Preparation of Wool & Mohair Subject For Saturday Program

Correct wool preparation and shearing methods will be demonstrated at the 4-H and FFA barns Saturday, April 23 beginning at 1:30 p. m.

J. A. Gray, extension husbandman, and Billy Kidd assisting, will demonstrate proper shearing methods and wool preparation. There will be other wool men connected with the industry, present to appear on the program, giving the wool buyer's viewpoint with discussion of the incentive program, including Ed Hill, local warehouseman, and Ernest Williams, secretary of the Sheep & Goat Raisers.

The program follows:
1. Culling and selection of sheep. Open discussion, J. A. Gray, Billy Kidd.
2. Proper shearing methods.
3. Wool preparation.
4. Discussion of grades of wool and mohair.

5. Wool buyers viewpoint.
6. Discussion of incentive program, Ed Hill and Ernest Williams.
7. Panel discussion.
The Schleicher County Sheep Improvement committee cordially invites all ranchers and other interested parties to attend.

A new element, the buyer's viewpoint on wool, will be added in a talk by Richard Bruton, a professional wool buyer from the East and a product of Schleicher County, now a visitor here.

With eight years of experience as buyer for Botany Mills, and some more recent experience as a buyer for Stratmore's six mills, he will stress factors which influence the buyer when he selects quality wool.

His contribution to the day's program is expected to be one of the highlights of the event.

ELECTRIC CO-OP RUNS NEW LINE TO FOUR RANCHES

The construction crew of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op is staking out lines to bring Co-Op service to four ranches in Crockett County.

As staked out the lines run from the Texas Range station, 18 miles north of Ozona, on north and northwest to the Bode Owens ranch, following a route which will bring service to the four ranches crossed.

The new line will also serve as a tie line between the Midway substation, 20 miles northwest of Ozona, and Eldorado, providing two-way feed over much of the route. The tie lines are important factors in lessening time of outages, reports the Co-Op manager, Don McCormick.

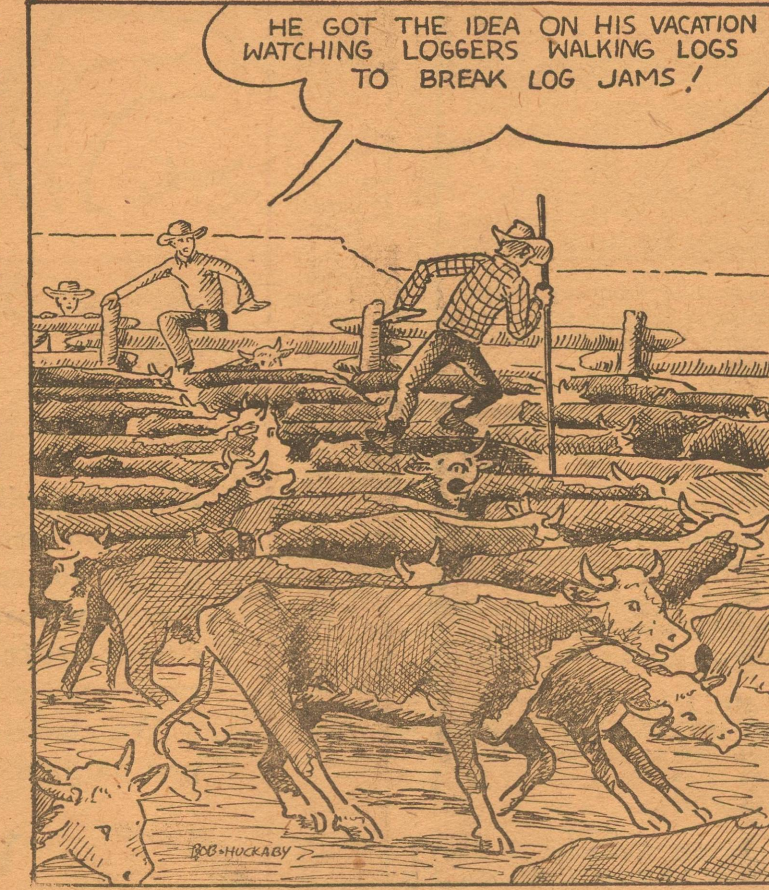
Oil News

Senior Trip Is Success

The Senior class returned from Galveston Monday night, April 11. Nineteen seniors and three sponsors made the trip to San Jacinto battlefield, Battleship Texas, and Galveston. Salk Vaccine Administered

The Salk polio vaccine was administered Monday, April 18 to approximately 125 first and second graders at the school. Those were the children whose parents had signed request forms sent out by the school, and reports given to Dr. Lindsey and Dr. Mowrey as of last Friday. The second inoculation will be given in approximately two weeks, or whenever the vaccine is made available to local physicians. The third and last shot, to follow in seven months will not be furnished by the National Foundation, but will be the responsibility of the parents, and can be obtained from their family physician.

Administering of vaccine was handled by Dr. Jack Mowrey, Dr. W. H. Lindsey, Mrs. Kinser, Mrs. McBurnett and Mrs. Hale. The above personnel rendered their services without charge and in such an efficient way that no disruption was noticeable in the school's daily program.

Broilers and Fryers On May Plentiful List

College Station.—Rising spring production returns broilers and fryers to the plentiful foods list for the first time this year.

Raisins also are highlighted on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's May list of abundant foods.

After the regular monthly survey of food stocks in this area, the USDA has found that supplies of more than a dozen items are large enough to rate a position on May's list.

They include: beef, pork, canned tuna, frozen halibut fillets, milk and other dairy products, rice, small size prunes and vegetable fats and oils.

Only fresh fruits for May are oranges and grapefruit. Also, processed citrus products are in good supply.

Texas Woman Submits Prize-Winning Recipe

The third place winner in the contest recently held by the Texas Beef Council was the Texas woman who submitted this recipe:

Texas Goulash

- 2 lbs. Boneless stew meat
- 2 tablespoons flour.
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 3 tablespoons bacon drippings
- 1 cup chopped onions,
- 3 cloves of garlic, cut
- 1/2 cup water.
- 1/2 cup carrots, sliced 1/4 in thick
- 1 cup celery, sliced 1/2 in thick
- 1/2 package frozen lima beans or 1 cup cooked, dried limas
- 1/4 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
- 1 large potato, cut in eighths or smaller.
- 1/2 cup sour cream.

Cut meat in to 2 in. cubes and dredge in flour sifted with salt and chili powder. Brown in bacon drippings; add onions, garlic and water. Simmer on top of stove in heavy pot for about 2 hours or until meat is tender, replacing water as needed for moisture. Add carrots, celery and lima beans to meat during last half hour of cooking. Sprinkle with monosodium glutamate. Place potatoes on top. Cover and cook until potatoes are tender. Add sour cream and blend. (For thicker gravy, add 1 tablespoon flour to sour cream.) Bring to boiling point only; do not boil. Serve hot as meal-in-one. Yield: six servings.

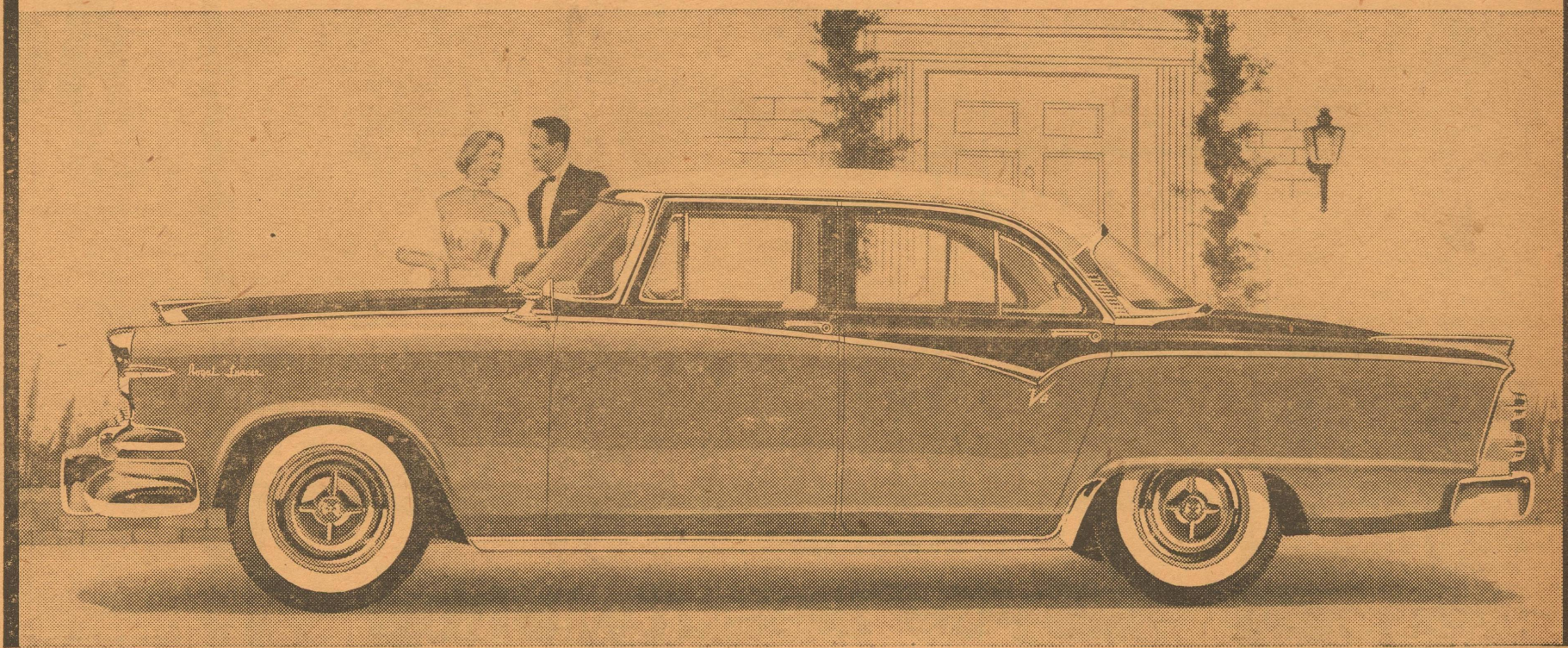

Ten Most Destructive Insect Pests In Texas

College Station. — Cotton bollworms, grasshoppers and boll weevils were the three most damaging insects to Texas crops last year.

Aphids, rice weevils, cutworms, spider mites, thrips, armyworms and plant bugs complete the list of the state's 10 most destructive insect pests in their order of economical importance, according to a report by Dr. J. C. Gaines of the department of entomology of the Texas A. and M. College system.

Pink bollworms should be added to this list, Gaines says, not because of its present economic damage, but for its potential damage to Texas cotton.

The cotton bollworm also is known as the corn earworm or tomato fruitworm.

Nationwide, the corn earworm, grasshoppers, aphids and mites were listed among the more important insects of 1954 by entomologists. Corn earworms, aphids and mites also dominated the 1953 listings.

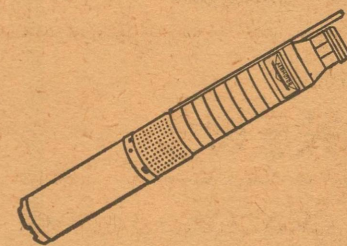

Soil Conservation District News

The Board of Supervisors of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District in their regular monthly meeting Friday, April 1, voted to hold the land judging, range management, and plant identification contest on Wednesday, June 29th.

The supervisors are very much interested in the contest as it is primarily to be set up for the 4-H club and FFA boys. Mr. Runge, chairman of the board of supervisors, said that it is important that we take steps to teach these young boys plants, soils, and how to use and manage them. Ben Hext, member of the board, agreed with Runge as well as the rest of the board of supervisors.

Look for big things to take place in Eldorado during the week of May 9-15. This has been designated as Soil Conservation District week in Texas by Governor Allan Shivers. On Wednesday, May 11, the local Lions Club will present the plaque to the outstanding soil conservation district cooperator, which is sponsored each year by the Fort Worth Press. Following the presentation the group will see the highly publicized film "Return To Eden."

This week of special observance of soil conservation districts will end on May 15, which has been designated as Soil Stewardship Sunday. Services are planned for

some of our local churches whereby our people will be reminded of their dependence on the land and of their responsibility for proper stewardship of this God-given resource.

Have you purchased your guar seed for the planting of some of those reduced cotton acreages? As you know, guar is a summer legume which can be planted in late cotton planting time. That is one of the good features about guar states Bill Rountree, SCS work unit conservationist. "You can just wait until you get the rainfall behind you—then plant and you will produce a crop." Last year Vernon Pfluger planted guar after the rains had fallen and he made a crop with just a few sprinkles from time to time after the planting, Rountree stated.

Guar is like any other crop—certain steps such as purchase of seed, and deciding where and how many acres to plant needs to be decided and taken care of now. Planting time will be here before you know it—will you be ready?

Rountree said "We still need a crop to give the soil a good shot in the arm and up to now guar has as good a possibility as any crop we know of. It can be grown for both a cash and a soil improving crop. However its greatest value will be realized when grown for soil improvement." Farmers in neighboring soil conservation districts are of the opinion now, from what they have seen of guar, that they can nearly double their cotton

production in the future by using guar in their crop rotation, Rountree concluded.

From all indications blue panic is here to stay. It just has too many good possibilities according Max Schrader, technician of the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the district. Max said, "All of the blue panic grass in this district was planted during periods of extreme drought. The stands of grass that were able to become established are a good indication of what it will do under normal rainfall conditions. Given a favorable season in which to plant, we should have little trouble in getting good stands of grass."

Make plans now for planting some acreages to guar and blue panic. Contact the local office of the Soil Conservation Service, or the Soil Conservation District Supervisors if they can be of any assistance to you in getting this job done.

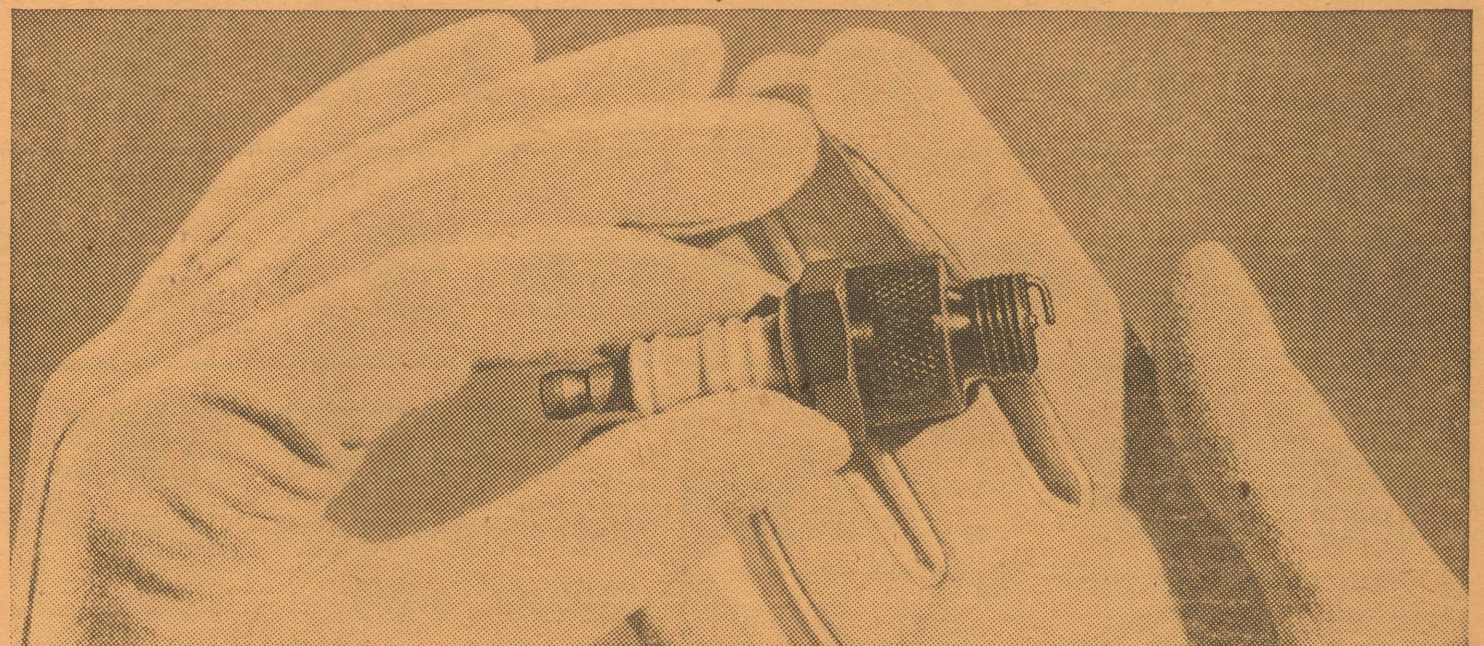
