**X Disease Over, Poison Removed**  
Don't worry about protein supplement pellets as a source of X-disease next winter, advises Dr. A. L. Malle of the school of veterinary medicine at Oklahoma A&M College.

The cause of X-disease has been traced to feed pellets containing chlorinated naphthalene, says Dr. Malle. This chemical has been found in grease used to lubricate pellet making machinery. Dr. Malle says all major feed companies will specify that chlorinated naphthalene will not be used in manufacturing oils and greases to be sold to feed companies.

## Several Wildcats Spotted

Bulldozers are already at work on location for a test in Section 9, block A, former Daughdrill land in west Schleicher. Our map shows the country to be a Sinclair lease, but it is reported that the test will be a farmout to C. E. Marsh, Jr., who has been drilling the Willoughby wildcat. This new wildcat is located on the old Ozona road. Leases expire on a large block of Daughdrill land the latter part of this month.

Equipment is on location for a wildcat on Edward A. Caroe's land west of Eldorado—part of the Daughdrill land. This is also known as Concho County school land, league 8, of which Caroe owns the northeast quarter.

This test is 2 1/2 miles southeast of the Abercrombie dry hole drilled by Meador & Wallenmeier several years ago, and 4 1/2 miles northwest of the producing Eldorado or Mary L. Jackson field.

Both spudder and rotary equipment are already on the ground. According to our map, Superior has the lease on this land.

C. L. Norsworthy Jr., of Dallas has filed application to drill his No. 2 Virgil Powell one location west of his 1 Powell, opener of the newly designated Tillery field of eastern Schleicher County. Rotary drilling to 4,100 feet will begin at once. Location, on an 80-acre tract, is 330 feet from the north and 1650 feet from the east lines of 21-A-GH&H. It is 3 1/4 miles southwest of Fort McKavett.

Norsworthy No. 1 Powell was finished June 11 for a daily flowing potential of 136 barrels of 36.2 gravity oil, plus 10.3 per cent water.

Warren Petroleum Corporation filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to start drilling at once on a northeast offset to the discovery well of the Tillery field in central-east Schleicher County. The project will be dug as No. 1 Virgil Powell to 4300 feet. Location is 330 feet from south and west lines of section 1, block A, AB&M survey and five miles northwest of Fort McKavett. Operations are to start at once.

wildcat in northeast Sutton Co. It is No. 1 R. A. Halbert and is located 660 feet from south and west lines of section 49, block 9, TW&NG survey. That makes it seven miles southeast of the Brushy Top field and 10 miles northeast of Sonora. Combination cable and rotary tools will be used to drill the wildcat to the Ellenburger. Operations are to start at once.

Humble No. 1 Stanford, wildcat in west central Schleicher, was bottomed at 8334 feet in Ellenburger lime after taking a drill stem test last night. They will continue drilling and testing until they encounter either fluid or granite. This project already has taken a number of drillstem tests in the Ellenburger without developing oil or water.

C. E. Marsh and others of Midland No. 1 Willoughby, deep wildcat in west Schleicher, was making hole below 7113 feet in lime and shale at last report. This project, slated for a 9,500-foot bottom for tests of the Ellenburger, is being drilled 19 miles west of Eldorado and 690 feet from south and 703 feet from east lines of the NW quarter of section 11, block 2, GC&SF survey.

Carter & Carter No. 1 Sheen Brothers, wildcat in central east Schleicher County, was being drilled below 3827 feet in sand and shale at last report. This wildcat is scheduled for a 5,000-foot bottom. It is one and one-half miles southeast of Carter & Carter No. 2 Webster, gas-distillate discovery.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 3 Brooks, project in the Huldale field, was bottomed at 5751 feet in the Strawn lime, plugged back to 5738 feet. Operator was swabbing to clean out and test at last report. The project had showed gas at the rate of 8,000,000 cubic feet daily on previous production tests.

Sinclair No. 5 McClatchey, another Huldale test, was making hole below 1868 feet in lime. Sinclair No. 6 McClatchey, in the same area, was bottomed at 478 feet with operator trying to straighten crooked hole.

## AUSTIN FIRM GETS MERTZON ROAD CONTRACT

The Mertzson Highway comes a step nearer as a 1953 job, with acceptance of the low bid of W. L. Barnes of Austin, at a figure of \$127,362, by the Highway Dept., in Austin yesterday.

Barnes was low bidder in Austin out of a total of 10 contractors who submitted figures. The section of 13.9 miles in Schleicher County will be surfaced under this contract. The Mertzson section is due to be considered later, it is understood.

After a minor detail or two is taken care of by the commissioners court, they will meet and formally award the contract, and the next procedure is issuing of a work order. After that the contractor usually gets 30 days to start on the road.

## DELTA GULF WELL COMES IN TODAY; 60 BARRELS HOUR

Another good producer for the Huldale field today!

Delta Gulf No. 3 McClatchey kicked off at 3:15 this morning with 60 barrels per hour open flow on one-inch choke. The well was acidized with 1000 gallons of acid. Perforations were from 5700 to 5712, with 6 bullets per foot.

This is south of McWhorter's and east of the Wagley tract. It extends the producing field to the southwest one location.

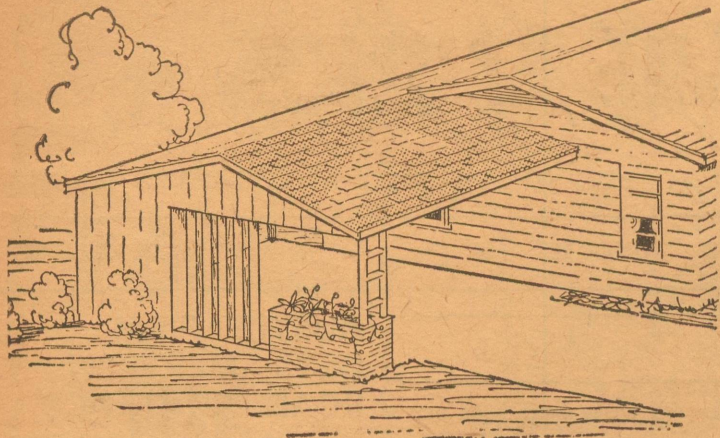

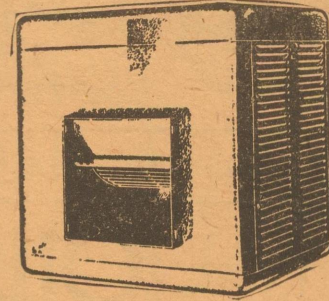
**PROGRESSIVE BRIDGE, 42, AS HOMECOMING BENEFIT**

It got so that folks would sit around his little Antique Shop just to get his opinion.

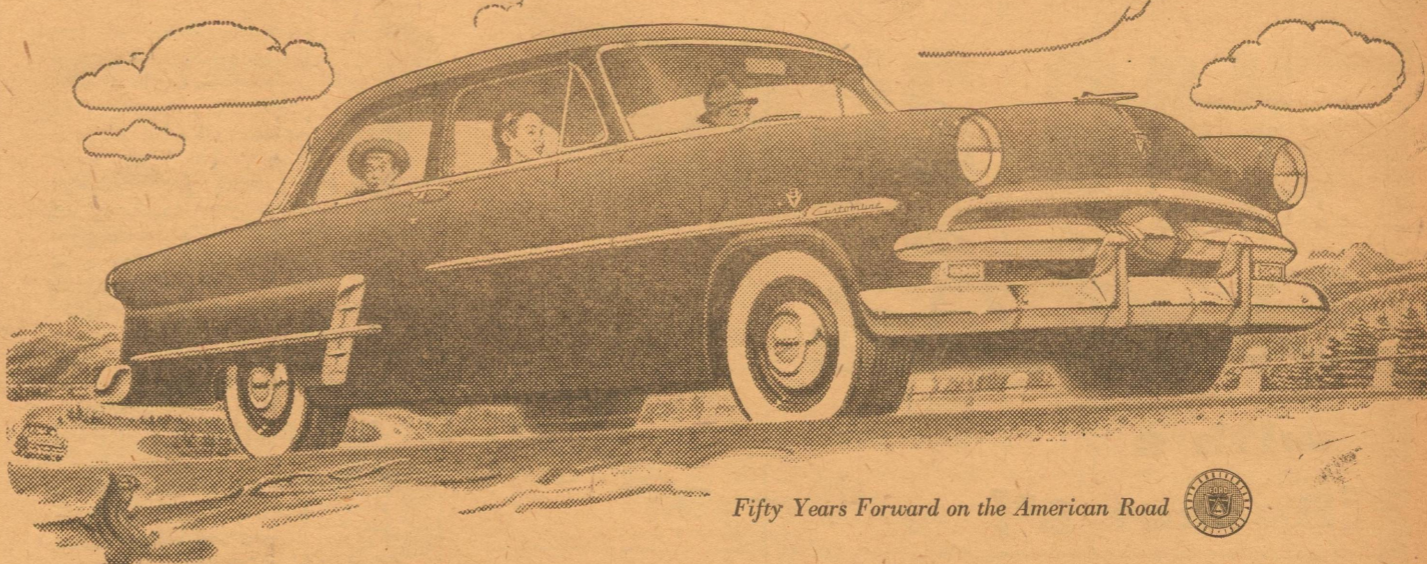
