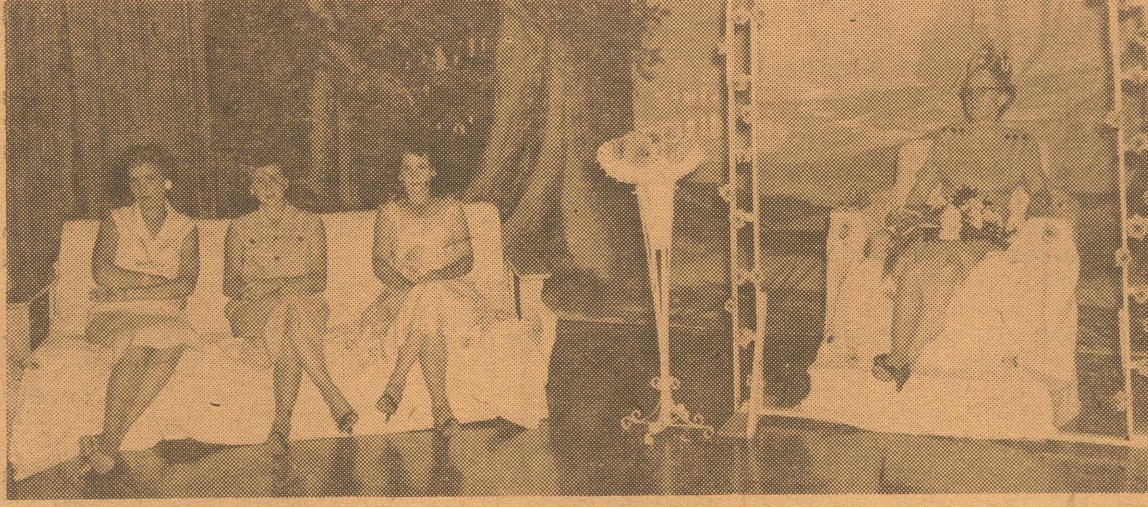

Homecoming Events Carried Out Saturday As Scheduled

Tentative plans call for the next homecoming to be held three years from now, in 1959.

Ed Meador was master of ceremonies at the assembly which was held in the school auditorium at 10:00 following registration. Mrs. Oliver Teele led the group in singing of the first verse of "America the Beautiful" and Meador welcomed everyone to this seventh homecoming.

Mrs. Ethel Etheredge was crowned queen of the Homecoming. This climaxed the queen's race which went on last week under sponsorship of the Junior Woman's Club. Other candidates, who were seated on the stage beside Mrs. Etheredge, were Jane Mund, Mrs. O. B. Bradshaw and Mrs. Bill Oglesby. Over \$90.00 was made on the queen's race by the club.

The award to the ex-student traveling the greatest distance to be present went to William McAngus, and the one for the teacher traveling farthest went to Jane Mund of Corpus Christi. These prizes consisted of Success subscriptions.

The \$5 prize for the most comical float was awarded Mrs. Gus Love and the class of '33, for several people in costume riding in a surrey.

Increase Voted Down

Voters of Bronte Independent school district turned thumbs down Tuesday on a proposal to raise school taxes from \$1.00 to \$1.25. Seventy-seven persons voted against the proposal, while 59 favored it.

The election was called by school trustees some two weeks after they were presented with a petition signed by 28 persons. Those who "worked up" the election said purpose of the increased tax rate was to enable school officials to pay off bonds on the new elementary school building in ten years. The present plan of paying calls for retiring the bonds in 15 years. — Bronte Enterprise.

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Workers Are Urged To Check Social Security

Ed Bowers, manager of the San Angelo District Office, urges all workers to check their social security record to see that all their 1955 wages have been reported and credited to their account. He especially urges all farm workers who were paid cash wages of as much as \$100 from one employer in 1955 to check to see that each of their employers reported their wages. Because valuable retirement and insurance protection is based on covered earnings, every worker should know the status of his account and what he and his family can expect from this protection. Bowers further advises that a special printed postcard, used to request the earnings statement, may be obtained from the local office, located at 307 Federal Building, San Angelo, or by contacting the representative who will be in Eldorado on July 19, in the District Courtroom at 1 p.m.

When your earnings statement is received from the social security accounting office in Baltimore, Md., check it against your personal records. If the statement is not complete or correct, contact the local social security office so that immediate action can be taken to correct your account. Failure to take this action may reduce the amount of monthly benefits payable to you or your survivors since all benefits are based on "average" earnings.

Bowers states that the local social security office has pamphlets which will help you estimate the amount you and your survivors will receive. Other informational material of interest to farmers and farm workers, household workers, employees of state and local governments, the self-employed and many others are also available.

Soil Conservation District News

Supervisors B. E. Moore, Ben Hext, J. Forrest Runge, Ford Bouwre and Ernest Foster Jr. of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district made a trip to the Range Experiment station at Sonora Friday, July 6th.

They were accompanied by County Judge W. R. Bearce, Vocational Agriculture Instructor Oliver Burk and Bill Rountree and Max Schrader of the Soil Conservation service.
Leo Merrill of the Experiment Station conducted the group on the tour of the station. Beginning with rangeland that had been severely overgrazed years ago Merrill showed how different soil conservation practices brought about the abundant stands of grass present today.

As part of his investigations he used different animal units per section for different pastures. They also varied the type of livestock by pasture. The management practice giving the most range improvement was that of deferred rotation. The pasture was stocked at 32 animal units to the section. This stocking rate gave the most profitable gains per acre. The pasture with heavy stocking rate of 48 animal units per section produced approximately 1/3 less gains per acre than the 32 animal units. The heavily stocked pasture (48 A. U.) showed evidence of over stocking whereas the other showed marked yearly improvement in grasses.

He also found that mixed classes of livestock, cattle, sheep, and goats, did best against pastures stocked with a single class. Under the deferred-rotation grazing program each pasture was rested four months then grazed eight months. Each year the pasture was deferred at a different time.

Mr. Merrill states the most important factor in ranching is the management of your grasses. If you manage your grass properly you will make the most effective use of your yearly rainfall.

Everyone in the group will agree the factor that most impressed them was the grass itself. By stocking the pastures according to the grass produced they were getting good improvement right on through the drought.

The Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district will sponsor its second annual Grass and Soil Judging contest August 7 and 8.

The contest is open to all boys. They will be separated into certain designated age groups.

The contest will be held the afternoon of August 7th with the presentation of awards being made the morning of Wednesday the 8th. The program will conclude with a barbecue dinner. The supervisors extend an invitation to all businessmen to attend.

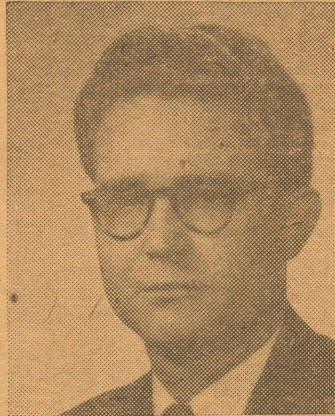

Wheat Quota Vote Comes Up Tomorrow

Friday, July 20th is the date of the wheat marketing quota referendum. Voting will be at the County ASC office, in the Wiedenmann building from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m.

Farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat as grain on a farm in 1957 are eligible to cast ballots in the wheat quota referendum. A two-thirds favorable vote will mean that marketing quotas and penalties on excess wheat will be in effect for the 1957 wheat crop. Under quotas, too, price support to growers in the commercial area who comply with their wheat acreage allotments will be at the full level available—between 75 and 90 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the growers voting disapprove quotas, the quotas will not be in effect, and the available price on the 1957 wheat crop to those who comply with farm wheat acreage allotments will be at a level of 50 percent of parity.

The vote is on wheat marketing quotas and not wheat allotments. Whether or not the vote is favorable on the quotas, acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1957 wheat crop.

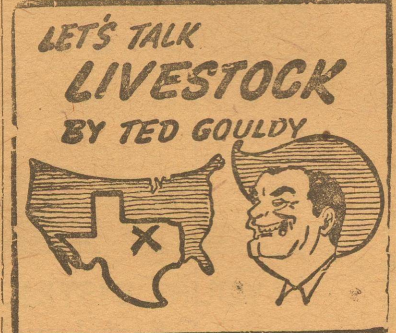

Prices Show Improvement

Fort Worth.—Mid-July cattle and calf prices showed unexpected strength at Fort Worth Monday. Despite numbers well above the 100,000 mark around the major market circle, the largest run of the season at the Fort Worth market, prices were fully steady to strong all through the list.

Fort Worth's Monday offering of cattle and calves was around the 11,000 marker, and a top of \$22 was paid for about 125 steers fed by Clyde McClung of Johnson County. It was the best price of the summer here.

Movement of both slaughter and stocker and feeder classes was active, and good and choice steers and yearlings ranged from \$16 to \$22, while common to medium sorts sold around \$10 to \$16. Fat cows drew \$9.50 to \$12.50, and canners and cutters sold from \$6.50 to \$9.50, some strongweight cutters above that range. Bulls moved in the \$9.50 to \$13.50 bracket.

Good and choice slaughter calves bulked at \$15 to \$18, with common and medium sorts \$11 to \$14, and culls around \$9 to \$10. Good and choice stocker steer calves sold from \$16 to \$18.50 and steer yearlings sold from \$17 down. Stocker cows trade continued dull in view of the hot dry weather.

New Publications Are Released By Ext. Service

College Station—Three new publications, B-827, Farm Sheep Production in Texas; MP-167, Which Feed is the Best Buy? and L-291, Move Forward with Farm and Home Development, have been released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. They are available from the offices of local county extension agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

The new sheep production bulletin is a handbook which present or prospective farm sheep raisers should find very valuable. The authors, J. A. Gray and J. M. Jones, point out management and operational practices which have been found most practical under The main requirements for a successful sheepman are having a genuine interest in the animals and providing for them a suitable environment, say the authors.

R. E. Burleson, extension dairy husbandman, in the publication on which feeds to buy has prepared tables showing the value of different feeds for dairy animals. Included are such feeds as concentrates, nonlegume and legume roughages and a dry roughage and concentrate mixture.

The leaflet on farm and home development is concise statement on what the unit approach to better farm family living can mean to cooperating families.

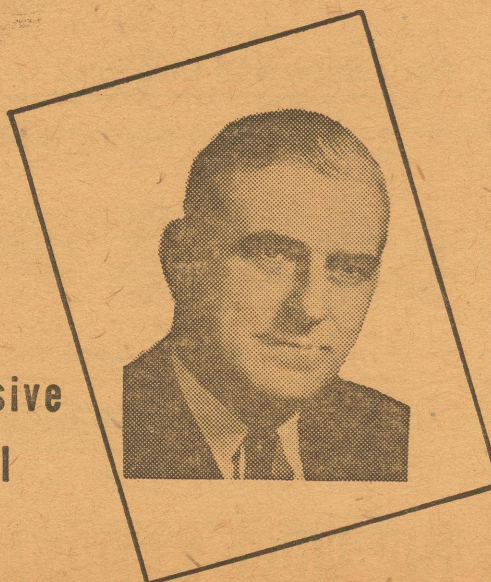

Ground Observers Schedule Test Period

Ground Observer Corps post supervisors have received the following letter from the filter center in San Antonio regarding a new test period coming up on July 25:

To: All GOC Post Supervisors
1. This Detachment has been designated by higher headquarters to conduct a 30 day test to determine the ratio between aircraft flash reports based on visual sighting and those based on sound of the aircraft. This information will be used in assessing the value of aural, or sound, reports in establishing track continuity.

2. The test period will begin on 25 July and continue through 24 August.

3. It is therefore requested that you direct your observers throughout this test period to report as follows:

a. Aircraft that are seen, no change in established procedures.
b. Aircraft that are heard but not seen, terminate the aircraft flash report with the word "audio."
c. Record the word "audio" in item 10 of the 6-3 form on all aural reports.

4. In this manner operations room personnel will be able to distinguish between visual and aural reports and consider this factor in plotting procedures.
