## Chavira Still Confined to Schleicher County Jail

A formal motion for a new trial for Ernesto Chavira was filed Monday by his attorney, William C. McDonald. Chavira was found guilty of murder by a Schleicher county jury last week in the shooting death of Luis Martinez, February 10, 1958. The jury sentenced him to life imprisonment.

Shortly after his arrest he was committed to the Schleicher county jail for a few days, then transferred to the Tom Green county jail until his trial here beginning June 2. Bail of \$10,000 was set by Judge Joe L. Mays when he was indicted by the grand jury in April.

Gilberto Gandor, charged as an accomplice in the crime is out on bail of \$1,000. He will probably be tried sometime in September.

In the motion for a new trial the attorney based his motion on extraneous offenses which occurred in Sonora before the murder and which were made part of the evidence against the accused.

It is expected that Judge Mays will take action on the motion within a few days. In the meantime, Chavira continues to be a resident of the Schleicher county jail.

El Paso Natural Gas Co. started moving gas for Pioneer June 6th after trying in some gas wells in the western part of the county.

Tucker Drilling Co. of San Angelo Willie Tisdale No. 1 had a squeeze job Friday in an attempt to decrease gas production and increase the oil production, between 5,697-5,700 feet. The well also produces from a lower zone between 5,721-25 feet. The well was originally completed the first part of March, 1958, for a daily flowing potential of 118.88 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil, no water, with a gas-oil ratio of 450-1.

## Austin Firm Low Bidder On Reynolds Road Job

W. L. Barnes, Austin contractor, was low bidder for construction of 5½ miles of Reynolds road, when the Highway Dept. opened and read bids in Austin on Tuesday.

The Austin contractor was low with a bid of \$88,447.62 for grading structures base and surfacing on FM 1823 in Schleicher county.

The project extends from a point on the Mertzton highway 7 miles northwest of Eldorado, for a distance of nearly 5½ miles on the present Reynolds road—which will bring the new road up to a point west of H. A. Belk's.

If the Hwy. Dept. awards the job to this contractor it is likely that work will get under way between July 1st and 10th. The road is part of an important school bus and mail route.

At their meeting Monday, the Schleicher County commissioners agreed to let the Bev McCormick post of the American Legion have charge of the maintenance of the county park, and to make long range plans for beautification.

Located in the West addition of Eldorado, the park block is the site of the county swimming pool and Legion Field.

Don McCormick, Jack Hext, and C. T. Waller are the committee from the Legion making plans for further park development.

A clean-up day is tentatively set for June 21st at the park site. Further plans on this will be announced next week.

The county has appropriated \$1,000 for improving the park, of which \$400 will be used for water pipes to be laid, and \$600 will be used for the first year's maintenance.

It is planned to get some grass started on the block this year.

Other organizations and clubs are to be contacted in regard to the park improvements. The Junior Womens club announced plans a while back for furnishing picnic tables, and they also have set out a few trees.

The Eldorado fire department has been very busy the last week putting out grass fires, which have not caused any appreciable damage, so far. Members of the department have stated that conditions are getting such that they are afraid that one of these days a fire will get started that will be impossible to control.

One house fire occurred last Friday morning when the Raymond Mittle residence caught fire at 5:15 a. m. due to faulty wiring. The residence is located about 15 miles north of town. Mittle had used a foam extinguisher until it was depleted and was on top of the house with a garden hose dousing the blaze when the firemen arrived.

Fire Chief Palmer West credited Mittle's quick action with the garden hose and extinguisher and also closing all windows and doors with controlling the fire until the firemen arrived. Damage was confined to one room and the roof. There was some insurance carried on the building and contents.

Other fires occurring were: Saturday afternoon a grass fire at O. E. Conner residence.

Sunday, no alarms. Monday afternoon, grass fire at Joe Wagley place.

Tuesday, grass fire at Mrs. R. A. Evans rent house on Brooks street. The fire at the Shaw residence was stopped only a feet of reaching Vernie Humphrey's ripe oat field, before being brought under control by the fire department.

Other fires Tuesday afternoon was one at 3:30 p. m. at a Gus Love rent house on Cottonwood street, when a kitchen stove caught fire. An alarm at 3:45 p. m., called the firemen to a grass fire in the Latin-American settlement.

**Test Shows Texans Like Texas Peaches**

College Station.—Texans like their peaches Texas-grown. Super market shoppers reached for local peaches over California fruit until a shortage in the Texas supply developed during consumer preference tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with a Dallas food chain.

The tests were conducted to determine preference and acceptance of new varieties of Texas peaches, and to study merchandising and other factors on which to base improvement in Texas fruit production and increase sales in the future.

Size—as an analysis showed 9 out of 10 times—and not price comparison was the big factor entering the minds of shoppers as California and Texas peaches were displayed. Prices of the two were the same except for one period when Texas peaches were two cents a pound less.

In the four supermarkets, located in medium, medium-high and high income areas of Dallas, the total peach sales ranged from 16.1 to 20.8 pounds per 100 customers.

Texas-grown peaches were of the Cardinal, Dixired, Coronet and Ranger varieties sold in competition with California's Blazing Gold, Gold Dust and Red Haven varieties.

The shelf life of Texas peaches also compares favorably with peaches from other states, with a total loss of 6% due to spoilage.

Spoilage varies because of different display sizes and rates of movement.

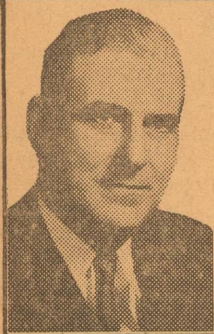

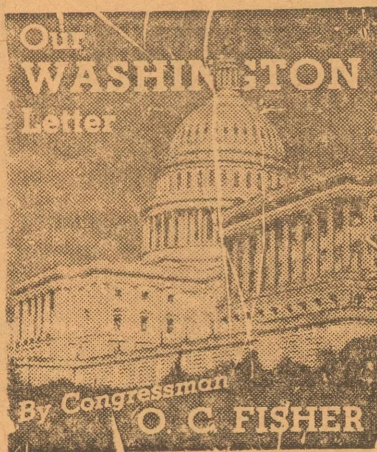
Mrs. Friend Dotson was school director and was very ably assisted by 14 adults. Nursery attendants were Diane Thomas and Genelle Edmiston.

Foreign aid for the next year got Senate approval last week, following House approval a little earlier. The total authorization will be about \$3 billion. But actual appropriation must come later and the real test will then come on how much money will be funded. It will probably be somewhat less than the \$3 billion figure.

Half of all imports to South America last year came from the U.S.A. Our Latin neighbors paid \$4.7 billion for the purchases, mostly in cash. In turn, we bought \$3.7 billion worth of goods from our southern neighbors. To pinpoint it, we buy 44.2% of their products, and 48.8% of their imports came from us.

This trade with Latin America is almost as large as our trade with Europe, reports Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson, an authority on South American affairs. Our neighbors to the south buy 35% of our auto exports and trucks, a third of our exports of chemicals and electrical machinery, iron and steel mill products, and 17% of our exports of foodstuffs.

This record accentuates the importance of our relations with our neighbors in the western hemisphere.

Clay Puckett, also of Sonora, graduated last week from the Protestant Episcopal Theological Seminary in nearby Alexandria, Virginia. Formerly publisher of Sonora's Devil's River News, Puckett switched to the ministry three years ago when he entered the Seminary. In spare time he worked as a Capitol policeman. Attending the graduation were Clay's mother, Rev. Brown and Dick Copeland. My office staff and I also attended. Rev. Puckett and family will depart soon for Corpus Christi where he has accepted a call from an Episcopal church there.

### Egg Price Outlook Remains Favorable

College Station.—Reduced cold storage holdings and a lower number of layers on farms point to favorable egg prices until the latter part of this year, according to John McHaney, extension economist.

The number of layers on Texas farms in April, 1958, was two percent less than in March, 1958, and four percent less than last April. The United States total this April and May was three percent less than in April and May a year ago. McHaney points out that this is favorable for prices in the short run. However, commercial hatcheries in the nation produced five percent more egg-type chicks in March and April this year than a year ago and the production of these chicks during January thru April was six percent above the same period in 1957. This means there will be more eggs in the channels of trade when these chicks start laying this fall, and this will affect prices. Too, production during the first four months of 1959 will probably be larger than the first four months of 1958 and prices will probably be lower.

Cold storage holdings at the end of April were only about one-half as large as the holdings a year ago and one-half the average for that date, reports the economist.

Farm flocks in the U. S. laid three percent less eggs in April of this year than last April and was the lowest April production since 1941. Total egg production, January through April, 1958, was four percent below the same period last year.

Prices received by producers in mid-April, 1958, averaged 37.4 cents per dozen compared with 40.8 cents a month earlier and 30.4 cents in April, 1957.



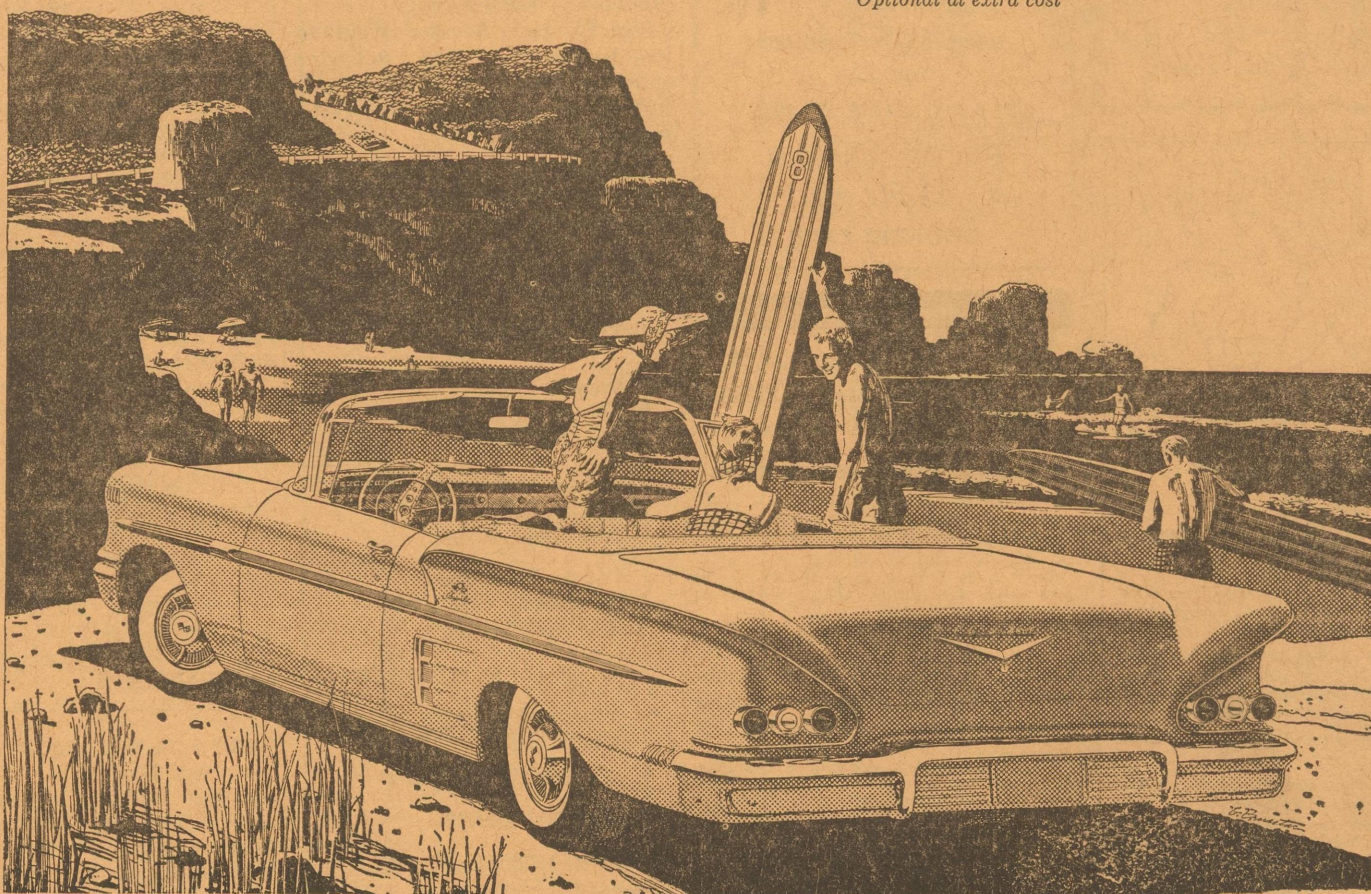

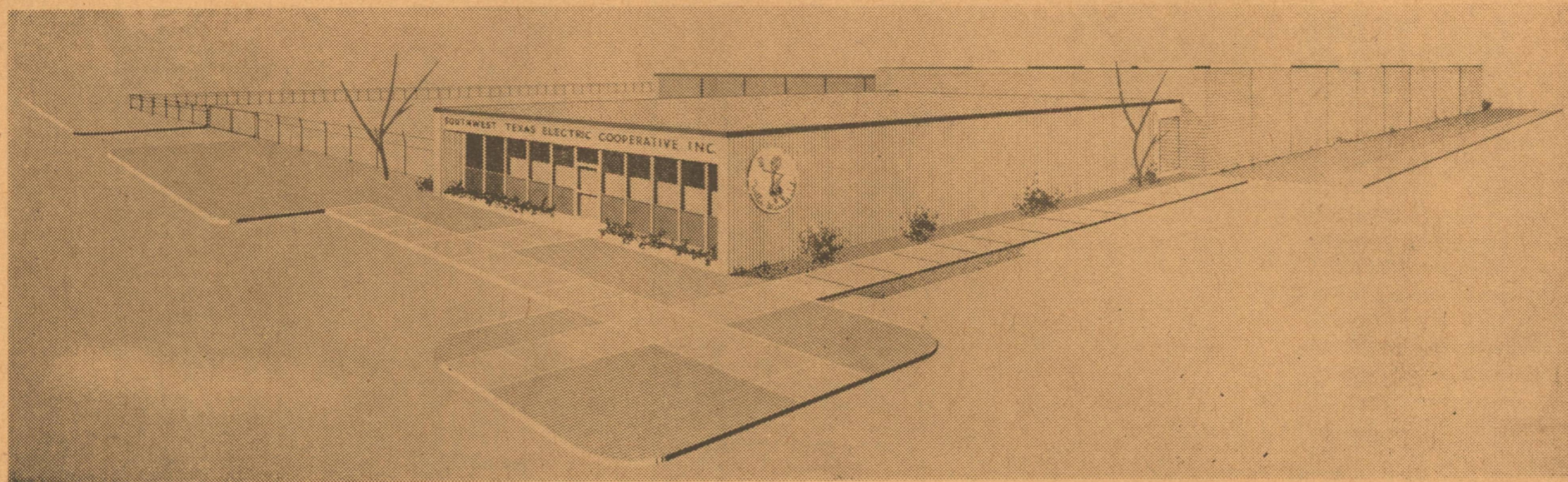
The by-laws committee will decide the proper procedure in receiving out of town applicants as members from towns where there is no garden club.

Contract was awarded to J. W. Nesom General Contractor of San Angelo for the sum of \$92,252.00—which is for a complete turn-key job on the new building, including everything except paving and fencing.

All that remains now is for the R.E.A. in Washington to approve the contractor, which is considered a mere formality.

After that the contractor has 10 days in which to start the job, and 185 calendar days in which to complete it. It is expected that the whole job will be completed during the coming January.

The low bid yesterday, \$92,252.00, was only \$500 lower than the next low, which was announced at \$92,763.00. The highest bid was about \$112,000.00.

The Co-Op already owns lots which will be the location for the new building. Several years ago the Co-Op bought the lots on the corner across the street from the telephone office, from Mr. and Mrs. Bert Page. A well driller made some test borings recently at the location.

It is estimated that oats will bring in the most money with a gross value of \$660,000. Wheat is next with gross value of around \$578,000 and barley will bring in around \$125,000. These are conservative figures based on acreage planted and at average yields that are figured short of actual yields. —Eden Echo.

#### Setting Oil Valuations




#### Doctor For Menard
