## Commencement Events Are Carried Out As Scheduled

Twenty-two graduates of Eldorado High School received their diplomas Tuesday night in an impressive service at the school auditorium. A large crowd was present to cheer for the young people as they made their final appearance as students in the school.

The program was carried out as announced last week. As salutarian Frances Parker greeted the visitors.

Ila Jean Boyer, in her valedictory address, expressed gratitude to a country which had promoted education and to parents who had helped them during their 12 years of schooling.

She listed the challenges which the graduates must face as health, maintaining a home, preventing crime, eliminating accidents, promoting peace, widening the field of education, absorbing foreigners into the nation, and spreading religion and religious tolerance.

In his address, the Honorable J. Earl Rudder stressed the fact that students need not come from large high schools to go as far as they wish in their life work. He cited Jim Dan Hill, whom he met during the war; Alvin Lueddecke, a classmate of his at A&M, and others, as examples of local boys who have made an outstanding success of their life work.

He challenged the class to live up to their capabilities, and emphasized the fact that the small communities are the backbone of the nation.

The diplomas were presented to the graduates by Kenneth Cheek, president of the school board.

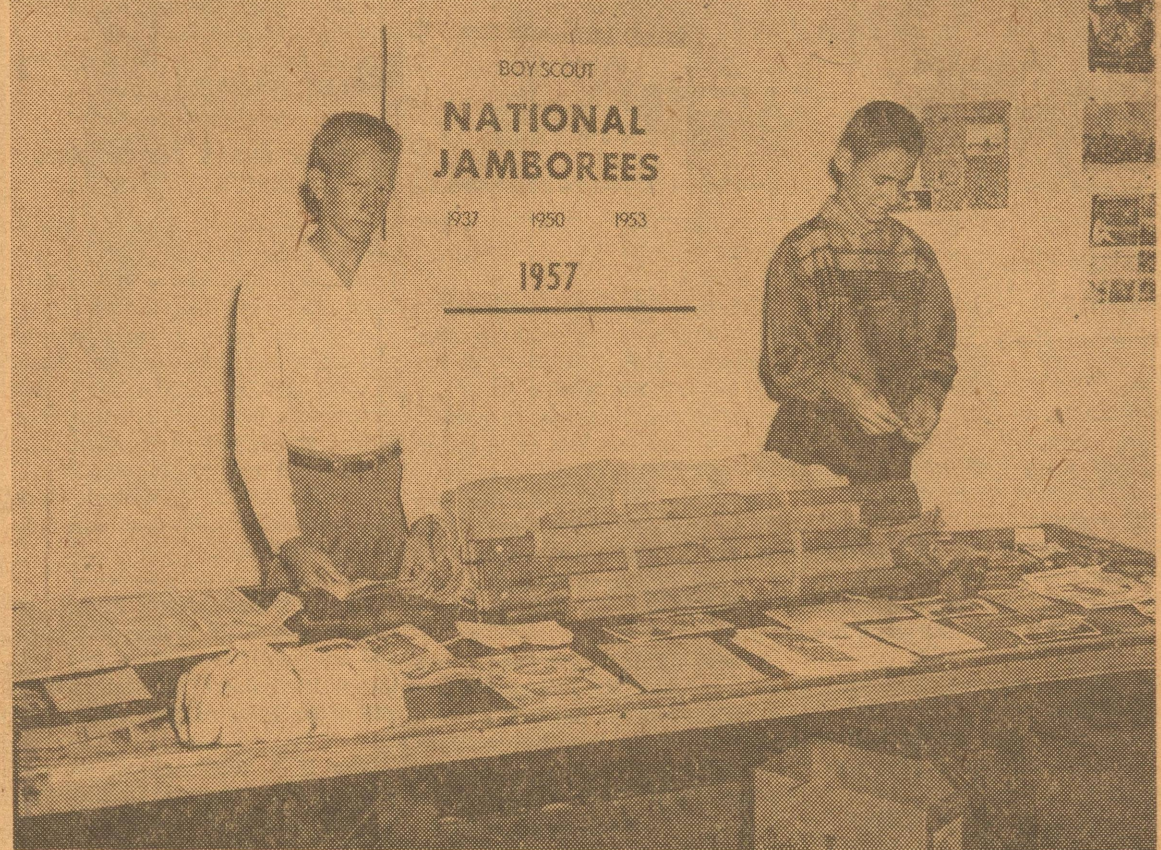

## First Hand Report of State Democratic Convention At Dallas

John I. King and J. Forrest Runge each had charge of half of Schleicher county's one vote when the state Democratic convention met in Dallas Tuesday. Leaving here Monday, King and Runge were accompanied to Dallas by S. E. Jones Jr., returning early Wednesday morning.

All report an interesting experience, and Mr. Runge submits the following first-hand report:

Following the checking in of everyone by the credentials committee the keynote speech was given by Gerald C. Mann. His address stressed harmony and the fact that the success to date had been accomplished by the united actions of many. Stressing moderation and dignity, he cited accomplishments of the Democratic party from the time of Woodrow Wilson.

He put in a plug for Johnson for President, and in response to heckling from the gallery quoted from an address by Senator Bailey that Jesus had 12 disciples and that there proved to be one Judas among them, and Judas was a fool.

So it would not be unnatural among 4,000 that there should be several fools; whereupon many delegates arose and pointed accusing fingers at the offenders (fools).

At the conclusion of Mann's speech a band started circulating and this started off a big parade in which all representatives present participated.

The Houston delegation leader read a long resolution advocating ousting of the present state executive committee. This resolution reeked of vindictiveness, bitterness and revenge, and the more he talked the tighter grew the rope around his neck—although from the outbursts in the audience the Judases were still making themselves heard.

John Connelly, spokesman for both Rayburn and Johnson, made an appealing address seeking to discourage taking the rash and bitter action sought by the radical Houston contingent. Motion was made by Connelly to table the previous motion, which was seconded by Byron Shelton.

This action necessitated roll call count. With a crowd of 4,000 souls you can imagine the confusion created by any circulation of delegates. The chairman of each county delegation was required to work (in the true sense of the word work) their way through the crowded aisles and corridors to the microphone at the base of the rostrum. The counties reported in alphabetical order and during the first half dozen votes the ayes and noes alternated, but after that the noes were few and far between.

Whenever the industrial centers reported their opposition there was a great outburst from the Houston radicals. Most of the counties reporting rated from 1 to 10 votes and the 270 Harris county made lots of noise. The vote came to 1346 to 524 to table the motion to oust the present executive committee. Travis county could not get together on their vote and were allowed more time to caucus. After another hour's delay they could not get their tallies to coincide and asked that they be

passed.

One of the die-hards of the rump delegation from Dallas threw the convention into turmoil by attempting to get the chair to recognize and seat the Dallas delegation which was declared ineligible by the credentials committee. Amid the boos and cat-calls the chair ruled that the action sought was out of order, and time for that had passed. More shouting and whistling and upstarts trying to get the mike and claiming that they were deprived of access to the loud-speaker! The rabble and agitators were in their element and drowned out all rhyme or reason.

It was finally decided that the various counties should go into district caucus. Since the delegates were grouped by districts this did not create too much confusion getting about.

As in all cases of political gatherings there are always those who will not abide by the wishes of the majority and in order to be noticed resort to all manner of interruptions and of course make

the most noise and delay and harass the operation of the proceedings. Naturally this disgusts the more level-headed participants and is a great factor in discouraging those persons that are the most qualified and capable from taking part in these conventions. Maybe that is why there is so much rotten politics—not so much the apathy or indifference of the voters but the disgust of the general public in having to combat these perpetual trouble makers.

Other speakers included Jim Wright of Weatherford, who spoke on Unity from Diversity; Mrs. H. Weinert, 12 years of loyal service, "I have fought a good fight; I have kept the faith;" Jack Miller, mayor of Austin; and Ralph Yarborough.

Chairman read off various permanent committees and their personnel. Mr. King was named on the committee to select presidential electors. Head of this committee was Mrs. Walker of Plainview, a daughter of Mrs. D. C. Hill of Eldorado and the late Mr. Hill. Committee chairman announced

permanent members, then turned the gavel over to Raymond Buck of Fort Worth, permanent chairman.

Enter Lyndon Johnson! Grand ovation and another parade! Had more bands this time but the enthusiasm died down to a crawl because the banner bearers could not move faster through the congested aisles and from our seat away up in the balcony it looked like a competition to see who could keep their placard in the TV light beam for the longest time.

John Irving King of the Schleicher group got a big charge out of carrying our standard in the demonstration and we all had lots of fun with S. E. Jones about crashing the party on tickets provided by Yarborough, and used one of ours which passed back and forth through the door and windows.

In spite of the pleas and appeals of Johnson for the convention to abstain from meting out revenge, the rebels finally wore down the resistance of the moderates and at the last got in their last dirty dig.

**FISHER REPORTS ON MOHAIR**

Mohair is taking no back seat in the agricultural picture these days. Congressman O. C. Fisher reports that for the third year in a row mohair production has increased. And last year saw the price go up by 14 per cent over 1954.

The total clip last year was 16.9 million pounds, which was 16 per cent above 1954. That accounted for a recovery of about half of the 45 per cent decline from the high of 1945.

A total of 2,983,000 were shorn last year, and the average weight per fleece was 5.7 pounds, a tenth of a pound more than the previous year, according to a Department of Agriculture release.

Texas production, which accounted for 95 per cent of the goats clipped and 97 per cent of mohair produced, increased by 17 per cent.

Price-wise, growers averaged 82.2 cents per pound, 9.8 cents above the 1954 clip. The increase probably reflects stronger world demand, according to the Department.

Thus, with both production and price looking up, the value of mohair sales last year totalled \$13.9 million, an increase of nearly one-third from 1954.

"A lot of ranchmen in the Hill Country look to mohair as their most dependable cash crop these days," Congressman Fisher commented, "and 1956 looks like another good year."

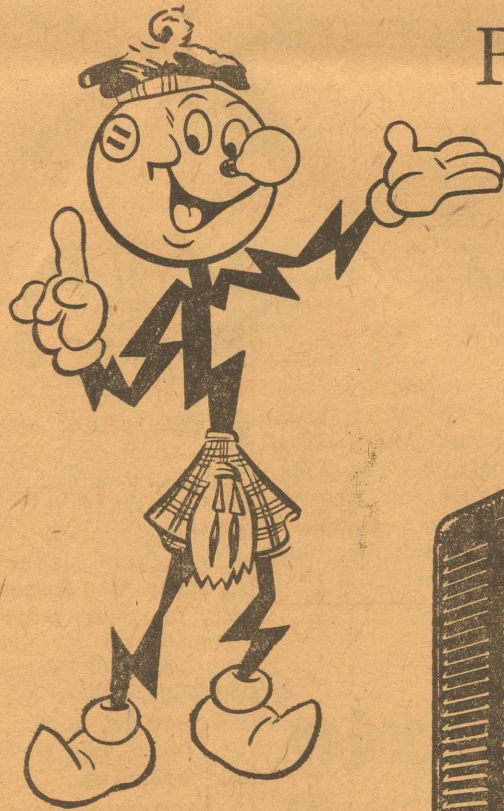

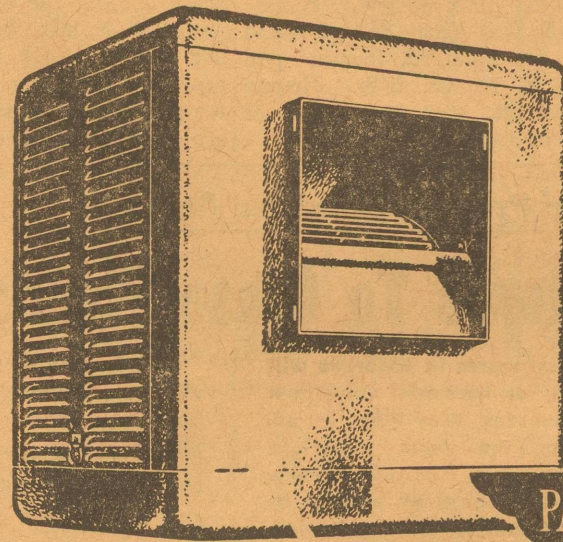

#### Over 2,000 Turkeys Die

More than 2,000 young turkeys out of a flock of 3,300 which had just been received a few days before and were being located on the C. O. Walker ranch north of Ozona were chilled to death by the early morning rain and wind Tuesday morning.

The young birds were on open range but shelters had been provided. The high winds which accompanied the heavy rain served to chill the birds after they were wet and they succumbed in piles. The loss was fully covered by insurance. Walker is still to receive another 3,300 young turkeys under a contract arrangement with the Paymaster Feed Co.—Ozona Stockman.

#### Buy's Theatre

John Goodwin, former Big Lake man who is completing a three-year re-enlistment period in the air force, announces that he has purchased the Taylor Theatre from H. #### Warning Signal

Robert Lee residents are again advised that the fire siren will sound a long blast as a disaster warning. ### Soil Conservation District News

Farmers and ranchers of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District are moving along with conservation practices which they have set up in their conservation plans. There is no set time that a farmer or rancher has to carry out a conservation practice. There are periods that are more favorable for certain practices, but generally conservation practices are applied when farmers and ranchers can get around to doing them. The sooner they are applied the sooner they begin paying off in dollars and cents.

A district co-operator said the other day, "Other conservation practices are practical and pay off just as well as terraces if people would just give them the same chance as they give terraces. As a soil and water conservation practice terracing is pretty well sold throughout the district. Terracing is a mechanical practice and generally immediate returns can be seen. However, there are vegetative conservation practices which are just as necessary and as beneficial, but the benefits are not as immediate and as obvious."

Some conservation practices that have been and are being applied in the district are:

Ross McAngus constructed one mile of level closed end terraces with farm equipment. Just recently checked out as completed by SCS technicians.

W. O. "Whip" Faulk has practically completed construction of about four miles of terraces on the C. L. Meador Jr. ranch 14 miles southwest of Eldorado.

Clemens Sauer has planted about 75 acres more blue panic.

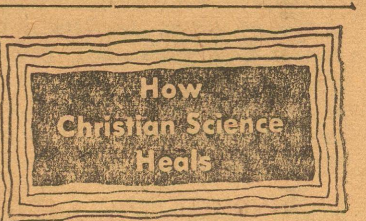
Jack Logan planted about 12 acres of blue panic.
