Eldorado All Set For Its Sixth Annual Homecoming

All is in readiness in Eldorado to stage the Sixth Annual Homecoming of Eldorado Exes!

Plans were not made overnight—the Homecoming festivities as they are held during the coming Saturday, represent many months of planning on the part of Mrs. Gus Love, Homecoming chairman, and her able list of committeemen representing the many classes who have attended Schleicher County schools.

(For the record—an ex is any person who has enrolled in any school in Schleicher County at any time in his life for as long as a day.)

Accompanying the Exes on their annual trek back to old stamping grounds in this county will be the wives, children, husbands, grandchildren and in-laws they accumulated over the years.

Many out-of-towners have already indicated that they expect to be here, some for the sixth time, and others for the first time. These, added to the list of local Schleicherites, will make an impressive crowd who will start off their day with registration Saturday morning at the school.

Registration Saturday A.M.

The Homecoming events will begin at 8:00 o'clock Saturday morning with registration at the school house. Mrs. Leslie Baker will preside at the register, assisted by several committeemen. Every ex-student who registers at this time will receive a free ticket to the dance which will be from 8:30 to 12:30 Saturday night.

Edward Meador will be master of ceremonies at the program beginning at 10 a.m. at the school house. This program will include the presentation of awards to the ex-student who traveled the greatest distance to attend, the ex-teacher who traveled the greatest distance to attend and the oldest ex-student with the youngest child (the greatest difference between the age of the parent and child).

The speaker of the day will be Peyton Cain, a former teacher in the local school system. Dave Williamson, another former teacher, is expected to speak briefly.

The closing event of the morning program will be the crowning of the Homecoming queen. There are 22 contestants, all exes or high school girls, in the race which has been in progress for two weeks. Voting will close at 3 p.m. Friday and the votes counted Friday night. The winner will be crowned Saturday morning.

The Junior Woman's club will have charge of stage decorations of the program at the school house.

Dinner At Noon

At 12:15 p.m. there will be a barbecue dinner at the court house. This barbecue, as in former years, is under the management of Orland Harris.

The Boy Scouts will sell drinks at the Memorial Building all day Saturday and Saturday night.

Afternoon Parade

AM floats to be entered in the parade are to be at the school house at 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon. The judges (secret) will be on hand at this time to begin their selection of the winning floats. The parade will begin at 5 p.m. at the school building and continue down Main street to a chosen corner where it will turn right for one block and reenter the Main Street at the Woolen Mills continuing back through town to the new pavement west of the court house where the parade will halt until after the judges have completed their decisions and prizes have been awarded. Added to the prizes this year is a \$10 prize for the most comical float. The former prizes of \$25, \$10 and \$5 given by the point system on beauty, ingenuity, and theme will also be awarded.

A new addition to the parade this year will be a Color Guard from Goodfellow Air Base in San Angelo. Captain Rodney Eddy is sending the Color Guard although he will not be able to accompany

the group to Eldorado.

It has been announced that all business houses will display their flags Saturday and that each business will have charge of its own decorations for Homecoming.

Palmer West and Gus Love have charge of the parade. The Fire truck will lead the parade and included in the floats will be the queen's float, sponsored by the Junior Woman's Club. This float will not be entered in competition for the prizes but is expected to be one worth seeing and long remembered.

Dance Saturday Night

Saturday night there will be a street dance between the Eldorado Drug store and Long's Variety store. The area will be roped off. Music for the dance will be furnished by the Top Hatters, a six-piece orchestra from Del Rio. The orchestra will be located in the center of the roped-off area. Pancho Bradley, B. L. Blakeway, and Bill McCravy have charge of arrangements. Tickets will be sold for \$1.00 per person. Every ex-student who registers at 8 a.m. at the school house will receive a free ticket to the dance.

Businesses To Close

The business houses will all close from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday to enable the business people and employees to attend the program at the school and the barbecue at noon.

HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB MEETING ATTRACTS THIRTY-EIGHT FROM COUNTY; SEVERAL CLUBS ARE TO BE ORGANIZED

Thirty-eight enthusiastic women and girls met Tuesday morning at 9:30 and organized the first Home Demonstration Clubs in Schleicher County since 1946. Group singing of America and a prayer for guidance opened the meeting. Mrs. Joe Kreklow, County home demonstration agent, gave a short history of the demonstration plan of education which had its beginning as a boll weevil fighting organization in 1903.

From this singular beginning the work of the Extension Service of the Texas A&M College has grown into the largest and most important rural educational agency in the world. In the words of Dr. Seaman A. Knapp the founder, we find the kernel of agricultural Extension work: "What a man hears he may doubt, what he sees he may possibly doubt, but what he does himself he can not doubt."

The 4-H group was present and chose to meet on every first and third Tuesday. The next meeting will be July 19 at 9:30 a.m. in Mrs. Kreklow's office which is on the second floor of the court house. This group has not formally organized because it knew many more girls who will be able to come to other meetings and these are to be included in organizational plans. Dale West, Martha Ellen Topliffe, Joy Dodd, Jimmy Dell Williams, Sue Blaylock, Janelle McCalla, Myrta Ann Topliffe and Judy McGregor were present at the first meeting.

Outbreak Of Blue Tongue Reported In County's Sheep

An outbreak of blue tongue has spread among the sheep over Schleicher County. This outbreak does not compare in intensity with the outbreak of 1953 at this time.

The death loss has not been too heavy and it is expected that it will not be any heavier than 1953. Blue tongue is a virus-produced disease which swells and blisters the mouths of sheep. It usually brings on stiffness, often with swelling of feet. There is usually considerable nasal discharge.

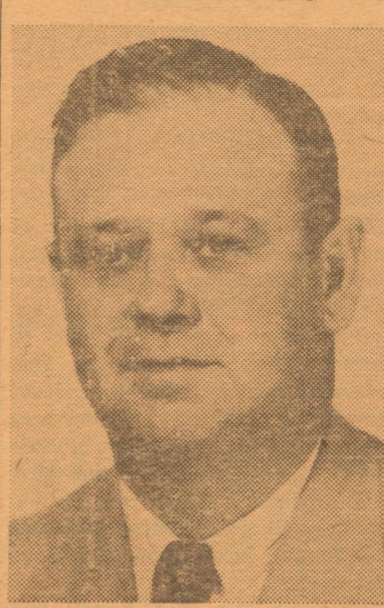
It is important not to disturb sheep that have blue tongue symptoms. Activity often brings on respiratory trouble.

By the time a sheep shows blue tongue, it is too late to vaccinate him. Some ranchers give penicillin shots to sheep with blue tongue. This won't do much good for blue tongue, but will ward off other "secondhand invaders" such as pneumonia, etc.

Blue tongue strikes hardest among yearling and 2-year-old sheep. Older ones often have built up an immunity from previous outbreaks, and baby lambs usually get such immunity from their mothers. This wears off after the lamb is weaned.

Blue tongue is spread by a species of gnat, which breeds in damp places. Blue tongue began to show up a few days after the last rain.

CONTRACTORS GET METHODIST BLDG. SPECIFICATIONS

In the hands of contractors this week are plans and specifications for the proposed new educational building for the Methodist church, as the result of a planning session of the building committee Thursday night.

At the meeting were Building Committee chairman W. A. Shuller, other committee members, Frank Meador, Edward Meador, and Lawrence Steen, and the pastor, Rev. M. C. Stearns and Mrs. Stearns. One committeeman, Ray Tisdale, has moved away, and will be replaced by a new committee member.

The building will have walls of hollow tile, in a shade matching the church building as nearly as possible. This material has been on order for some time from a Coleman concern. The gable roof will be of white marble. Cabinets for the kitchen will be included in the contract, and there will be classrooms for the children's department. There will also be central heating for the 93 by 34 foot structure.

Contractors have been given two weeks to study the plans and specifications and submit their bids, and it is expected that actual work will start shortly thereafter. The necessary half of the total cost is being raised, this being a requirement of the church for building projects.

The building committee state that work will go right along during the early fall and it is expected that 90 days will see completion of the building.

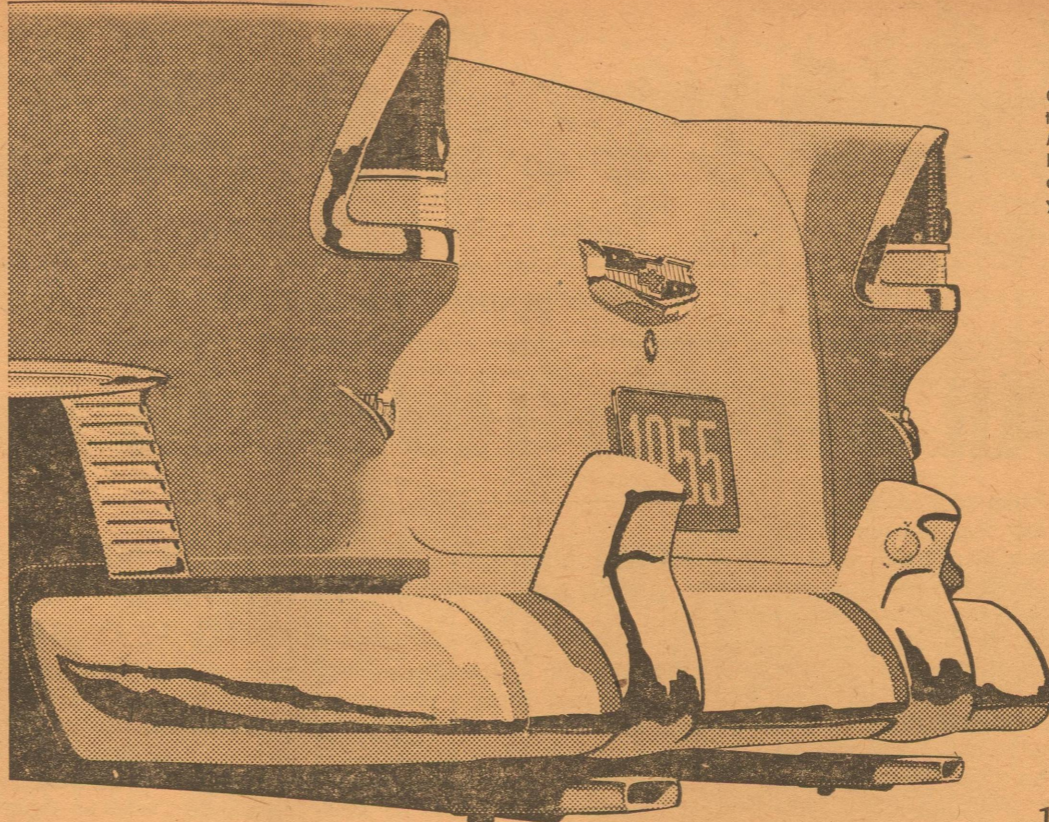

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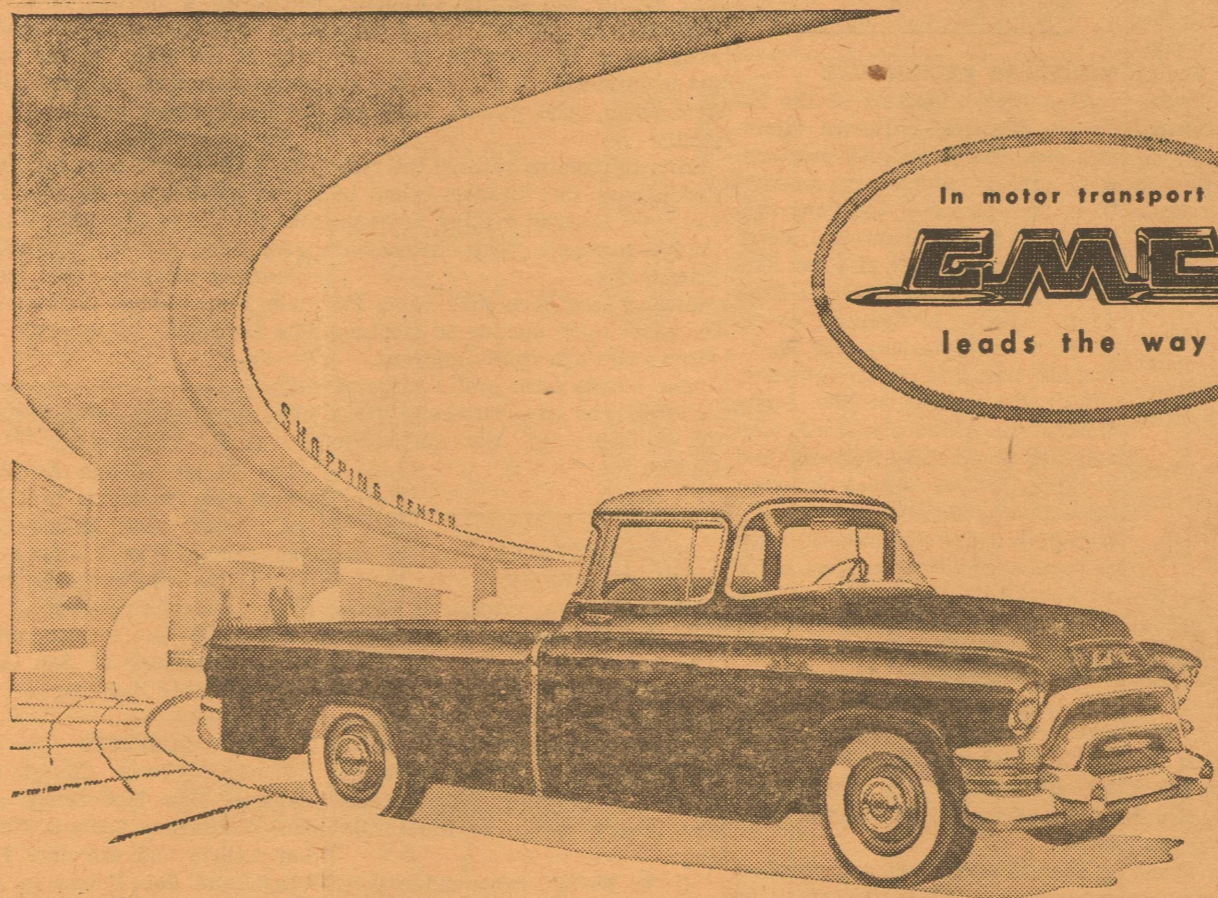
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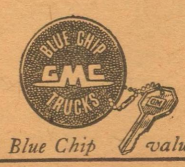

Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District

"What is the story of community wealth? It's Soil Conservation. Protecting what we have today so we will have something left for tomorrow."

Cecil Townsend, operator of the Dr. Roy Glass Ranch 18 miles east of Eldorado is well pleased with the way things are looking on the place at the present time. Benefits of conservation practices applied on the ranch with the help of Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District are becoming apparent.

"The two field diversions he recently constructed are doing a good job in diverting water from the fields during the recent rains," Cecil said. Cecil also likes the way the 1000 foot net wire diversion is performing. Sidecoats grama, vine mesquite, little and silver bluestem can already be seen growing vigorously and making a good seed crop above and below the net wire diversions. This being the results of the net wire diversions checking the water and slowing it down so it will have more time to penetrate and get into the ground resulting in the production of more grass.

The feed Cecil has planted on the contour looks good, and that planted just above terraces is looking even better because of the extra water they held.

Some of the better grasses are seeding out in the pastures as a result of being completely deferred during the growing season and summer months. Cecil said, "We will probably hold our lambs through the winter as the result of our being lightly stocked, pasture deferment and growing extra grass. We plan to stock lighter for a while to see how it works out."

of Eldorado, held nearly all of the 1.5 inches of rain that fell the latter part of June. Marvin had pitted about 30 acres before the rain and was anxious to see how much water the pits would hold. He drove over his rangeland soon after it stopped raining to see how the pits were holding. "The pits had filled with water and most of it had already soaked into the ground. There was no water running off the pitted area. In the same pasture next to the pits water was standing in low places and a lot of water was running off the pastureland to a diversion terrace," Marvin stated. Marvin has pitted several more acres since the rain and plans to pit most of his 180 acres of rangeland.

All the water from the rain the last of June was held on a 69 acre field by level closed end terraces on farmland operated by Oran Enochs. Oran received 3.25 inches of rain with 1.9 inches of it coming pretty fast.

His level closed end terraces were constructed the first part of the year. Since the completion of the terraces two good rains have fallen. The first good rain fell the 14th of May and 3.25 of it the latter part of June. Oran states, "All the water was held on the field by the terraces. Before the level closed end terraces were built I lost a big part of every good rain and a good bit of topsoil."

A good cover of grass with the better grasses making seed on 343 acres of rangeland operated by Oran is the result of good conservation practices applied. As a result of his well rounded soil and water conservation program Oran deferred the pasture from February to June 15th, 1954. By grazing the pasture after good growth and a seed crop has been made and by taking the stock off when the grass begins to get short—the pasture has improved. As a result of this improvement more of the water is held where it falls and more pounds of grass per acre is produced. Oran stated "I am well pleased with the improvement made on my rangeland and plan

to keep a close watch on it and handle it so it will continue to improve."

While going over the pasture with Oran, Lloyd B. Johnson of the Soil Conservation Service, pointed out that "to grow grass takes water and to be sure the greatest amount possible of each rain gets into the ground a good cover of grass is necessary at all times."
