



Internet Shopping in Texas

Two Texas metropolitan areas are at the top of the list in an online shopping study, according to State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander. Austin ranked #1 at 32% when counting the number of adults who have shopped online. Dallas/Ft. Worth ranked 6th at 27.9%. Washington D.C. 31.6%, Charleston, W.V. 30.9%, San Francisco 29.8%, and Jacksonville, FL. 28.5%, ranked 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th, respectively.



SCMC was one of the first in been approved for both." the nation to apply for admission into the Critical Access program after the federal government offered the program as a means of preserving rural hospitals.

Under the Critical Access program, SCMC will be reimbursed on a "cost basis" proportionally for the number of Medicare patients it treats.

Hospital Administrator Ann Fagan-Cook explained the program "If every patient admitted to the hospital happened to be a Medicare patient, then Medicare would reimburse 100 percent of the cost of operating the hospital," Fagan-Cook said. "If the number is 75 percent then Medicost. It's a great deal for us."

Participation in the program re-96 hours. Fagan-Cook emphasized, however, that the 96-hour limit is an average over an entire year. Currently, SCMC's average patient stay is less than 72 hours.
