## Ratliff To Retire As Mayor of Eldorado

Carroll Ratliff, mayor of the city of Eldorado for the past six years, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election in April. The announcement came at a recent meeting when the City Council ordered an official election to be held on the first Tuesday in April for the purpose of electing a mayor and three aldermen.

Mr. Ratliff, who has been mayor during a period when the city has been undergoing considerable growth, gives as a reason for his withdrawal, that "it's time for someone else to take it for awhile." The three aldermen whose terms expire at the same time, have consented to run for re-election. They are: Ray Hudgens, Gus Love, and C. C. Henderson.

An official election notice published by the City Secretary on page 5 of this paper, sets Saturday, March 7th, as a time limit for candidates to file for city offices.

The notice also reveals that Eldon Calk, proprietor of the Eldorado Drug, formerly of Sonora, has been persuaded by his friends to be a candidate for mayor.

### SCHOOL BOARD

The annual school board election is held on the first Saturday in April—which will be April 4.

There will be two places to fill, those of S. D. Harper and Dee Love. Whether one or both of these men will consent to run for re-election has not yet been announced at this early date.

## All Set For Open House At School During Next Week

According to a recent report from the office of the tax assessor and collector, people got panicky at the last minute over possibility that something might come along they would want to vote on—and a total of 598 paid their poll taxes for the year, before the deadline on January 31.

There are six baths, kitchens with mahogany finish, textured walls and ceilings, hardwood floors and other attractive features—there are four apartments, and two of the bedrooms have private baths and entrances for separate renting if desired.

## 2 Possible Discoveries Feature This Week's Oil News In Schleicher Co.

Possible new field openers in the east and north parts of this county are indicated this week as Schleicher continues to hold its place as the "hot spot" of the West Texas oil industry.

The Ellenburger prospect is Carter & Carter of San Antonio No. 2 J. F. Webster, 25 miles east of Eldorado.

Drillstem test was taken from 4,725 to 4,825 feet. Tool was open two hours. Recovery was 1,109 feet of gas in drillpipe, 90 feet of gas-cut mud and 180 feet of heavily oil-cut mud which was from 30 to 40 per cent oil.

Hole is bottomed at 4,825 feet. Five and one-half inch casing was cemented at that point. Operator cemented off perforations between 4,774-86 feet and perforated between 4,618-44 feet with 156 shots.

Operator will wash this section with 1,000 gallons of mud acid and treat with 5,000 gallons of regular acid. The mud will be circulated out of the hole.

The perforations between 4,774-86 feet had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and treated with 750 gallons of regular acid before the swabbing test reported Wednesday.

Location of the possible new field opener is 660 feet from north and east lines of survey No. 1 Block A-1.

Discovery production from the Strawn line has been indicated at the Robert W. Berry et al 1 A. B. Thomerson et al, extreme northern Schleicher County wildcat located southeast of Christoval in Tom Green County.

The project, on its first drillstem test in the Strawn line, topped at 5,218 feet, minus datum point of 2,504 feet, surfaced gas in 3 1/2 minutes. The gas volume was gauged at the rate of four million cubic feet daily.

On the second test in the Strawn, taken between 5,260-75 feet, with tool open two hours, gas surfaced in 50 minutes. Recovery was 180 feet of clean oil and 75 feet of oil and gas cut mud.

This project also flowed gas and recovered condensate on a 30-minute drillstem test between 4,657-706 feet in Canyon sand, topped at 4,654 feet, minus datum point of 2,240 feet. Gas surfaced in five minutes at an estimated rate of one to two million cubic feet daily. Recovery was five feet of condensate and 13 feet of condensate and gas-cut mud.

Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 65, block H, GH&SA survey and two and seven-eighths miles northeast of the one-well Butler (Canyon) field.

Sinclair's University test is flowing at average daily production of about 200. The company is taking further tests on the reservoir.

The Sinclair district office here has been assigned a district warehouseman, E. B. Gordon of Midland, who will move here with his wife and daughter as soon as he can find an unfurnished house.

Sinclair Oil & Gas Company will

drill No. 4 McClatchey Estate as a project at the east side of the Huldale (Pennsylvanian) field of north-central Schleicher. Drillsite is 1467 feet from north and 467 feet from west lines of section 42, block M, GH&SA survey and seven miles north of Eldorado. It is slated for a 5800-foot bottom.

Lone Star Producing Company of Dallas spotted location for a long outpost to production in the Huldale field. It will be drilled as No. 1 Joe Tisdale, 1 1/2 miles southwest of production. Operator staked site 467 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 74, block LL, TC survey. Laughlin-Porter Drilling Company has contract. The project is to be drilled to 6,000 feet. It is 6 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Sinclair will test for production in the Wolfcamp at No. 1 Thompson, wildcat in southeast Schleicher which failed to find oil in the Ellenburger on total depth of 6771 feet. The casing for the Wolfcamp test will be cemented at 4555 feet. Operator will perforate above that point and make production tests. Location is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 29, block A, HE&WT survey and 11 miles southeast of Eldorado.

Tide Water No. 1 Whitten, one-half mile southwest outpost to a one mile southeast extension to production in the Huldale field of north-central Schleicher, has been temporarily abandoned on total depth of 5738 feet. Operator may, at a later date, go back into the hole and complete the project as a gas well.

### Blake's Electric Moves

B. L. Blakeway spent the week end moving his electric shop from the Bearce building to the former saddle shop building owned by the Meadors.

He moved his display merchandise and his equipment and tools in time to be open for business in his new location Monday.

Ernest Finnigan now owns the lots opposite Frozen Foods and moved the sheet iron building from its former location to make room for his new 30x48 tile building, which will house four offices.

The older building is on its new site, facing west.

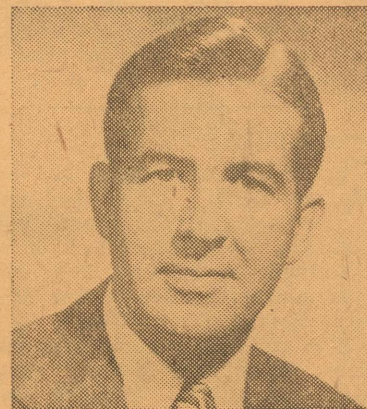


DELIA LYNN WESTBROOK

She is a member of the Presbyterian church, and Delta Kappa Gamma.



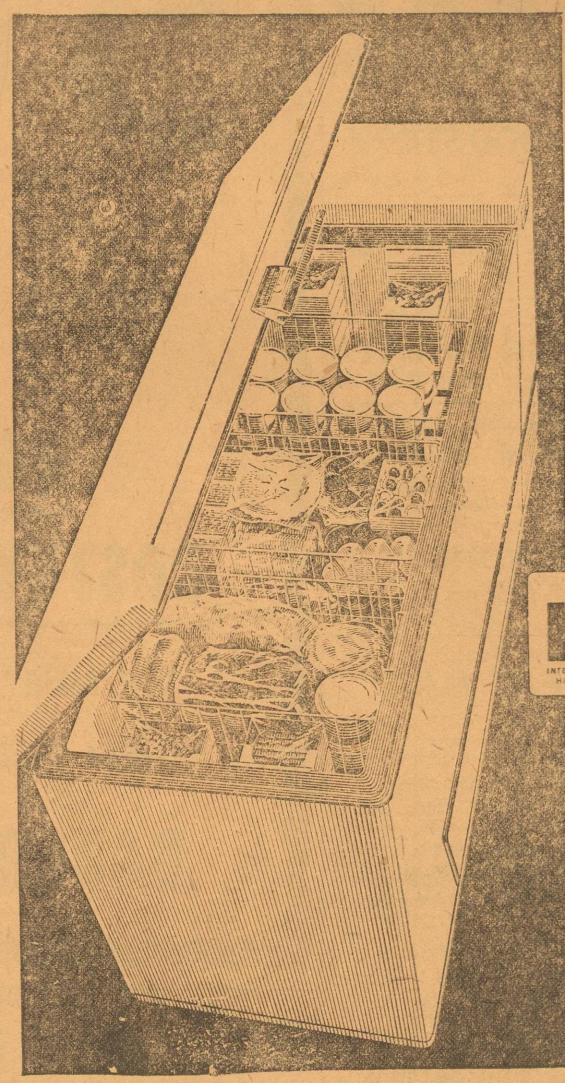
DONALD M. JONES

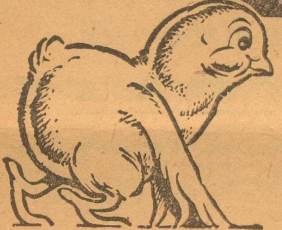

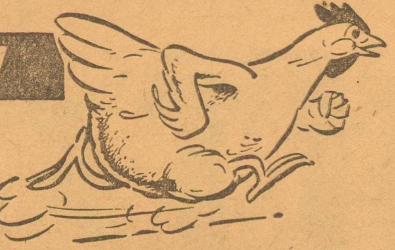

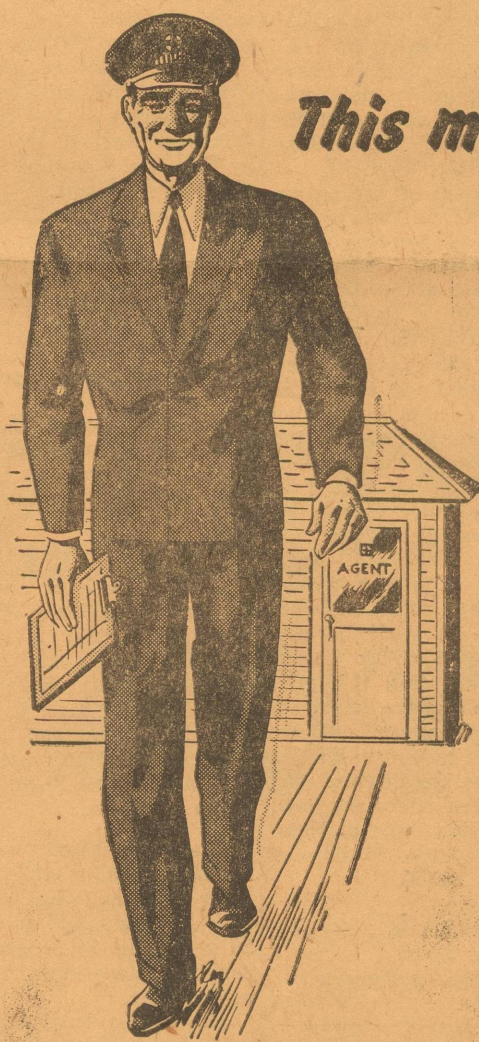

Scientists Seeking Load Of Instruments Dropped From Balloon

University of Minnesota scientists have appealed to Texans to be on the lookout for a large container filled with valuable instruments used in the study of cosmic rays at high altitudes.

The container, a large sphere 44 inches high, 32 inches in diameter weighing 170 pounds and encased in a bright orange canvas covering, was carried aloft by a balloon from Pyote Air Force Base February 4. A smaller container was attached. After the balloon had reached the desired height, the load of instruments was released automatically and dropped back to earth suspended from a parachute.

According to the best estimates of the Minnesota scientists, the two packages of instruments came down approximately 15 miles north of San Angelo.
