McLarty Returns

T. J. McLarty of Denver, Colo., one of several real estate promoters indicted in connection with veterlans' land transactions, returned to Texas to post a \$26,400 bond and talk to legislative investigators.

Shepperd Busy

A report from the Attorney General's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepperd's office has been a beehive of activity. Shepperd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18000 miles and have put in over 41,000 manhours of time on the veterans land investigation. Shepperd has met with grand juries almost daily

Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt Co. grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight per sons involved in veterans' land sales. In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County. Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepperd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,0000.

Attorney General Shepperd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that this month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."

Session Passing






