History of Society Reviewed by Members

The Pioneer Womens Home Missionary Society met Monday evening, August 21, in the home of Mrs. V. G. Tisdale to celebrate their 48th anniversary. Mrs. Luke Thompson was in charge of the program and Mrs. Roy Shilling led the devotional.

Four charter members of the organization's first society were present: Mrs. Frank Murcherson of San Angelo, and Mrs. Lottie Hill Conner, Mrs. Pearl McCartney Jones, and Mrs. Roxa Ingram Tisdale, Eldorado.

Mrs. V. G. Tisdale gave a brief outline of the history of the society from 1885 to 1910 and a report on the society's organization in 1902 in the home of her mother, Mrs. W. E. Ingram. Charter members at that time were: Mrs. W. B. Silliman, now of Midland; Mrs. Whitfield of San Angelo; Mrs. Hayner, Mrs. Ingram, Mrs. Corether, Mrs. P. H. McCormick, Mrs. C. C. Doty, Mrs. G. A. Neill, Misses Alma and Bert McCartney, Misses Mabel and Letha Emery, Miss Scottie Ingram, Misses Lee, Mittie, and Tommie Fields, Miss Carrie Boter, Mrs. Murcherson, Mrs. Conner, Mrs. Jones, and Mrs. Tisdale.

A letter was read from the first president of the society, Mrs. W. B. Silliman, who listed the following as the organization's first officers: Mrs. Silliman, president; Mrs. P. H. McCormick, first vice president; Mrs. W. E. Ingram, 2nd vice president; Miss Lee Fields, secretary; Miss Lottie Hill, treasurer; and Miss Mittie Fields, chairman of membership drive.

Another letter from Mrs. Sill-

man, written in 1927 to Miss Tom Pearl Smith, told of the organization of the society when Rev. Drake was pastor of the church, and its affiliation in 1905 when Rev. Payne was pastor.

Mrs. Murcherson, who was at the organizing meeting of the society, stated that Mrs. Evans, a Methodist minister's wife visiting here at that time, assisted the society in organizing. Mrs. Lottie Conner told of the many miles the young people walked raising funds for the new society. Mrs. Jones spoke of the many dinners the organization helped prepare and serve for different affairs, including those on the first day of district court.

Mrs. Ben Hext gave a brief account of the organization of the first young peoples missionary society in 1935, which later merged with the older organization. Mrs. J. E. Tisdale told of the re-organizing and re-naming of the society into the Womens Society of Christian Service in 1940.

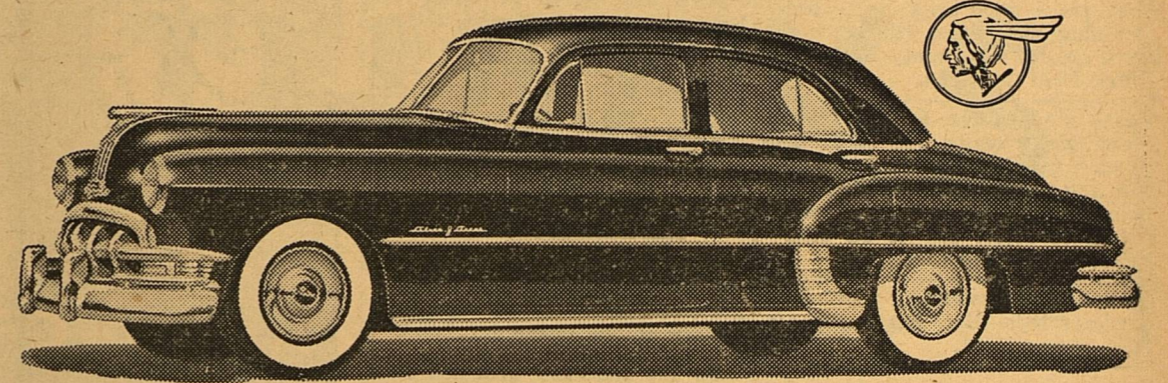



Draft Boards Cannot Answer All Questions

Austin.—Two of the most prevalent questions which men are asking state draft boards now are: "When will I have to take my physical exam?" and "When will I be drafted?"

"These are two questions which local boards cannot answer," Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today, in commenting on queries which are coming in to the draft boards.

"These two questions can't be answered," the state director continued, "because there are too many intangible factors involved."

General Wakefield listed some of the reasons why local boards can't answer these questions:

1. Local boards do not know whether calls will be for an increased number of men or not.
2. Local boards cannot tell how many of their registrants will be found acceptable for military service or how many will be rejected.
3. Local boards cannot tell whether the world situation will improve or get worse.
4. Local boards cannot tell how many men will enlist for service in the armed forces now and in the future.

The state director urged men not to ask these two questions. At the same time he called upon registrants to be alert and advise of changes of address and status.

Gibbs Field Inspected

A six-man inspection team from Scott Field, Ill., headquarters of the training command, United States Air Forces, last Friday inspected Gibbs Field and its buildings with a view to possible reactivation in the Air Forces expanded training program.

The inspecting officers of the Air Forces, and civilian engineers, found buildings at the Field in good shape, considering the six years of disuse through which they have gone, and praised the manner in which the property had been kept together and retained as a complete building and land unit.

The inspection last Friday was in the nature of a physical inventory of facilities as they exist today, and results of the survey of the field and the community were forwarded to Washington through the Scott Field headquarters in a report filed by the inspection team.

Gibbs Field, along with Mathis Field at San Angelo and Midland Air Field, were on the list of former military installations of this area which could be returned to air forces training activity under an expanded defense program. — Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

Linotype Operator Called

Clarence Wiseman, linotype operator of the Menard News, was called to active duty in the U. S. Air Force this week.

Wiseman received orders Tuesday telling him to report for active duty Monday, Aug. 21, at Brooks Air Field in San Antonio for assignment to duty. He had been in the active Air Force Reserve Corps.—Menard News.

Gas For Bronte

E. L. Buelow, divisional superintendent of Lone Star Gas Co., announced this week that work has begun on the purification and measuring plant here at Bronte and that gas will be in the mains here in a week or ten days.

Buelow said that he was very well pleased with the cooperation his company has received from the residents of Bronte while the job of piping the city was being done. Quite a ceremony is planned by the company when the gas is turned into the mains.—Bronte Enterprise.

State Guard For Eden

At the request of the State Adjutant, Eden has been requested to organize a new State Guard unit, to be re-activated and staged with officers and non-commissioned officers when the company's roster is completed.

At present, committees are contacting men who were members of the former State Guard unit which maintained an active status during the recent World War and who

were discharged at the end of the emergency. The bulk of enlistees, however, is expected to come from veterans of the service branches, and from young men in the selective service age and down to the ages of 16 or 17. The enlistment requirements have not yet been determined, however.—Eden Echo.

Grass Fires Incendiary?

Five grass fires, burning almost simultaneously, along Highway 163

south of Ozona last Sunday, are believed to have been of incendiary origin.

The first fires were discovered by Early Baggett near his ranch home on the highway 12 miles south of Ozona. He extinguished three separate blazes and later learned that a passing motorist had extinguished two other fires farther south along the road, all on the east side of the highway.—Ozona Stockman.
