the voter, as the state puts its new secret ballot ruling into effect.

Present your poll tax receipt when you come to vote—the current poll tax receipt bears the date 1949.

As no election judges are allowed to handle any ballots, each voter must pick up his own ballot, and vote as he desires by drawing a line through each name not wanted, leaving only the name of the person the voter wishes to vote for.

Then turn the ballot over and put your name on the back of the STUB—then remove the stub and fold it with the number on the inside—then fold the ballot twice with the number and writing on the inside, and the name of the presiding judge on the outside—deposit the stub in a box prepared for it—then deposit the ballot.

All of these steps must be taken by the voter—election officials are not expected to handle the ballot.

Directions may be given by the judge, if the voter does not understand the procedure.

Election officials are expecting a rush at the polls during the busy hours of the day Saturday. It is pointed out today that the wise voter will vote EARLY so that election judges, as well as the voters, will avoid being rushed. This will be a factor, as for many people this is the first time to vote under these new rules.

Officials also stress the importance of showing the poll tax receipts. The current tax receipts bear the date of 1949. Unders must bring their exemption receipts.

If for any reason the poll tax receipt or exemption has been lost, make an affidavit to fact that it was paid, and go ahead and vote.

Election officials make this urgent request: Do not ask any election judge how to vote on a race, or inquire how they stand.

Under the secret ballot law, election judges will not be allowed to take ballots to old people driving to the door of the voting place. Voters must take their ballots off the stack and do the voting in person. All who cannot come to the polls for any reason are urged to remember that they should have taken advantage of the absentee voting law.

In general appearance the ballots resemble closely those of other years. A major change is that in a top corner there is a stub, two

## Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District News

Next week is National Farm Safety Week. Even though the week of July 23rd through July 29th has been proclaimed National Farm Safety Week, farm safety should be a family affair 365 days a year.

Did you know that according to estimates made by the National Safety Council farm people sustain about 17,500 fatalities from accidents; 1,500,000 disabling injuries caused by accidents; 35,000 buildings destroyed by fire. The annual losses represented by these accidents and fires are probably around \$1 billion. This cost represents the equivalent of an annual tax of \$35 per vote to every farm resident throughout the country.

Just ahead of us is the busy harvest season which is the time that farm accidents reach the highest point of the year. This is the time in which we should be especially careful with machinery and tools. Numbers of farm workers will be seriously injured or killed because of not following the simple precautions outlined for handling tractors and other farm machinery.

With the coming of winter, fires will be an increasing hazard. We have just had a costly grass fire here in our own district. In this day and time we just can't be too careful whether we are driving a car, tractor or whatever we might be doing.

The 1950 National Farm Safety Theme is: Learn and Obey Farm Safety Rules.

The goal for 1950 is to encourage all farm residents to learn and obey safety rules, bring our farm accident rate down, and reduce the accident rate by 10 percent this year.

If we do the above mentioned things we will prevent 150,000 disabling accidents, save 1,750 lives and save \$1 million.

Some important rules to go by as a basis for our efforts to reduce this heavy annual toll are:

1. Keep walkways and steps in good repair.
  2. Keep ladders in good repair.
  3. Always stop a machine before unclogging, oiling or adjusting it. Keep all machine guards and safety devices in place.
  4. Don't wear loose or flappy clothing around machinery.
  5. Speak to animals when approaching them. Keep them calm by acting with calm self assurance yourself.
  6. Know and obey all traffic laws. Stop driving if you get sleepy. Never ride with a driver who has had a "drink."
  7. Keep your back straight and lift heavy loads with your leg muscles. Don't try to lift anything that is too heavy for you.
  8. Use the right tools for the job, make sure they are in good condition. Keep them in a safe place.
  9. Give prompt attention to even minor injuries.
  10. Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them. Never aim at anything you don't want to shoot.
  11. Don't use kerosene to start fires.
- Make your farm and home a much safer place in which to live by resolving to do things the right way, which simply means the commonsense way.

## Contract Is Signed For New REA Line

Neely Brothers, low bidders on 189 miles of REA line, were here Monday to sign their contract. This contract went to Washington, D. C. by air mail, and officials here expect to receive government approval by July 25.

Neely will complete work at Comanche, Okla., this week, and expect to start work on the project here soon. The line includes 80 miles in northwest Menard, 26 in south Sutton, and 83 in east Crockett.

Today, Thursday, the directors are meeting at the office of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op to work out details for the annual meeting, to be held at the Memorial building on August 10.

Location is 663 feet from north and 467 feet from east line of S½ of NE¼, sec. 71-TT-TCRR. This test has been spudded in and depth this morning is 170 feet. Ben Keyes has built roads and dug cellar for the R. M. Thomson Est. No. 1 C. L. Norsworthy Jr., Lone Star Producing Co. Equipment is not yet on location.

The Webster test is preparing for drillstem testing from 4800 to 5200 feet.

## DRAFT BOARD MEETS TUESDAY IN SONORA

Palmer West of Eldorado, Schleicher County representative on the five county Selective Service Board No. 110, was with the group meeting in Sonora Tuesday. Present were the representatives of Kimble, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton, and Edwards counties, as follows: Joe Logan, chairman of Sonora; Paul Gibbs of Ozona; Hardin Tobin of Rocksprings; Jordan Cunningham of Junction; Palmer West of Eldorado; and Mrs. T. K. Neville of Sonora, clerk.

Selective Service headquarters has called for Board No. 110 to send eight men for physical examination on August 10. The men have been selected by the Board members and they will be notified at an early date.

The Selective Service director issued a warning to those required by law to register who have not registered. He said that registration of all delinquents would be accepted at the present time without report for violation of the law.

The director said that more than 425,000 men between the ages of 18 and 25, inclusive, registered in August and September, 1948, and that approximately 135,000 men have registered since that time as they have reached the age of 18. "These men are registered properly under this law, and they do not have to re-register," Gen. Wakefield said.

General Wakefield pointed out that all men, with a very few exceptions, who fit the following requirements, are legally required to register: Any man born in 1922 after August 30th of that year. Any man born in 1923-24-25-26-27-28-29-30 and 1931. Any man who has reached the age of 18 born in 1932. Males are required to register on their 18th birthdays or within five days thereafter.

"It makes no difference if a man has ever been in the armed forces," General Wakefield said, "no matter when he was in, if he was born during the times stated, he must register under the draft law."

Announcement has been made that 25-year-olds will be called first, and that from there on down it is hoped none will have to be called under the age of 22.

Only men aged 19 to 25 inclusive can be drafted under the present Selective Service act, as authorized by Congress. The law says that every American male must register on his 18th birthday although he cannot be called until he is 19.

It is pointed out that not many men can be drawn from the 25 and 24 age brackets, as many of them are exempted veterans of War II. Many previously classified in 1-A will have to be reclassified because some have wives and children by now.

There is litigation pending in the District Court of Gaines County with reference to shortage of acreage in our school lands. Inexperience in handling this matter could cause considerable loss to this legacy handed down to the school children of this county.

Large appropriations for Farm-to-Market roads have been secured for this county and the destination of the different projects was decided by the Commissioners Court in cooperation with the State Highway Department. The location of these roads is entirely up to the State Highway engineers. The last appropriation of \$110,000.00 covering a project of 14 miles from 3 miles west of Eldorado to the Crockett County line is at stake due to a controversy over the location of same. A change in this office at this time could mean the loss of the above amount of money appropriated by the State for the construction of this road project.

Badly needed roads leading to Highway No. 151 in the east end of the county are under consideration of the Commissioners Court at this time and I am confident that an agreement can be made whereby at least one of these roads can be completed this year.

I also feel that my experience as co-ordinator for this county during World War II will be of value to the citizens of Schleicher County in the event of a third World War.

**Fruit Upside Down Cake**  
Broadcast: July 22, 1950  
¼ cup butter or margarine  
½ cup brown sugar  
No. 2½ can fruit cocktail, well drained  
1 package white cake mix\*  
½ cup Pet Milk  
½ cup water
