

## Large Turn-Out of Voters Expected In Primary Election Here Saturday

Schleicher county will join the rest of the state in naming officials from governor down to sheriff and two commissioners, when the first Democratic primary takes place this Saturday.

While not as many elective county officials are up for election as in other years, the primary Saturday is expected to bring out a good vote, both locally and over the state. Contests in which a candidate fails to get a majority of votes will carry over to the second or run-off primary in August.

### Local Races

Local interest in the Primary centers mainly in the race for Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, where Wallace Joiner and Orval Edmiston are running against the incumbent, E. H. Sweatt. The campaign here has been quiet but intensive—all three working hard.

In Precinct 1 Orland Harris and A. J. Halbert are in the commissioner's race against John Williams the incumbent. Robert Martin and Bob Anderson are running for commissioner of Precinct 3. The incumbent, Carroll White, did not announce for re-election.

The commissioners of Precincts 2 and 4 are not up for election this year under the new set-up in Texas in which county officials are now elected to four-year terms. Texas voters approved the new system in 1954 by constitutional amendment. County Clerk, County Treasurer, and County Judge are also not up election this year, but will be in the running two years from now.

Edwin Jackson and A. R. Parker are again opposing each other for County Democratic Chairman. The same ran in '54, with Jackson winning.

The polls open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. Each of these boxes will be the site of a precinct convention at 2:00 p. m., with exception of No. 1, where the precinct convention will be held in the district courtroom instead of the Memorial building.

### County Democratic Chairman

Edwin Jackson urged all voters of the county to vote as early in the day as possible at their respective polling places. This will speed the counting of votes, and enable returns to be announced sooner, after the polls close at 7:00. He also urged all voters to attend their precinct convention.

Returns will be posted at boards at the front of both drug stores, a preliminary count to be announced at about 7:30.

### Absentees Vote

County Clerk Patton Enochs reported 73 had voted absentee, of which 23 ballots were mailed out. Deadline for absentee voting in the first primary was Tuesday of this week.

### Other Events Saturday

Also taking place in Eldorado Saturday, in addition to the election, will be market day in the Word building on Main street, sponsored by the county council of Schleicher county Home Demonstration clubs.

HERE IS a recent picture of the Ray Bruton irrigation set-up considered one of the best in the county. The pump is delivering a stream of water that completely fills an 8-inch pipe, providing plenty of water for 160 acres of cotton. Keeping the water going around the clock, and applying poison and fertilizer as needed, Bruton says he is working toward maximum production. When this picture was taken two weeks ago, the cotton was nearly waist high. It will continue to grow until early September, when the water will be cut off.

The new Lions club street signs came in last week and city employees have been busy putting them up. A good project for all of us: learning names of streets and avenues!

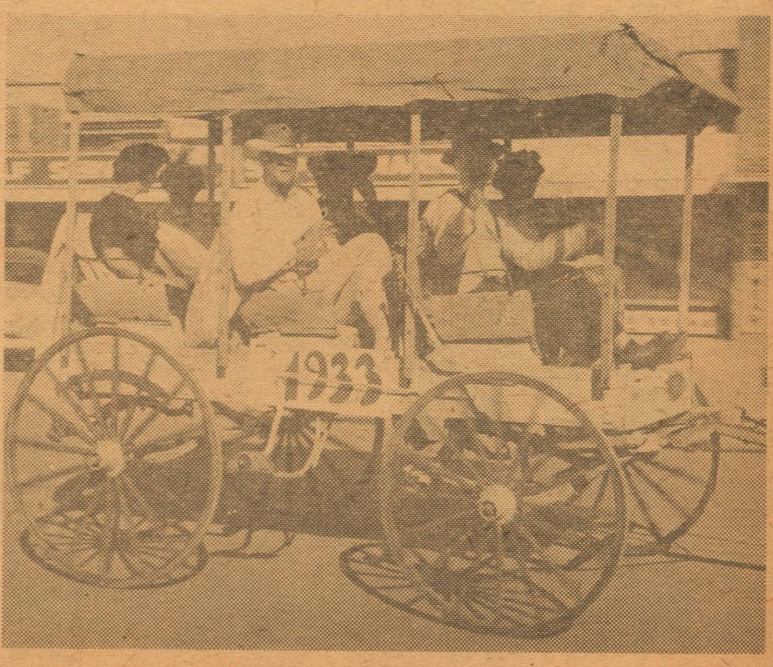

Austin.—Saturday is V-Day—"Voting Day" in Texas. It's the Democratic primary!

It could be the biggest voting day in Texas history. Paid poll taxes and exemptions total a record setting 2,410,188. Not all of these people will mark ballots. Some are Republicans. They don't vote in a Democratic Primary. And some Democrats will stay home. Not since the Ferguson Era have more than 80% of qualified voters turned out in a primary. General elections have run higher. Biggest vote ever cast in the state was 2,075,946 in the 1952 general election. This was an 87% turnout. Highest primary vote so far was the August, 1954, total of 1,458,220.

Whether candidates in their final fervent appeals, these last few hours, will be able to stir out more voters remains to be seen. Even harder to predict is who will have the edge in major state races. Most informed observers hedged their guesses with "ifs" "buts" and "maybes."

They watched the straw votes and sample polls, checked the betting odds, but still weren't sure. Major cause for unshureness is that rapid growth and shifts in Texas' population have wiped out many

of the old rules of thumb on what it takes to win.

Fifteen years ago the rural vote was all-important. Non-Metropolitan votes still are in the majority and they are "dependable" votes. However, the five major cities have between them nearly a million eligible voters—917,209. In this big city market, labor claims a 450,000 to 500,000 "sphere of influence" vote. But admitted it couldn't deliver that many in a bloc to anyone.

Another big question mark is how many voters will be influenced by the three segregation-related referendum issues.

**How To Vote On Referendums**

A check of voters who cast absentee ballots reveals much confusion about how to vote properly on the three referendums.

Robert Cargill, chairman of the Texas Referendum committee, puts it simply, in these words: "If you are opposed to mixed schools, mixed marriages and illegal federal interference, vote FOR all three propositions."

Due to the wording of the referendums, it is necessary for one to vote FOR the measures if he is AGAINST the subjects that each covers.

The use of double-negatives is most confusing.

**More Drought Aid Sought**

A committee of 175 Texas agricultural leaders, called together by Ag. Comm. John C. White, is working for two-way expansion of federal drought assistance.

Goals include a six-point credit program and direct subsidies of \$10 a ton for buying hay and other roughage.

County Judge W. S. Pickett of Karnes county heads an 11-member group designated to push the program.
