Austin. — Strict secrecy has shrouded Travis County's land fraud indictments. An unknown number of them have been made. Names of those indicted will be withheld, pending arrests.

District Attorney Les Proctor said the indictments were sealed "in the interest of law enforcement." He would not estimate how long it might be before the names could be made public. Proctor also had asked for a special jury to prevent any let-up in the investigation.

District Judge Charles O. Betts signed an order calling a special grand jury into session on March 10. His order does not limit the jury to land investigations, although that is its actual purpose.

Betts' order will keep the jury in session until the last Saturday in July. The previous grand jury's session expired March 5. Rumors in Capitol corridors have it that the most outstanding breaks in the land investigation are yet to come.

McLarty Returns

T. J. McLarty of Denver, Colo., one of several real estate promoters indicted in connection with veterans' land transactions, returned to Texas to post a \$26,400 bond and talk to legislative investigators.

Shepperd Busy

A report from the Attorney General's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepperd's office has been a beehive of activity. Shepperd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18,000 miles and have put in over 41,000 man-hours of time on the veterans land investigation. Shepperd has met with grand juries almost daily.

Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt Co. grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight persons involved in veterans' land sales. In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County. Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepperd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,000.

Attorney General Shepperd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that this month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."

Session Passing

Half of the regular session of the 54th Legislature is gone. Gov. Shivers said he wasn't perturbed at the slow start on important tax, water, appropriations and other legislation. He hadn't expected the lawmakers to finish much legislation in the first half of the session. There still is plenty of time, the Governor believes, to complete the program.

Minor Water Bills

Two minor water bills got an okay in the House. One gives the

State Water Board power to review proposals for federal projects. Veto power for the governor, originally in the bill, was stricken out. The other requires water districts to register with the state board. Important water conservation measures, involving millions of dollars, have not reached a vote in either house.

Insurance Bills

Two big insurance bills were hung in committee. Rep. Floyd Bradshaw's omnibus bill would regulate fire and casualty companies of all kinds. Sen. Searcy Bracwell's would regulate life companies. Regulations in Bradshaw's bills would: Raise minimum capital and surplus requirements (combined) to \$200,000 for fire companies; \$300,000 for casualty; and \$500,000 for companies writing more than one line.

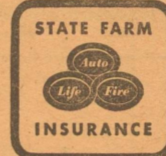

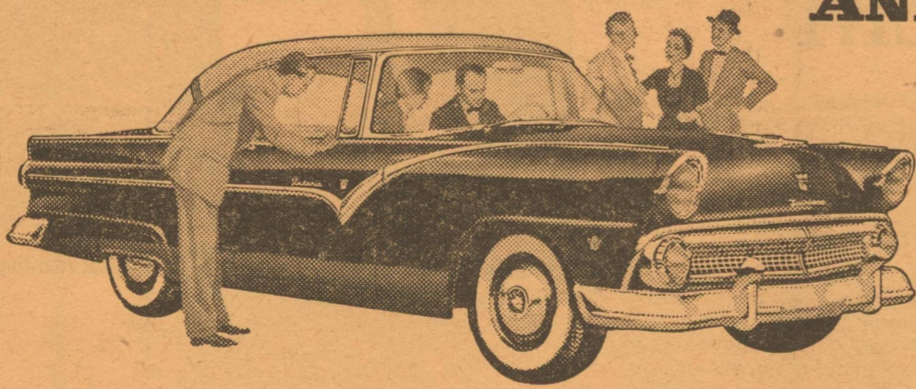

Paving Contract

C & C Asphalt Paving Co., of Colorado City was the successful bidder on the Bronte paving project with a bid of \$66,415.70. The bid was let to the firm last Friday at a special meeting of the Coke County Commissioners Court. It was some \$11,000 lower than the engineer's estimate of \$77,639.90. The bid covers paving of 111 blocks in the city.—Bronte Enterprise.

Special instruments have been installed here in a program designed to identify tornado and other severe storm conditions.

Mason has been chosen as one of 170 stations being established to provide a dense network of special recording instruments which are expected to materially assist in the intensified severe storm research program.—Mason Co. News.

No Phone Agreement

No agreement has been reached in the matter of permitting an increase of Robert Lee telephone rates. City officials held another meeting Friday night with representatives of General Telephone Co. Included in the talks is the necessity of providing better service on rural lines and installation of a dial system, probably next year.—Robert Lee Observer.

Panther Killed

A seven-foot, two-inch panther was killed on the Aldwell Brothers ranch 23 miles southwest of Sonora Friday afternoon. The panther had been caught in a trap set by L. E. Johnson, foreman of the Aldwell ranch, and Loyd McMullen, and had dragged the trap several miles and hidden in a thicket. The animal was tracked by Johnson, McMullen and S. M. Loeffler with the aid of dogs. It weighed about 100 pounds.—Devils River News.

Home Accidents More Frequent With Older People

College Station.—"Over 65" is considered a dangerous driving speed. But, asks the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Committee, has "over 65" ever been considered as a dangerous age from the standpoint of farm and home accidents?

Figures released by the National Safety Council to the Texas Committee show that 29,000 deaths in 1953 resulted from home accidents, and 15,700 of these were to men and women over 65. Here is why, says the committee, that special attention should be given the older group in any safety program involving the home. Figures show that some 12 1/2 million persons or about 8 percent of our total population are in the over-65 age group and the number is increasing.

A closer look at the 1953 Safety Council report shows that falls accounted for 12,600 of the home accident deaths of older people in 1953. Eliminate the hazards, says the Texas Committee, which can cause home accidents and remember that older folks do not always

see, hear nor coordinate as well as younger people. They offer these suggestions. Put grab-bars in bath tubs; avoid the use of small throw-rugs; do not wax floors highly; be sure all stairs and halls are well-lighted and contain no boxes, toys and other items over which to stumble; put secure handrails beside all stairs; keep sidewalks and steps around the house in good repair and clear of obstructions and use night lights in bedrooms, halls and bathrooms.

Fire prevention is especially important since 1,400 persons over 65 died from burns or injuries from fires in 1953. Just don't forget the older folks, cautions the Safety Committee, in your home and community safety program for they too love life.

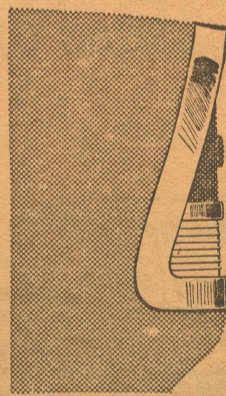
