## Class of 23 EHS Graduates Receive Diplomas Last Week

Twenty-three Seniors received their diplomas from Board President Kenneth Cheek Friday night as a climax to the Commencement exercises held in the school auditorium.

Music for the program was furnished by Rob Ratliff, pianist, and the girls' sextette. Jerry Lyn Pennington, salutatorian, greeted visitors, and expressed the appreciation of the class to their parents who had made their graduation possible. Ronnie Mittel and Billy Sam Hale offered prayer.

Jean Kuykendall, valedictorian, in her valedictory address mentioned the responsibility young people have to assume in their places in the world, and stated in conclusion, "We shall do our best to keep the faith you have invested in us."

Joy Foy of San Angelo, attorney and prominent church layman, stressed the fact that while the world makes rapid strides in science, the affairs of the world still depend for direction on the human spirit. He cited the moral struggle of one man, Jesus, as it progressed during his trial for treason—culminating in his victory in spite of a trial which defied every qualification for fairness. The three children, Mary, Carol and Robert, will enroll in schools here.

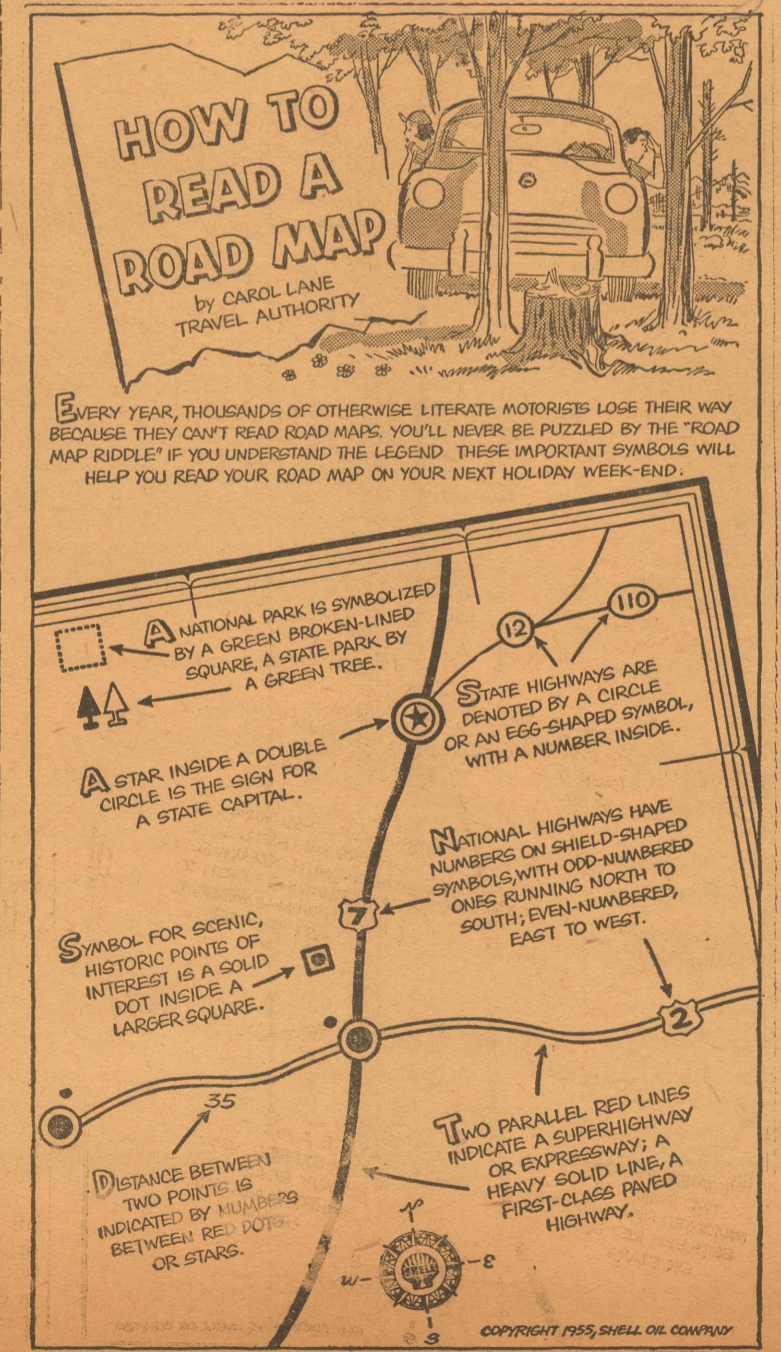

## Rev. Clifford Nelson Is Speaker At Dedication Ceremonies Here for Eastside Baptist Church

The Rev. Clifford Nelson of Brownwood was the principal speaker at dedication services held Sunday afternoon at the new Eastside Baptist Church, of which Joe Dossett is pastor.

Music was in charge of John Brown; Pat Higgins was pianist, a 20-voice choir assisting with the congregational singing. The opening prayer was delivered by the Rev. Kenneth Green, pastor of Grape Creek Baptist Church, who was reared in this county, and the closing prayer of dedication by A. D. Foreman, Sr., of San Angelo, past president of the Texas Baptist General Convention. Another guest was the Rev. Ted Cotton, pastor of First Baptist Church at Lakeview, and moderator of the Concho Valley Association.

Mr. Brown sang as a special "Bless This House." Rev. Dossett welcomed the group to the services and spoke for the congregation when he mentioned the pride which members had in their new building.

"Lasting Foundations" was the subject of the sermon which Dr. Clifford Nelson, of the mission board at Brownwood, delivered. A former Eldorado pastor, he told of his pleasant associations with people of this county during his 25 months' ministry in Eldorado.

"Dedication means more than a building," he said. "The church is the people. There can be no effective ministry of the church beyond the ministry of the people."

He advised the group not to forget the main purpose of the church, for defeat would be the outcome if they did. He pointed out that the main task of the church is to bring the church into relationship with God. He made a strong plea for mission work, and in conclusion stated that only that which will honor God's name, enlarge his kingdom and save lost souls can be considered essential.

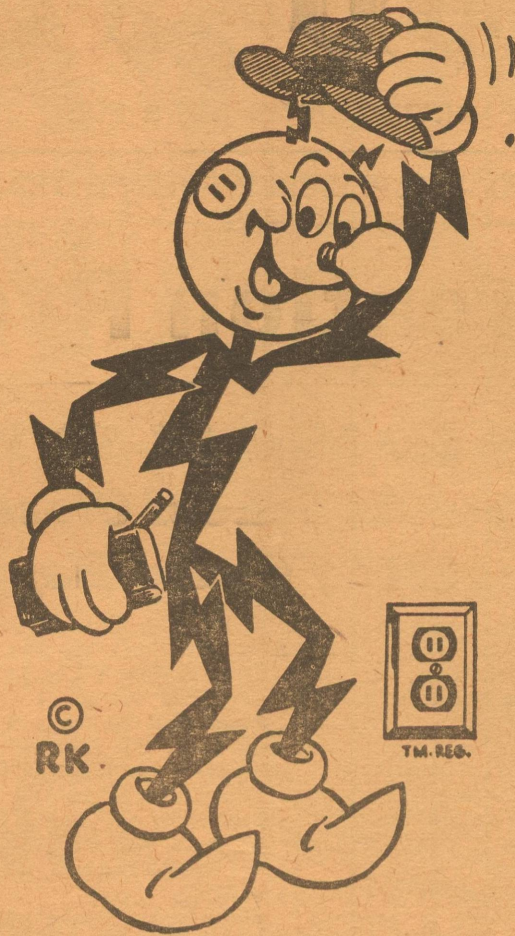

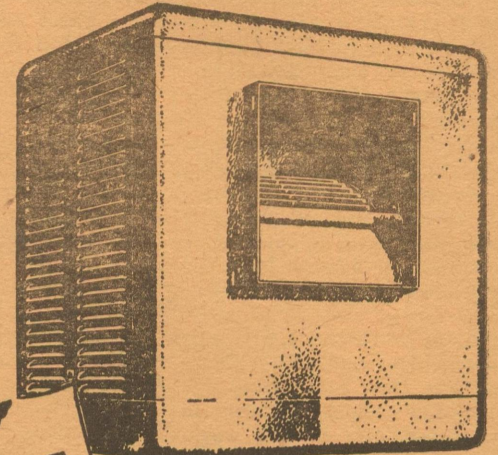

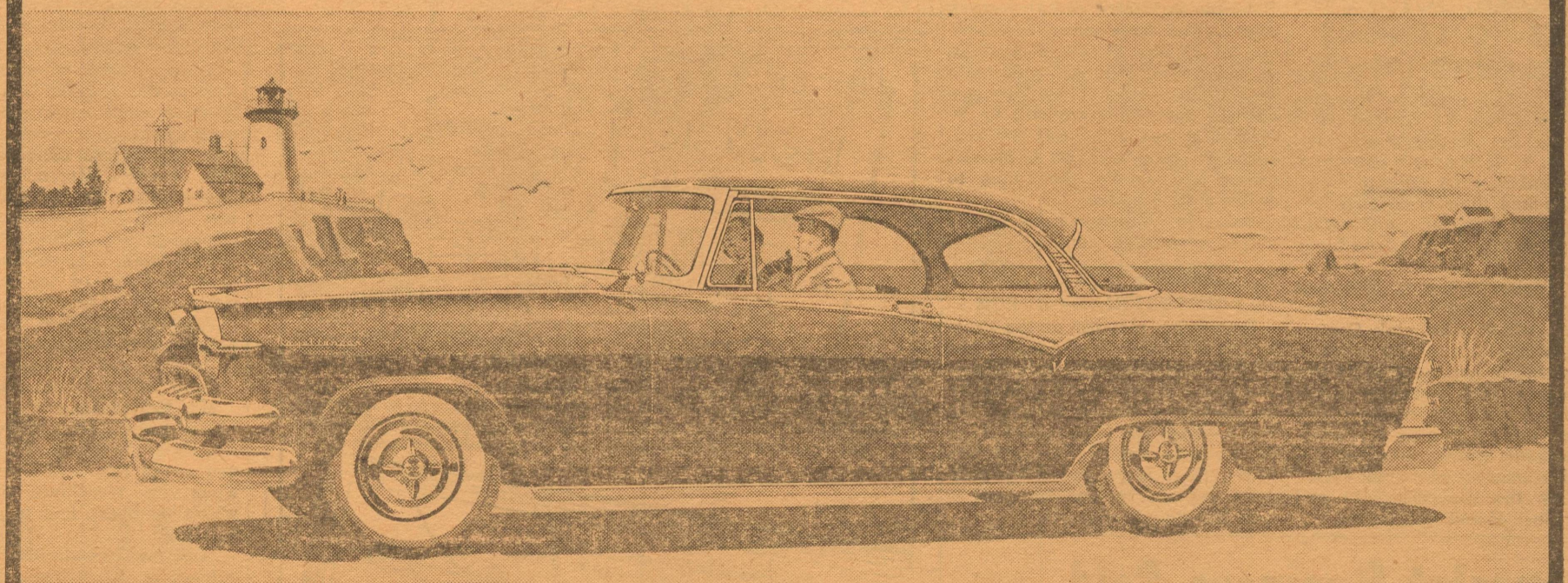

**Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District**

"The strip of blue panic grass I planted within one terrace interval really paid off during the recent dust storms," Clemens Sauer, a co-operator with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, recently reported.

Clemens, who farms in the Reynolds community, planted a terrace interval, consisting of four acres, to this grass in late June 1954. His stand shows that it not only holds the soil in place, but also serves to protect areas adjacent to it. He is convinced that several such strips in each field will do a lot toward giving protection from wind erosion.

He points out that his stand is much better where it was planted before a rain. The part planted late came along nicely but the jack-rabbits ate it back. The fact that this grass had only one rain on it since being planted is proof to him that it is hardy and drought resistant. Early in March it was green and many new seedlings were already shooting up.

Over 100 lbs. of seed was hand-harvested from this stand last year. He feels that in addition to giving him erosion control it will also provide grazing and a cash seed crop.

Clemens is looking to the future in his grass program. Because this grass will improve the tilth and fertility of his soil, he plans to plant a little more each year. He states, "I plan to come back on this land with cotton. Using blue panic in somewhat of a rotation should really raise production."

Clemens has worked closely with the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service in developing a sound program of soil, water, and plant conservation.

Motorists' Passing Habits
On Highway Of Texas
In For Intensive Study

Austin.—A traffic recording device
that looks like a speed trap
but isn't will be in use on central
Texas highways this month, D. C.
Greer, state highway engineer said
in Austin this week.

Designed primarily to record the
location of vehicles on the highway,
the machine is on loan to the Highway
Department from the Bureau
of Public Roads, and is operated
by bureau personnel from Washington
assisted by Highway Department
personnel.

While the machine does record
the speed of vehicles, its primary
purpose is to determine vehicle
distance from the center stripe and
the edge of pavement on various
highway widths, Greer said. Data
when compiled will also give a
good indication of the passing habits
of motorists on different widths
of roadway.

The recorder will be used at a
different location each day in
Travis, Bastrop, Lee, Williamson,
Gillespie, and Mason counties,
and will record on state and U. S.
highways from 20 to about 40 feet
wide. Studies will also be made on
two-lane highways and on a level
tangent of at least one-half mile,
Greer stated.

In compiling the data on Texas
driving habits, the bureau personnel
is working with Highway District
14 (Austin) and with the
Planning Survey and Design Divisions.
When the material is completed
it will assist the Department in
determining the relative values
of various pavement widths in
terms of highway economy, safety,
and the comfort of drivers, Greer
stated, and will be of value in the
planning for future highways and
improvements on present roads.
