On Monday, June 13, William M. Rountree, work unit conservationist of the Soil Conservation service made a quick conservation survey of the Flying Anchor Ranch, owned and operated by Thad A. Thomson, Jr., a cooperater with the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District, and located about 5 miles southeast of Eldorado.

During the survey Mr. Thomson stated that to date he had received a total of 6.53 inches of rain this year; the largest rain at any time being 1.6 inches. The country was found to be coming along in good shape. Sidecoats grama and vine mesquite were seeding out and looking good. Getting a good cover on the bare areas of his rangeland is the main concern of the owner.

He figures he is about half stocked. At the present time, he is running breeding stock of both cattle and sheep. Incidentally, the stock looked good and they came through the winter in fine shape.

During the past several years, this ranch averaged around 125% lamb crop and 100% calf crop; and the good stock reflects carrying out a good program of breeding and selection.

At the present time, 406 acres of rangeland is being deferred, and there are no sheep on about three sections of the ranch. Last year, two sections were rested for about seven months. The present rate of stocking is bringing about considerable range improvement in spite of below normal rainfall.

To Spray Premises

County spray equipment has again been made available for use in spraying premises of Ozona residential area in an effort to cut down the fly and mosquito population, it was announced by county officials this week. A careful cost check on materials has been made and a charge of \$3 for spraying homes and yard areas has been determined as the actual cost of materials used. The spray machine and time of employees will be a contribution from the county to community health. —Ozona Stockman.

County Valuations Up

Final valuations, to be computed by the tax assessor this summer, may vary up or down a little, but the total valuations in Crockett County will reach approximately \$27,000,000 for school purposes and approximately \$28,000,000 for county purposes. The differences in valuations for school and county purposes is explained by the fact that the constitutional amendment passed several years

ago provides that University of Texas lands may be taxed for county purposes and since schools were not specified the then attorney general ruled that the amendment means just what it says, county purposes and that the land, therefore, can not be taxed for school purposes. —Ozona Stockman.

Under flying bunting and waving flags, the welcome mat will be rolled out in all directions for the gala Kimble County Water show officially opening Junction's new swimming pool on July 4, according to Frank Hubbell, pool manager.

A county wide meet for boys and girls up to 19 years old and for adults will move full speed ahead at the 9 a.m. starting signal for the all-day and evening program, which will end at 10 p.m.

A highlight of events will be the crowning of "Miss Kimble County" and queens from each age group sponsored by a local study club. —Junction Eagle.

School Budget Set

A formal hearing on the 1955-56 budget of the Fort Stockton Independent School District was held

Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock to coincide with the annual county tax evaluation hearing so that visiting tax agents for oil companies and other large taxpayers could attend.

A budget of \$499,635.15 was adopted by the school district in the hearing and approval of the taxpayer representatives was expressed of the efficient operation of the local system.

This year's budget had been under study for many months, and had been presented to oil company tax agents several months ago at a preliminary meeting. Few changes were made after that meeting.

The 499 thousand dollar total is approximately \$19,000 higher than the 1954-55 budget figure. —Fort Stockton Pioneer.

Big Lake's chance of having a supply of soft water came one step nearer to realization on Wednesday of this week when Governor Allan Shivers' signature to the Reagan County Water Supply District Bill made the bill into a law

to become effective Sept. 6.

The next hurdle to be cleared toward the goal is the confirmation election, the date of which will be set by the Reagan County Commissioners Court. The bill requires that the court call an election within 30 days after it becomes effective, and that it shall be held no earlier than 60 days or no more than 90 days from the time it becomes a law. —Big Lake Wildcat.
