Lunch Room

The lunch room will serve lunch Monday. The price of lunches this year will be 25c for elementary students and 30c for high school students, if a meal ticket is purchased. Individual lunches will be 30c for the elementary students and 35c for the high school students. Cost of meals for teachers is the same as high school students. Guests are welcome during the year but regular adult meals to non-school personnel is prohibited by the USDA lunchroom agreement.

Mrs. Lester Henderson will have charge of the cafeteria again this year, and will be assisted by Mrs. Emma Bradshaw and Mrs. Mary Gausemeier.

Elementary class divisions as to teachers and rooms will be divided by a drawing. The boys will draw numbers "one" and "two", then the girls will draw in the same manner. The two teachers assigned to each grade will draw numbers and the students drawing no. 1 will go to teacher having drawn no. 1 and students drawing 2 will report to the teacher having drawn no. 2. Students that were retained will not be assigned to the same teacher they had last year.

After the opening assembly the high school students will report to their home rooms to be issued books, lockers and complete their schedule. New students should register with the principal. Classes for

the day will be approximately 30 minutes and lunch will be served at the usual hour, 12:15.

Vaccination for smallpox and diphtheria is compulsory for all beginning students (first graders). No child will be admitted to the first grade who does not present evidence of having received these shots—a smallpox within the past four years, and diphtheria the last year and a half.

Elementary pupils in grades 1-6 who were not pre-enrolled in May should enroll at the Elementary principal's office between the

hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Thursday and Friday, Sept. 1 and 2. Please bring report cards and book cards.

Student insurance will be available again this year for all students at the rate of \$1.50 each for this school year. This insurance becomes effective when the \$1.50 is paid to the teacher. Each child will be given a form to bring to the parent which should be read carefully and signed by the parent if child is to be insured. School officials prefer payment by check as this assures parent a returned receipt which will not be lost by child. The school is not selling this insurance, but is endorsing it and making it available for those who want it.

Funeral Today For Henry Mittel

Henry Mittel, 59, World War I veteran, charter member of the Fundamental Baptist Church, and prominent rancher who also operated an irrigation project, died at 1:35 Wednesday morning, Aug. 31, 1955, at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora. He had been in failing health for a year or two, and seriously ill two weeks.

Funeral services were held at the Fundamental Baptist Church at 10:00 this morning, Thursday, conducted by the Rev. Cliff McDougal of Burnett, former Eldorado pastor, assisted by the Rev. H. B. Reynolds of Eldorado. Interment was made in the Eldorado Cemetery.

Pall bearers were: L. W. Steen, Jimmy West, Earl Cathey, Forrest Runge, Ollie Runge, W. O. Alexander, Lavelle Meckel, and Curtis Stockton of Eldorado, and Tom Davis of Sonora.

Henry Mittel was born July 10, 1896, in Gillispie County to Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Mittel. In 1907 he moved with the family to Sutton County, and grew to manhood and received his education there.

In 1927 he was married to Mammie Smith, at Sonora and in 1928 moved to Schleicher County to take up residence on the family ranch 12 miles north of Eldorado. He has made his home in this county continuously since that time.

He was a veteran of World War I. He was a charter member when the Fundamental Baptist Church was organized in 1935. He was a senior deacon in the church and was church treasurer many years.

He was known as a prominent rancher, and he also has been operating an irrigation project on his place at Huldale several years.

Mrs. Mittel died in 1951 after a long illness. The couple lost two sons, Stephen, who died in 1952, and John Dee, whose death occurred in 1944. Two brothers, Bill and John, also preceded Mr. Mittel in death.

Surviving are four sons, Howard, Henry, Jr., Raymond and Dan of Eldorado; his mother, Mrs. Christina Mittel of Sonora; three brothers, Archie and Perry of Eldorado and Ben of Evant; two sisters, Mrs. Charlie Hull and Mrs. Joe Berger of Sonora; and two grandsons, Frank Clarke Mittel and Howard Paul Mittel.

Ram Tests Planned For Sonora Station

Sonora, Texas Sheep breeders will begin their ninth annual ram performance and progeny test, September 7, at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora, Superintendent W. T. Hardy has announced. All sheep intended for the test should arrive prior to this date.

This test is a cooperative effort by breeders and experiment station personnel to improve important economic factors in sheep such as daily rate of gain, fleece weight and staple length. Other traits evaluated include face covering, conformation, belly wool and skin folds.

This test is open to any sheep breeder who wants to test his rams for their production of these characteristics. Rules for entrance of rams require that they be subject to registry, that they be a group of four rams by one sire, and that they were dropped between November 1, 1954 and April 15, 1955. Further information may be obtained by writing to Dr. Hardy.

The only cost to the breeders is for feed the rams eat while on test. Oscar L. Carpenter, animal husbandman at the Sonora station, will handle the feeding and management of these ram lambs.

Sheep breeders who will be at the Sonora station September 7 will be asked to consider suggested changes in procedure recommended by a small group of cooperators. These include shortening the feeding period from 224 to 180 days and that samples of wool be taken from each ram at the beginning and at the end of the test to determine the effect of feeding on the grade of the wool.

SCIENTISTS SEEK ANSWER TO WHY FLIES ATTRACT FLIES WHEN FEEDING
College Station.—Scientists are hot on the trail of a mysterious substance which may make fly control much easier.
The clue, according to Extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller, was supplied by Army scientists several years ago when they discovered that as flies feed, the material upon which they are feeding becomes more attractive to other flies. Apparently feeding flies deposit some unknown substance which is attractive to other flies.
Now entomologists of the USDA's research laboratory in Orlando, Florida, have actually collected some of the material which they refer to as "fly factor." By dissolving sugar upon which flies have fed in water, acetone or ether and then removing the sugar, "fly factor" was collected.
Fuller says the entomologists, turned detectives, don't know what they have, but it works. Fresh sugar treated with "fly factor" attracted more flies than untreated sugar. Efforts at isolation of the material will continue and the secret of its chemical makeup will be studied. If it could be produced artificially Fuller believes it would greatly increase the effectiveness of present fly-killing insecticides by making them more attractive to flies.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd has warned that school integration should not precede legislative action. He, like the Citizens Council, has insisted that the law is presently set up to make payments only to segregated schools.

Liberals have been courting his entry in the race, and he is "thinking about it." There were those who said he "sounded like a candidate" in his talk on "ideas and ideals."
Former Speaker Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba, only announced candidate for governor, has held a meeting of his statewide campaign steering committee in Austin. He said he will name county and precinct campaign chairmen by January. State Senator Jimmy Phillips of Angleton is an intended candidate. He was present in Henderson when Hart spoke. A statewide rally in Galveston on Sept. 1 was planned by his friends as the send-off for his campaign.
Mrs. Wayne W. Wagoner of Bowie, widow of the senator killed in a car accident two weeks ago, also has been mentioned as a possible candidate. She was the only other speaker at the Henderson rally which her husband was to have addressed. Hers was not a political speech.
Senator Price Daniel, currently abroad, is holding up disclosure of his decision whether to run for governor next year, two years before expiration of his first Senate term. Governor Shivers hasn't announced his plans. "Anything can happen; at this time I am not a candidate for anything," he told newsmen.
Biggest But Not Cheapest
Texas has become the principal producing state of Aluminum Company of America's vast chain of aluminum refining and smelting operations. Persuaded to try aluminum for some of its heavy permanent road signs, the Highway Department asked for bids. When they were opened, the Canadian aluminum industry turned up with a bid on imported metal eight per cent under the lowest domestic bid.

Austin, Main impact of the 54th Legislature will be felt next week when most of the bills it passed will become state law.

WTU's local office here in Eldorado will mail out the new cards for the first time today, instead of the long statement form used so many years.

Inauguration of the new statement form was decided on after lengthy study and investigation which showed the new method would provide a more convenient statement for the customer and a more efficient system for the Company.

Jerry Pennington, WTU's local manager, said, "The new post card statements are prepared on long sheets of heavy paper that feed through machines in a continuous run much as newsprint runs through a printing press. The machines figure the statements, print them, and separate them for mailing automatically. The 2c postage is printed on each statement at the time the statement is figured and the information is printed on the statement. Use of a mailing permit eliminates the need for stamping the statements separately."

Pennington said every effort has been made in preparing this new statement form to keep it as simple as possible and to present all the information the customer desires. He pointed out that the new statement interprets service charges in both kilowatts of electric power used and hours Reddy Kilowatt worked in the home; that is, kilowatt hours of electric service. It was pointed out that the new statement is basically a simpler and modernized form of the old statement. There has been no change in rates or manner in calculating the statement. The due date and delivery date remain the same as before.

"This new billing system," he said, "is a result of one of the many studies and plans which the Company constantly has under consideration in their efforts to hold the line and keep electric rates at the pre-war level while the cost of everything else has gone up and up."

Soil Conservation District News

Let's take a look at our fields and pastures since our first good general rain of the year fell in late June. In observing how the cotton was coming along in the different localities of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District a person is able to find both good and excellent cotton and very poor stands of cotton. Many of these contrasting stands were planted at the same time and had equal amounts of rainfall.

In checking reasons for the cause of these differences one thing stands out as the greatest factor. Terracing and contour farming is the most vital factor in crop production in this county. Other factors, such as the use of legumes in a crop rotation will cause contrasts with fields where they have not been used against fields where they are used. However, legumes are grown so rarely in this county they could not be said to cause any of the differences observed.

In this area of uncertain rainfall it is important that every drop be made to count. Losing half of a rainfall is losing sorely needed rainfall you cannot get back; nor is it likely to rain again in time to make up for the loss of it.

Of the fields checked the unterraced and the uncontroled fields had the poorest stands. Fields with excessive slope, but contoured, fared a little better. Fields such as these needed terraces to help that precious bit of rainfall to hold. It was the difference in amount of rainfall held that made the difference in stands. Contour farming without terraces will do an excellent job of holding rainfall if the slope is slight. Terraces are needed to hold all of your rainfall on anything greater than a slight slope, or where rainfall is heavy and uncertain when it does come.

For the protection of your land and production look into the possibilities of getting that field terraced before next planting time.

Lloyd Johnson and Max Schrader, of the Soil Conservation Service, assisted Mr. A. R. Parker in laying out a net wire diversion on his ranch 24 miles southwest of Eldorado.

A ranch conservation plan was completed for C. M. Whitten last week. A range field tour is being planned for sometime during the month of September. The place and date have yet to be decided, but let's plan to get out and see what good sound range conservation will do for a place.

Wildcat Slated On Jim O'Harrow Ranch

Cosden Petroleum Corp., Big Spring, and Fortune Drilling Corp., San Angelo, have announced location for a 5,500-foot rotary wildcat in Schleicher County, 17 miles northeast of Eldorado and 1/4-mile south of the one-well O'Harrow gas field. It will be the No. 1 Jim O'Harrow.

The project will be drilled by one of Fortune's rotary rigs and will test four formations.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 69-H-GH&SA.

The O'Harrow gas field was opened by Ashmun & Hilliard, Ltd., Midland, and Fortune Drilling Corp. No. 1 Mrs. Grace O'Harrow, dual Strawn gas-distillate discovery, finalized in April. It gauged 4,200,000 cubic feet of gas daily plus 15 barrels of distillate per million cubic feet of gas through perforations between 5,079-5,083 feet opposite the Strawn sand.

It gauged 1,050,000 cubic feet of gas daily plus 70 barrels of distillate per million cubic feet of gas through perforations between 5,375-85 feet opposite the Strawn reef. It had 25 feet of effective pay in the reef.
