

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

Are you happy? Who are the happiest people on earth? This question was asked by an English newspaper, and prizes were offered for the best answers. There were four prize winners: "A craftsman or artist whistling over a job well done." "A little child building sand castles." "A mother, after a busy day, bathing her baby." "A doctor who has finished a difficult and dangerous operation, and saved a human life."

No millionaires among these, you notice. No kings, emperors, rulers or presidents. Money, riches rank or position; no matter how the world strives for them, do not make happy lives. It would be a sad day on earth if only the rich and the great could be happy. But happiness is for everybody, not just a few.

It's summer time and company time. Both bring thoughts of good things to eat. The good things don't necessarily mean the hard to make things, either. Try these brownies, baked in a pie pan, cut in pie shaped pieces, served with vanilla ice cream and hot fudge sauce and rest assured that you will have a Sunday or a company dessert that ranks with the best.

Fudge Pie

- 1 six-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate bits.
 - 1/2 cup butter or margarine.
 - 1 cup sugar.
 - 2 eggs.
 - 1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt.
 - 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts.
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
1. Melt chocolate over hot water (Don't get water mixed with the chocolate.)
 2. Cream butter; add sugar gradually, then continue creaming until fluffy.
 3. Add eggs, one at a time; beat until smooth, after each addition.
 4. Sift in flour and salt; beat again until smooth.
 5. Stir in nuts, melted chocolate and vanilla.
 6. Turn into one greased 10-inch pie pan or two 9-inch, or one 9x9 square pan.
 7. Bake in moderate oven, at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

While still warm, mark into serving pieces. Cut the "pies" in wedges. Makes six large or eight small pieces. Serve with vanilla ice cream and hot fudge sauce.

Quick Fudge Sauce

Heat in top of double boiler over hot water: 1 package (6 oz) semi-sweet chocolate pieces, 3/4 cup light corn syrup. Stir in 1/4 cup milk or light cream, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/8 teaspoon salt. Mix until smooth. Serve hot or cold. Makes about 1 1/2 cups sauce.

Make this sauce ahead of time and store in refrigerator. Keeps well if hidden.

Never-Never Rules of Skin Care

Home Demonstration club women over the county have been enjoying the club meetings on grooming and make-up during the

month of May. I couldn't begin to give the contents of the program but these are some of the rules for skin care which have been discussed:

1. Never scrub face with a cloth. Use finger tips or soft brush to work soap on.
2. Never leave a soap film on face. Soap is a good cleanser but the skin has a natural acid mantle which coats the skin and soap inactivates this natural protector.
3. Never rinse soap off with wash cloth. Only the finger tips can feel when soap is gone.
4. Never use extremes in hot or cold water on face. Either very hot water or ice cubes applied directly to the face is apt to rupture tiny blood vessels that lie close to the skin's surface.
5. Never rub the face dry. Pat with gentle, firm pressure.
6. Never pull down on the tissue of the face. Apply cleansers, removers. Make up in general with quick, delicate, upward and outward motions of the finger tips.
7. Never follow a friend or neighbor's skin treatment. Use the one suited to your own type of skin.
8. Never be afraid to investigate the new. In the last few years products containing hormones, activated ozone, serums, vitamin A, or hydronized oils have proved to be skin savers for many women. Buy these products in small sizes while finding out whether they are for you or not.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Producers seeding a mixture of grasses such as Blue Panic, K. R. bluestem, buffelgrass, Texas bluegrass and sideots grama shouldn't expect miracles the first year. Some will probably be disappointed in the amount that comes up the first year and lives under good conditions. But remember that it will probably take two to three years under fairly good conditions to get any cover on the ground like you would like to see. These grasses to survive will have to meet competition from annual grasses such as threawns, rescue grass and many weeds and are supposed to. The control of noxious weeds such as sunflowers and cocklebur is a must and will help some in your broadcast mixture. The rest is left up to nature as to how much rain is received during the growing season, how much rain is received after the seed sprouts to keep the seedling alive and growing. There are a multitude of other factors entering the picture. Then too, nature works for you in another way. Grasses produce what is called "hard seeds" that may lie dormant for weeks, days, or months before germination. Let us all hope that as many of these factors of management and nature break at the right time as possible.

Pruning will not take the place of good care, feeding, and watering, and improper pruning is worse than none at all. Evergreens, such as ligustrum, japonica, arborvitae and juniper should be pruned to desired shape this month. Prune and shape your hedge so that the base is wider than the top with sides slanting in toward the top. This allows sunlight to hit the bottoms of the plants and thus produce thick, even foliage growth down to the ground. Remember that heavy pruning favors the development of vegetative growth instead of flower production.

The new external parasite control spray No. 21-199 has been released to manufacturers after being thoroughly tried by the experiment stations. All external parasites are controlled including cattle grubs and the screw worm.

It is possible and very probable that two sprayings a year will control all the external parasites, the cattle grub and the screw worms. The cost will be at first about .10 cents for sheep and perhaps as much as .40 cents per cow. Protection after each spraying is for long periods of time with rain not having as much effect as on other insecticides.

Transform Interior During Paint Up Time

How would you like a new house at the same address? A paint can and brush plus use of certain color facts can change your home to whatever you desire by the end of the clean-up campaign.

While you should choose colors which appeal to you, certain color tricks should be kept in mind. First, colors are classified as "cool" and "warm." The reds, oranges and yellows, resembling the sun's rays, are warm while greens and blues, reminiscent of the tranquil sky and relaxing waters, are called cool.

The warm colors are particularly effective in north and east rooms which lack all-day sun while blues and greens are restful in sunny south and west rooms.

The cool blues and greens are also known as retreating colors and make small rooms expand. The warm or advancing colors are attractive for large, barn-like rooms as they seem to bring the walls inward.

Another color trick is the use of a different hue on one wall of a square room—it does away with the box-like appearance. A long, narrow room can be widened visually by painting the end walls a

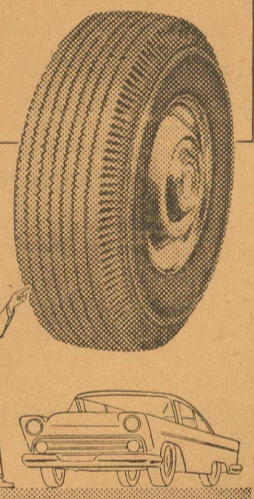
George Russell, 95, died in the Melvin hospital Sunday evening after being hospitalized for four months. Among his survivors is Russell Saltee of Eldorado.

The recovered patient will never become run down again. Clean Up, Paint Up, Fix Up is the remedy, but it must be administered by you and your neighbors.

You may have thought of the cost of fixing up and decourting, your home during the present clean-up, paint-up, fix-up program. But do you realize that a small outlay of time and money is going to actually pay you large dividends. A house and yard that have been thoroughly cleaned, repaired and planted will give you added realty value should you wish to sell. Clean premises will considerably reduce the chance that you will ever stand over a rubble of what was once your home and your cherished possessions, gutted by fire.

Tips On Ladder Use

Ladders are handy tools around the home in maintenance and repair work, but like most tools, there is a right and a wrong way to handle a ladder. Avoid hazards by following these few hints and prevent accidents during the clean-up, paint-up and fix-up period, as well as throughout the year. Never stand on the top of any step ladder. Make certain a step ladder is fully opened and locked before you use it. The bottoms of all ladders should be on a solid footing, or otherwise anchored securely. To be safe, also place rung type ladders at proper pitch so the distance from the bottom of the ladder to the house is approximately one-fourth of the length of the ladder. (If angle is greater, the ladder may break, or, if too close to the house, the ladder may tip.) Set ladder properly to avoid the mistake of over-reaching or leaning too far to one side, which is dangerous. Always face a ladder when ascending or descending and don't carry large or heavy objects—use a rope life. Grip ladder firm with hands and be certain your shoes and the rungs or steps of ladder are free from oil, grease or mud. Do not use makeshift or patched up ladders. Take good care of your ladder—do not leave it out in the weather to deteriorate. A ladder is a great help in renovation work. Use it correctly and be sure you respect it as you do other good equipment and always keep safety foremost in your mind.
