## Large Vote Again Expected As Election Approaches

### Bills Reveal New Phone Rates Already In Effect

Telephone subscribers in Schleicher County are finding new rates on bills which came in the mails the last few days. Phone bills in the City of Eldorado reflect the rates thrashed out by phone officials and the city council, and reported in these columns last week. It was agreed at that council meeting that the new rates would be in effect in the next billings.

The new city rates are:

#### NEW RURAL RATES

It must be remembered that the compromise rate arrived at by the phone company and city council applies only to subscribers within the corporate limits of the City of Eldorado. Rural phone rates are set by the company without the prior approval of any local governing body.

Rural subscribers are now paying \$4.25 for residence phone and \$7.25 for business, on 8-party line or less. The old rate was \$2.50 for residence and \$3.50 for business, with 25 cents reduction if the phone was a wall set. The rural area includes all the rest of the county up to the city limits of Eldorado.

The rate increase for the rural area is proportionately higher than that recently granted in the city.

#### Other Towns Affected

Eldorado was one of five towns of similar size in this vicinity scheduled for increases. Four others, Eden, Sonora, Big Lake, and Miles are scheduled to receive attention at their next city commission meetings. Some smaller exchanges in the Sonora district already have new rates in effect: Carlsbad, Texon, Barnhart, Rowena and Christoval. General Phone Co., officials are meeting with Big Lake councilmen tonight.

Ozona is not scheduled for an increase at this time, as telephone rates there are already \$7.00 for business phones and \$4.25 for residences, and the system is not dial.

Company officials stress the fact that each city presents a special problem, and will be handled according to its particular needs.

### NO NEW POLIO CASES REPORTED DURING PAST WEEK

With the polio cases doing well and no new cases reported, what might have been a polio epidemic seems to be under control, and activities of the county are back almost to normal this week. An epidemic at school opening time, it is generally agreed, would have been disastrous from many angles. The First Baptist Sunday school resumed its usual program last Sunday, and the Presbyterian and Methodist churches will have their Sunday school classes as usual next Sunday, after limited operation for two Sundays.

Prompt and efficient action on the part of Eldorado doctors, nurses, and other groups undoubtedly played an important part in controlling the dread disease.

The danger is not entirely over, and parents are urged to observe the usual precautions, so as not to invite trouble.

#### Elmer Bruton Brings First Bale '54 Cotton; Ten More Are Ginned

Elmer Bruton brought in the first bale of 1954 cotton Thursday from his farm in the Reynolds community. It was ginned Friday at Mikeska Gin and weighed out 505 pounds.

Others bringing in bales of cotton shortly afterward were John Williams, Mrs. Hop Cheatham, and Rex White.

At 3:30 Wednesday afternoon Mikeska Gin had ginned a total of 11 bales, with another expected by night. Moore's Gin did not open for business this year.

Gin men report that the grade of cotton is good, but that the crop is deteriorating under searing dry winds of the past two weeks.

It will soon be all over but the voting!  
A fiery governor's race and several close county races—not fiery but quietly serious—come to a head Saturday when the people will cast their ballots in the second primary.

Mayor Eldon Calk announces that returns will be posted at the front of his drug store until the votes have all been counted. During the evening the Lions will sponsor a cake walk in the business district. As far as is known at this time no other special activities for Election Day are planned.

Absentee balloting is a little lighter than in the first primary, according to totals in the Clerk's office this week. At midnight Tuesday night, when absentee balloting closed, 75 had been cast and 13 not returned—at the same before the first primary, 88 had been cast and 10 not returned, making a total difference of 10.

#### Fight For Governor

Of chief interest to the people of Texas is the red-hot campaign for the governorship. Every political device and every means of advertising has been brought into play as Allan Shivers, present incumbent, and Ralph Yarborough fight it out in the closing days of the campaign. Voters will remember that in the first primary Shivers received 648 Schleicher votes, Yarborough 376, with two others 45 between them. This would indicate that as far as Schleicher is concerned, Shivers is in no danger. However the statewide race will be watched with a great deal of interest here.

#### Race For Judge

Since the first primary a month ago a lot of hard, quiet work has been going on in the local races, the leading one being the race for County Judge between Dick Bearce and George S. Finley. In the first primary Finley received 421 votes, Bearce 353, and Judge Craig was eliminated with 325. These last 325 votes are the ones that will tell the story.

#### Commissioner Races

Three precinct races, added to the Judge's race, further stimulates interest in Saturday's election throughout this county.

The Commissioner's race in Precinct No. 1—the largest in point of votes—is between A. J. Halbert, incumbent, and John Williams. A month ago there were three in the race and they came up with the following totals: Williams 387; Halbert 351; and Thompson 153.

In Precinct No. 2 where a total vote of 60 to 65 is usually cast, it was divided three ways a month ago as follows: Pope 31; Edmiston 20; and Childers 11. In the second primary it is Pope and Edmiston again, with Pope apparently having the advantage—on paper. Two years ago the vote was Edmiston 36, and Pope 29.

In Precinct No. 4 with about 100 votes to bestow, the voters a month ago placed them as follows: Potter 46, Thigpen 29, and Reynolds 24. Now it's a run-off between Potter and Thigpen.

In Precinct No. 3 there will be no Commissioner's race, since Martin was elected in the first primary—but the voters in the Cliff and Adams boxes can take part in the Judge's race and the state races.

Other names on the short ballot are Few Brewster, and Alfred Scott for Place No. 1, Supreme Court; and Lloyd W. Davidson for Court of Criminal Appeals.

### Employment Official Calls Meeting Friday On Labor Problems

Mr. Worsham of the Texas Employment office in San Angelo will be in Eldorado Friday morning (tomorrow) at 10:00 to give information and instructions on methods of obtaining cotton pickers, and the need for labor in this county.

The meeting will be held in the courthouse, and farmers who are in need of this type of information are urged to be present.



**Official Urges School To Come Ahead Of Jobs**

Dallas.—With school bells nearly ready to sound the fall opening of the nation's public schools, education-minded officials of the U. S. Department of Labor here are concentrating on keeping employment from hampering youthful education.

It is best, they say, for every youngster to finish his schooling before venturing into the working world on a permanent basis. Child-labor provisions in the Federal Fair Labor Standards act generally prohibit the employment of children under 16 years of age in agriculture or in any other occupation covered by the law during hours when school is in session. Regional Director Rogers of the U. S. Labor Department's Wage-Hour division said such unlawful employment should not cheat the youngsters of an education.

"The economic well-being of individuals and communities is directly related to their levels of education," he said. "It is to the material interests of both to aid educational upgrading."

Since Congress enacted the law in 1938, he said he hoped it was

generally understood to apply equally to local resident children and to migratory children. It does exempt a farmer's own children working on the parents' farm. But farmers are responsible under the law, the same as other employers, if they employ under-age children during school hours.

## TEXAS FARMERS-RANCHERS WARNED OF CIO LABOR PLANS

AUSTIN, Tex., Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned this week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race.

This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer or rancher wanted to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after the job of organizing industry in Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen

when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

The Shivers administration, the Governor said, has worked hard to help preserve and protect the rights of the working man.

"But as long as I am Governor, the professional labor bosses who have been sent to Texas from the East—specifically those in the CIO and its Political Action Committee—are not going to run our State Government," Shivers promised.

Shivers said the average working man in Texas appreciated good government and that they were not going to let CIO bosses and professional organizers from the East do their thinking—and voting—for them.
