## First All-Girl Roping Slated For Saturday

Large window cards have been placed in all neighboring towns during the past week, advertising the first all-girl roping to be staged in Eldorado Saturday night.

The event is being held under the auspices of the Eldorado Roping Club, and, if it catches the fancy of the public, it is likely to become an annual event here.

Starting time has been set for 8:00 o'clock, and the audience will have an opportunity to see in action the cream of West Texas girl ropers—from such towns as Jacksboro, Del Rio, Mason and others. Besides having good lights and other facilities, the Eldorado Roping Club has recently added two sets of bleachers for the convenience of their fans.

## Permanent Girl Scout Organization Proposed

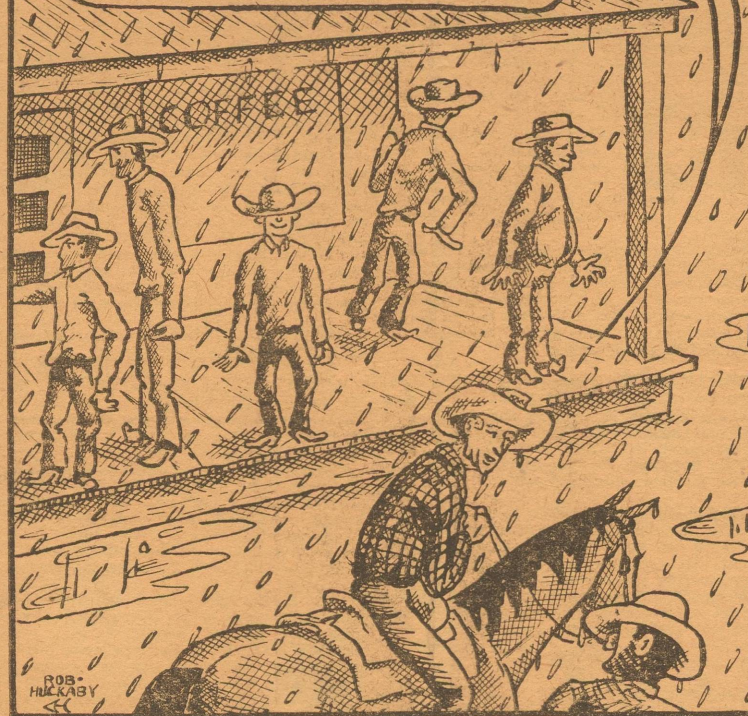

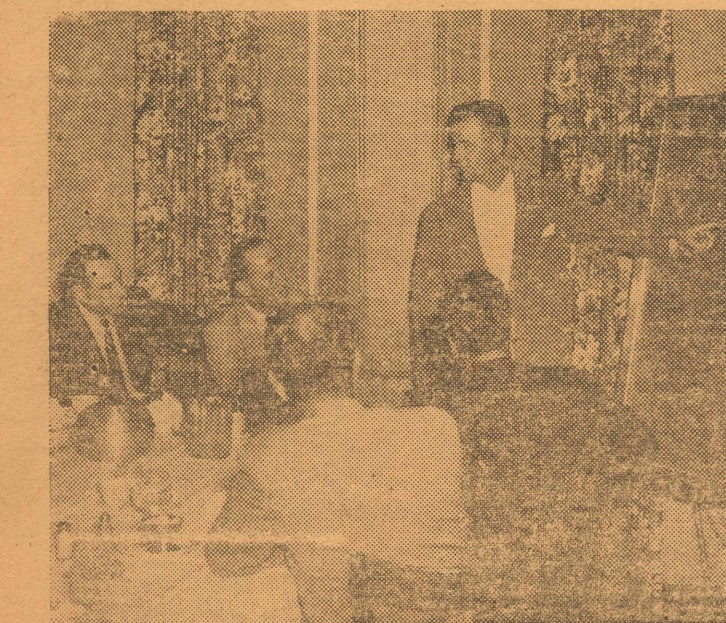
## DIES AT LUBBOCK

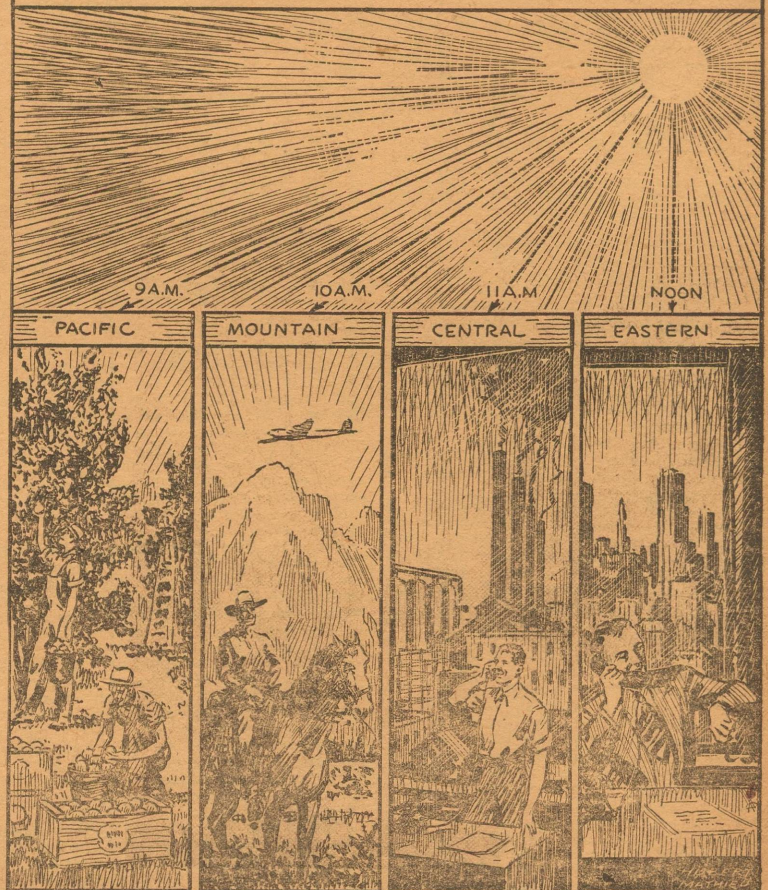

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4**  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide a four year term of office for electors of the State of Texas, to stagger the terms of such offices by having certain holders of such offices be elected for terms of varying length in the November, 1954, general election; and providing for the necessary proclamation and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 9. There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county, who shall be elected by the qualified voters for State and county offices, and who shall hold his office for four years, subject to removal by information or by indictment of a grand jury, and conviction of a petit jury. In case of vacancy, the Judge of the District Court shall have the power to appoint a Clerk who shall hold the office until he can be filled by election."

Section 2. That Section 15 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. There shall be established in each county in this State a County Court, which shall be elected by the qualified voters, and there shall be elected in each county by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law, peace, and shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. He shall receive compensation for his services such fees and perquisites as may be prescribed by law."

Section 3. That Section 18 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 18. That which organizes a county in the State now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into precincts, not less than thirty and not more than eight. Divisions shall be made by the Commissioners Court provided for by this Constitution. Precinct lines shall be established by the County Judge, who shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, each of whom shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided that in any precinct in which there may be a city of 8,000 or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two Justices of the Peace. Each county shall in like manner be divided into four commissioners precincts in equal number, each of which shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one County Commissioner, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. The County Commissioners so chosen, with the County Judge as presiding officer, shall compose the County Board of Commissioners, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business, as is conferred by this constitution and laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed."

Section 4. That Section 20 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 20. There shall be elected for each county, by the qualified voters, a County Clerk, who shall hold his office for four years, who shall be clerk of the County and Commissioners Court and recorder of the County Court, and who shall receive compensation for his services such fees and perquisites as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and a vacancy Attorney and a vacancy County Clerk, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided that in counties having a population of less than 8,000 persons there may be elected only one County Clerk, who shall perform the duties of District and County Clerks."

Section 5. That Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 21. A County Attorney, for counties in which there is a resident County Attorney, shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, who shall be commissioned for the term of four years. In case of vacancy the Commissioners Court of the county shall have the power to appoint or in the next general election, the County Attorney shall represent the State in all cases in the inferior courts, but if any county shall be included in a district in which there shall be a District Attorney, the duties of the County Attorney shall be regulated by the Legislature. The Legislature may provide for the election of County Attorneys in such counties, as may be deemed necessary, and make provision for the compensation of District Attorneys and County Attorneys. District Attorneys shall hold office for a term of four years, and until their successors have qualified under the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Section 6. That Section 23 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 23. The duties shall be performed by the qualified voters of each county a Sheriff, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, whose duties shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and vacancies in whose office shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next general election."

Section 7. That Section 14 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 14. Except as provided in Section 16 of this Article, there shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, county, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, county, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, county, and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and collecting taxes, as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Section 8. That Section 16 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 16. The Sheriff of each county, in addition to his other duties, shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but in counties where the duties of the Assessor and Collector of Taxes are to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, and Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected as provided in Section 14 of this Article, and shall hold office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 9. That Section 44 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 44. The office of Inspector of Hides and Animals, the elective district, county and precinct offices which have heretofore had terms of two years, shall hereafter have terms of four years; and the holders of such offices shall serve until their successors are qualified."

Section 10. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section 65, which shall read as follows:

"Section 65. The following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full term provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Justices of County Courts-at-Law; County Criminal Courts; County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

"Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954 shall serve only for terms of two years: (a) Assessor and Collector of Taxes; (b) District Attorneys; (c) County Attorneys; (d) Public Weighers; (e) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (f) Constables; (g) Justices of the Peace."

Section 11. That Section 45 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section 66, which shall read as follows:

"Section 66. The following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full term provided in this Constitution: (a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Justices of County Courts-at-Law; County Criminal Courts; County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

"Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954 shall serve only for terms of two years: (a) Assessor and Collector of Taxes; (b) District Attorneys; (c) County Attorneys; (d) Public Weighers; (e) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (f) Constables; (g) Justices of the Peace."

"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates for the same office are elected, the officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, shall serve for terms of two years; and thereafter, if their office is an uneven number, and for a term of four years if the designation after all such offices shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution."

Section 13. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday, A. D. 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING A FOUR YEAR TERM OF OFFICE FOR ELECTIVE DISTRICT, COUNTY AND PRECINCT OFFICES.**

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING A FOUR YEAR TERM OF OFFICE FOR ELECTIVE DISTRICT, COUNTY AND PRECINCT OFFICES.

Section 14. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16**  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by repealing Section 2 of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting in military service to persons in the military service of the United States at the time of entering such service; providing for submission of the proposed amendment to the qualified electors; providing for publication of the proposed amendment by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics.

"Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as may be provided by law.

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding the election and the last six (6) months within the district, in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided County Clerk shall have the duty of preparing a poll tax under the laws of this State offering to vote at an election in this State shall have the duty of receiving such poll tax and paying the same before the first day of the election; and he shall be authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in election, with the Judge of the County, or the County Clerk, and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature shall enact without the need of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches of the military service of the United States, who is otherwise qualified to vote, and who is a member of the military service of the United States, may vote at an election in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the military service of the United States."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

**"FOR THE AMENDMENT OF SECTIONS 1 AND 2 OF ARTICLE VI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CONFERR THE PRIVILEGE TO VOTE UPON MEMBERS OF THE REGULAR ESTABLISHMENT OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY, NAVY, MARINE CORPS, OR AIR FORCE, OR COMPONENT BRANCHES THEREOF, WHO ARE OTHERWISE QUALIFIED ELECTORS, AND SO AS TO LIMIT VOTING IN MILITARY SERVICE TO PERSONS IN THE MILITARY SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES AT THE TIME OF ENTERING SUCH SERVICE; AND FOR THE REPEAL OF SECTION 2 OF ARTICLE VI OF THE CONSTITUTION, WHICH PERMITS QUALIFIED ELECTORS IN MILITARY SERVICE TO VOTE WITHOUT PAYMENT OF A POLL TAX IN TIME OF WAR."**

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6**  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding to Article XVI a new section providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said systems.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Teacher Retirement System shall be entitled to credit in the Teacher Retirement System for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as appointive officers or employees of the State. Likewise, qualified members of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be entitled to credit in the Employees Retirement System of Texas for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government and its political subdivisions covering under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended, and to authorize the obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SUCH SOCIAL SECURITY COVERAGE FOR PROPRIETARY EMPLOYEES OF ITS POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS."**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Section 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State, and the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all public corporations, and from time to time in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give his advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive a salary of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall receive as compensation for his services an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Section 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 23. The Controller of Public Accounts, and the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall hold office for two years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall receive as compensation for his services an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Section 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered 51g, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Controller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a salary less than that fixed for such officers in the Constitution on January 1, 1954."

Section 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the Legislature. If a member of the Legislature is called away from his home by the Legislature, he shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed the amount of the per diem to which such member is entitled. The distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Controller of Public Accounts, and shall be paid to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that shall adjourn within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Section 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendments shall be printed on their ballots the following words:

**"FOR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, ATTORNEY GENERAL, CONTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, SHALL NOT BE FIXED IN AN AMOUNT LESS THAN THAT PROVIDED IN THE CONSTITUTION ON JANUARY 1, 1954; THAT THE PER DIEM OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."**

And the voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

**"AGAINST THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, ATTORNEY GENERAL, CONTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, SHALL NOT BE FIXED IN AN AMOUNT LESS THAN THAT PROVIDED IN THE CONSTITUTION ON JANUARY 1, 1954; THAT THE PER DIEM OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."**

Section 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16**  
Proposing an Amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit jurors; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'men' is used in reference to grand or petit juries, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

**"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 19 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR SERVICE ON GRAND AND PETIT JURIES SHALL NOT BE DENIED OR ABRIDGED BY REASON OF SEX; PROVIDING FOR AN ELECTION AND THE ISSUANCE OF A PROCLAMATION THEREFOR."**

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 19 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR SERVICE ON GRAND AND PETIT JURIES SHALL NOT BE DENIED OR ABRIDGED BY REASON OF SEX; PROVIDING FOR AN ELECTION AND THE ISSUANCE OF A PROCLAMATION THEREFOR."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10**  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the manner of its organization, the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election hereon, the proclamation of said section, and the form of ballot.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered as Section 51h, and reading as follows:

Section 51-h. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created, and shall have as its members the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for such other officials to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control. The State Building Fund shall not have been confirmed by the Senate as such State official he shall be confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed.

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created, and shall be a part of the State Building Fund. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.

(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend out of the State Building Fund the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texas who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.

(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars in the aggregate levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article III, of the Constitution of 1901, specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 17, of the Constitution of 1901, shall continue maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

(e) Should the 33rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall be printed on their ballots the following:

**"FOR THE AMENDMENT TRANSFERRING THAT PORTION OF THE CONFEDERATE PENSION FUND NOT NEEDED FOR THE PAYMENT OF CONFEDERATE PENSIONS TO THE STATE BUILDING FUND TO BE USED FOR STATE BUILDING PURPOSES AS MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW (6% PERCENT OF SUCH FUND TO BE USED FOR MEMORIALS FOR TEXANS WHO SERVED IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES."**

And the voters opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the following:

**"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TRANSFERRING THAT PORTION OF THE CONFEDERATE PENSION FUND NOT NEEDED FOR THE PAYMENT OF CONFEDERATE PENSIONS TO THE STATE BUILDING FUND TO BE USED FOR STATE BUILDING PURPOSES AS MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW (6% PERCENT OF SUCH FUND TO BE USED FOR MEMORIALS FOR TEXANS WHO SERVED IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES."**

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

A total of \$205 has been contributed so far in the emergency March of Dimes drive here, according to Mrs. Harris Maddox, general chairman.

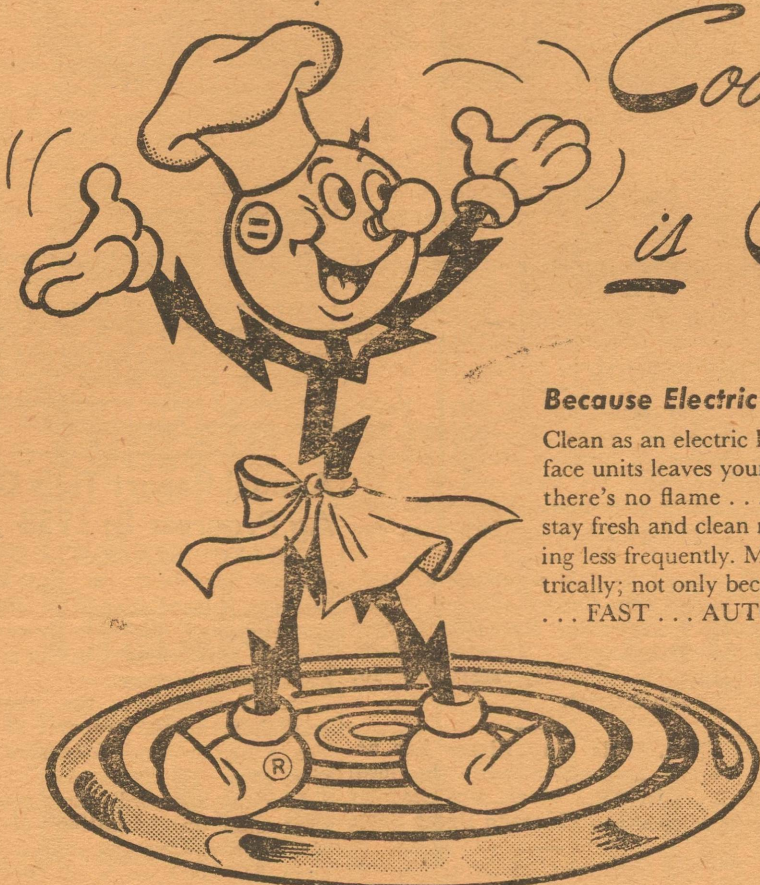
The drive, second of the year, became necessary when the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis used all existing money, Mrs. Maddox said. —Menard News

**Early Stalk Destruction Urged By Entomologists**

COLLEGE STATION — Need for early stalk destruction was urged poun Texas cotton growers this week.

Entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service advise growers to view their harvest as incomplete until all stalks either are cut or shredded and plowed under. Their call also went to central Texas, an area free of compulsory plow-up deadlines but where an increase in pink bollworms was noted this year.

Stalk destruction soon after harvest is recognized as an effective and cheap control of cotton insects, especially the boll weevil and pink bollworm. Cotton residues turned under add organic matter and increase the water holding capacity of the soil. Also, this early land preparation readies the land for

winter legumes.

Entomologists and cotton specialists alike agree that early stalk destruction, carried out on a county or area basis, will reduce materially insect pest troubles next year. Insects are deprived of their food supply and forced into hibernation in a weakened condition. Thus, fewer insects will emerge next spring.

Several type shredders and cutters are available, but the important step is to cut the stalks into small pieces so all residue is covered deeply by plowing.

In northwest Texas, however stalks are left standing until after the first hard freeze. Low temperatures kill the bollworms in the exposed bolls on the plant.

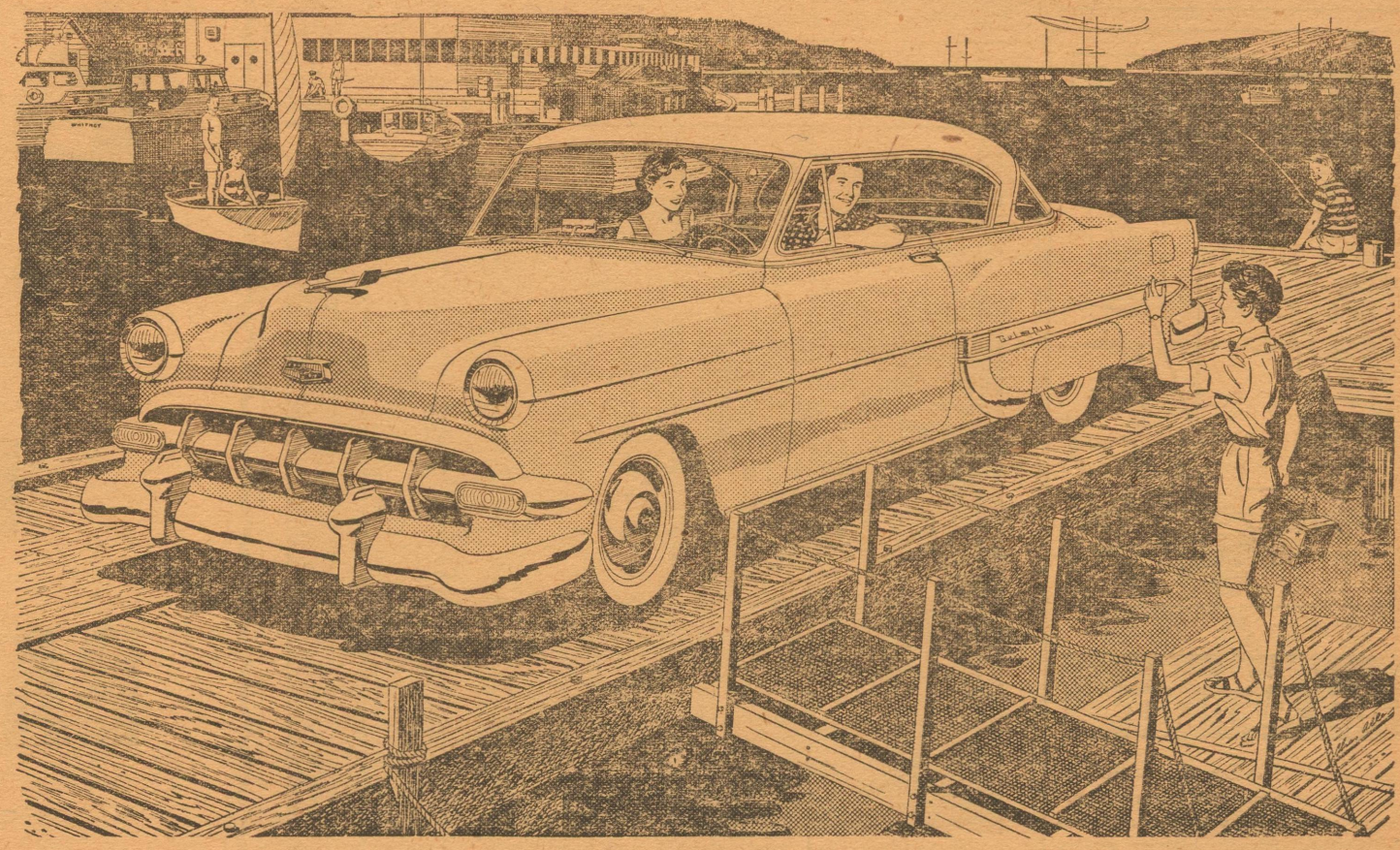

**Singing Hoe Hands Pay Board and Work Gratis**

COLLEGE STATION — Singing hoe hands who work free and pay their own board have "chopped" 345 acres of cotton for a Motley county farmer. It all began when Billy Hand unloosed 120 squawking geese in his fields.

"The geese went to work and covered the acreage in a week," says W. C. Pallmeyer, county agricultural agent. They did not molest the cotton but centered their interest on grass and "goat-hands." With the exception of a few large "careless" weeds which geese won't destroy, the field was cleaned, just as if regular hoe hands had done the job.

"One week convinced me," said Hand, "as long as I plant cotton I'll keep geese." His inspiration came after watching three of the fowls "mow" grass on the front lawn. Hand and a neighbor, Charles Long, traveled to Las Cruces, New Mexico, to get the birds. Long also found them extremely

satisfactory.

"The geese work at night when the moon is shining. They stay in the shade of the water wagon when the sun is hot and usually begin work about five o'clock. They seem to be singing all the time," Hand said.

The only cost of running the geese has been 100 pounds of barley each day. The efficiency of the fowls is not limited to their capacity for food, says Pallmeyer. They apparently eat only a small portion of the grass they destroy. They pull it up, leaving it to die in the middles. They attack tall Johnsongrass at the top and cut it to the ground, eating some in the process.

In a few instances the geese nip the cotton, especially around the water wagon, as if they might be appeasing some form of restlessness, notes Hand. No insects were found in fields where the birds worked—to make geese even more attractive to farmer Hand.

**Annual Report Tells Of Ag Progress In 1953**

COLLEGE STATION — Drouth slapped hard last year. But Texas farmers turned handicap into a challenge and 1953 goes down as a year of advancement in the state's agricultural history.

This summarizes the recently published annual report of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Drouth prompted the greatest expansion in irrigation of any single year, says the report. More than 5,000,000 acres of farmland were irrigated in 212 Texas counties.

Twenty-three million dozen eggs were sold on a graded basis. This meant an additional \$1,150,000 in pockets of producers.

Soil judging gained popularity. Organized 4-H clubs made up the greatest number in attendance at soil judging schools.

Despite adverse weather, Texas planted and cultivated 505,846 home gardens—50,000 more than in the year previous.

But for many livestock raisers, 1953 meant "just staying in business." The report says county agricultural agents probably were asked more questions about livestock feeding than in all their years of service. Cattlemen in the 102 designated drouth counties were determined to store feed for future use. As a result, beef cattlemen and dairy operators stored more feed in silos than possibly ever before.

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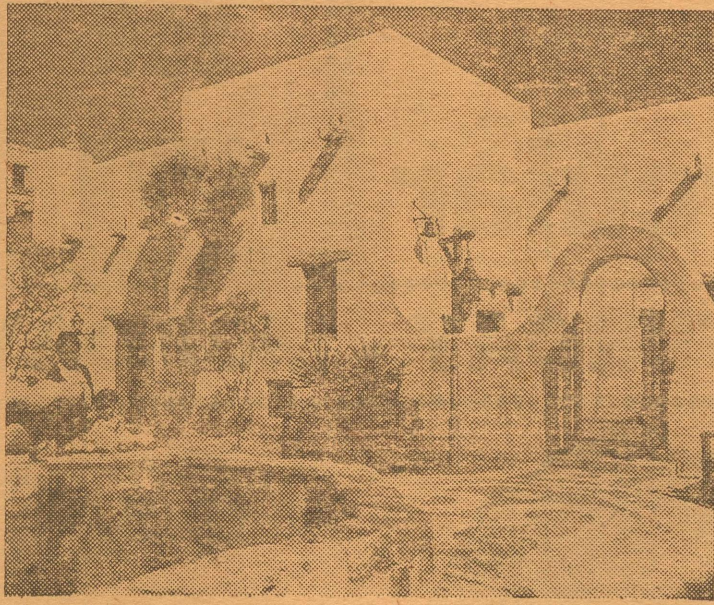

#### Rules For Juror Conduct

Thousands of Texans are called each year as prospective jurors in our many state and federal courts. When chosen to serve, very few of these violate their oath with intentional misconduct. But honest mistakes have all too frequently brought the sincerity and ethics of an individual juror into question. Usually such errors arise from his misunderstanding of his function as judge-for the jury is judge of the facts in the case before it.

Like Caesar's wife, the juror must not only avoid wrong, but also avoid any appearance of wrong. Otherwise, his integrity and honor may be brought into question by actions which are actually innocent but appear censurable to those who view them. By observing the following simple suggestions, the juror may be sure he is maintaining the highest of ethics, in which no possible fault may be found by others:

Hold yourself aloof from all persons (except other jurors) in any way connected with the trial of the case. That means that you should not mingle with nor talk to the lawyers, witnesses, parties, nor the judge, even though the discussion is wholly unrelated to the trial.

Do not discuss the case nor permit others to mention it to you or in your presence during the trial. If anyone insists upon talking about the case after you have explained to him that you are a

juror and must not listen, report the matter to the judge immediately.

Do not commence your deliberations until you have heard all of the evidence from both sides, the argument of the lawyers, and the court's charge. You should not mention the case except in the jury room when all other jurors are present.

Do not become a private investigator. All properly admissible evidence will be brought before you. Do not try to search out additional facts you believe to have been omitted. Do not even guess or speculate about facts not in evidence.

Be attentive to the evidence as it is presented. If you are to properly aid the other jurors in settling the fact questions, it will be necessary to listen carefully to all evidence presented.

Do not guess at the judge's opinion of the facts. You are the judge of the facts. He is not allowed and will not try to invade your province. His ruling on admissibility of evidence reflect no ideas or opinions on any fact question. You should not mention or discuss your own personal experiences, or any knowledge that you may have of similar transactions. If you should disclose such information to others serving on the jury, the court would have to grant a new trial.

Accept no favors from and bestow no favors upon any persons interested in the trial. However innocent the conduct may be, it will raise doubts in otherwise undoubting minds, and may even be subject to more serious insinuations and charges.

When in doubt ask the judge. If you are in doubt about your rights or duties as a juror, you should not ask anyone but the judge for information.

#### Your Shade Trees Need A Little Help

COLLEGE STATION — Shade trees sapped by another summer of sparse rainfall need a little help from their owners.

An ailing tree's condition can be improved greatly with water and fertilizer, says G. M. Watkins, extension pathologist. To accomplish this, build a circular dike around the tree to hold water four inches deep in the basin. The diameter of the basin, says Watkins, should approximate the size of the tree's shade canopy. A dike six feet in diameter is suggested for very small trees and shrubs.

Spread a commercial fertilizer over the soil within the dike. The

formula and application rate depend upon the inherent fertility of the soil. As a starter, one pound of 5-10-5 or 8-8-8 to every 100 square feet of surface is recommended.

Fill the basin to a depth of four inches and allow to soak in. During the hot, dry part of the year repeat the waterings at seven to 10 day intervals but discontinue during the seasons of rainfall.

Fertilizer every 30 days during the growing season and withhold fertilizer as the tree goes into dormancy. Water well every time fertilizer is applied.

### Recipe of the Week

#### Buckwheat Cakes

- 1 quart lukewarm water
- 1 cake compressed yeast
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar or molasses
- 2 cups buckwheat flour
- 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 6 tablespoons melted shortening
- ½ teaspoon baking powder

Pour 1 cup of the water over yeast; let stand about 10 minutes. Dissolve salt, sweetening in remaining water; add dissolved yeast. Blend liquid mixture with flours. Add shortening; beat until

smooth. Let rise until full of bubbles—about 1 hour. Dissolve soda in 2 tablespoons warm water; stir into batter. Grease griddle lightly and heat. To test for proper heat sprinkle a few drops of water on the griddle. If bubbles "skitter around" heat is just right. Pour batter from tip of large spoon or from a pitcher. Turn pancakes as soon as they are puffed and full of bubbles but before they break. Cook until brown. Yield: 24 medium cakes.
