## Old Auto Register Turns Up; Lists Car Owners 1909 to '16

Object of much interest and comment in the court house this past week was the register of automobiles in Schleicher County, for the years 1909 to 1916, which turned up recently and has been on display in the judge's office. The register has 143 listings made at a time when counties handled the registering and licensing of cars.

Long-time residents of the county recall that when a person registered a car then he was given a license number and kept the same number year after year, until licensing was taken over by the state.

License No. 1 was issued Jan. 18, 1909, to W. D. Ake for his Buick, and the last number, 143, was issued April 25, 1916, to J. B. Christian for his Oakland.

Some automobile names given are still familiar to us today: Ford, Chevrolet, Buick, Dodge, Studebaker, Cadillac, Hudson, and Harley Davidson and Indian motorcycles.

Others listed which are no longer on the scene include: Oakland, Overland, Excelsior, Saxon, Maxwell, Monroe, Pullman, Mason, Apperson, Hupmobile, Chalmers, Car Nation, Metz, and Reo (though Reo trucks are still made).

## GOOD NEWS FOR SHOPPERS IS PLENTIFUL FOODS LIST

College Station. — Housewives should find the December plentiful foods list to their liking both from the standpoint of supplies and price. Holiday meals promise to be cheaper this season than in several years, judging from the list the U. S. Department of Agriculture has declared plentiful.

Topping the list is a great combination—sweet potatoes and pork. Supplies of both are heavy and prices favor consumers.

Despite the fact that this is winter season, more fruits are available now than in several months. These include grapes, winter pears, cranberries and grapefruit.

Also more dates are showing up at local markets than is usual at this season. Pinto beans and Irish potatoes are also on the December list. Turkeys, broilers and fryers, beef and canned tuna are almost as plentiful as pork in this area.

Other foods rating a spot on the USDA's list include dairy products, lard, vegetable fats and oils.

Hunters' Fires Dangerous

Every precaution to prevent damaging grass and brush fires during the six weeks hunting season which started with a literal bang Wednesday morning should be taken to preserve the badly needed grass produced by the fall rains, County Agent Vernon Jones warned this week.

Land owners should be fire conscious, make their hunters fire conscious and reorganize county fire-fighting for some current practice with available equipment, Jones said.

At this particular time areas around hunters' camps and lodges should be cleared and a fire prevention ring made around them. Trash and garbage should be burned carefully. —Junction Eagle.

Flood Project Talked

From a huddle of members of the local flood control committee and the Crockett County Commissioners Court Monday, plans were perfected for an election in early January on the question of issuing \$200,000 in flood control bonds to meet this country's part of the cost of a watershed control project on Johnson draw, now being developed by the Soil Conservation Service, to control the sometimes rampaging wash so that the disastrous flood of June, 1954, which took 16 lives and did over 12 millions in property damage, will never be repeated.

Under an agreement with the SCS, this county agreed to assume 25 per cent of the total project cost, not to exceed \$200,000. —Ozona Stockman.

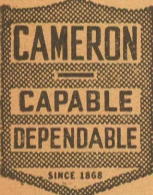

Austin. After three exiled years, Texas again has an official, accredited Democratic national committeeman.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey's acceptance by the national committee gave Texas full representation for the first time since September, 1952. Wright Morrow was refused recognition because he supported Republican Dwight Eisenhower.

Official groups of both conservative and liberal Texas Democrats supported Ramsey. Only scattered protests were heard, one by the president of the liberal faction of the Texas Young Democratic clubs.

**Shivers Okays Demo Rules**  
Gov. Allan Shivers says he is willing to play by the rules adopted for the 1956 Democratic national convention. He said at a news conference that he expects to be challenged, nevertheless, by a "bunch of wildeyed pinks."

Rules set for 1956 were viewed by Shivers as being the same as in 1952. Then they required heads of delegations to work for placing the party nominees' names on the state ballot under the proper column.

Shivers said he is not surprised to hear that some old political enemies, like Stephen Mitchell, Adlai Stevenson's aide, think he should not be allowed a 1956 seat.

He held firm that he would not take any pledge to support the party nominee. "I will give no pledge to support a nominee until I know who he is," Shivers said.

He said he considers himself a "bona fide democrat" and feels it is no crime for a Democrat to vote for a Republican friend.

"I consider President Eisenhower a friend of mine," the governor said. His statement was widely interpreted as indicating he might support Eisenhower again if he is a candidate.

**Giles Appeals Pending**  
Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles can count on at least 2½ months more of freedom.

Both Giles' convictions in land scandal trials have been appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Formal submission of the Austin conviction and three-year prison sentence is set for Jan. 18. A six-year sentence imposed in San Antonio was appealed and is expected to come before the court about Jan. 25 or Feb. 1.

**Should Be Simple—But**

On Sept. 6 the fee for driver's license renewal was increased to \$2. All summer, however, Texans kept jumping the gun and sending in the larger fee. Patiently, the Department of Public Safety sent back the over-payments.

Now, however, the new law is in force—and guess what. The DPS is busy writing Texas drivers—asking for more money. Many of them are sending in the old \$1 fee.

## Make Fall Compost Of Autumn Leaves

College Station. — Don't fret when the leaves begin to fall. If properly handled they can be a boost to next year's flower or vegetable garden, says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist.

It may be easier to burn them but the extra time required to put them in a compost pile will return dividends, explains the specialist. The compost can be used next year to increase the organic matter in the soil or for mulching flowers, shrubs or vegetables. Mulches are valuable for controlling soil temperature and conserving moisture.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts will take care of the enclosure, says Thornton. Start with a six inch layer of leaves and for a four foot square enclosure dissolve a cup of commercial fertilizer, either 5-10-5 or 8-8-8, in water and sprinkle the solution over the leaves. Keep adding these alternate layers until the pile reaches the desired height. Leave the top layer somewhat saucer shaped as an aid for holding water on the leaves. Cover the pile with a shallow layer of soil.

Turning the material occasionally will speed up the decomposition of the leaves and the addition of water, during dry weather, will also help speed up the composting process. In areas where soils are acid, Thornton suggests adding a cup of lime to the fertilizer.
