## Eldorado Riding Club Votes To Undertake Club House, Arena

## Lon Hoover Day Scheduled At First Baptist Church Sunday

Sunday, April 14, 1957, has been designated as Lon M. Hoover day at the First Baptist church in Eldorado. The occasion is in recognition and appreciation of his 45 years' service as treasurer of the church.

Mr. Hoover was elected to serve as treasurer in the year 1912, successor in office to Charlie Fortson, brother-in-law of Mrs. W. L. McWhorter and Mrs. W. T. Whitten, and has served, continuously since that time.

Mr. Hoover was born June 1, 1878 in Burnett County, and moved to Schleicher County in January, 1910, and was later married to Miss Essa A. Alexander. They have one daughter, Mary, an airline hostess, of Dallas.

He became a Christian during the summer of 1905 at Brady, and became a member of the First Baptist church in Brady at that time. When he moved to Eldorado in 1910 he joined the First Baptist church and has been a member ever since. ## Postmaster Announces Service Curtailment

Postmaster Waller released the following statement this morning regarding curtailment of mail service:

"Unless the deficiency appropriation before Congress is granted the Post Office Department before Saturday, April 13, the following cuts in post office service will go into effect—

1. Post Office will be closed to the public on both Saturday and Sunday.

2. Rural delivery service will be discontinued on Saturdays.

3. Distribution will be restricted to first class mail and daily newspapers on Saturdays and Sundays.

4. Window service Monday thru Fridays will be between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 4:30 p. m.

Effective April 29 these additional cuts in service will be made:

1. No third class matter (this is printed matter, circular mail, box holder, mimeographed bulletins, etc.) with the exception of medicines, serums, drugs, medical supplies will be accepted.

2. Sale of money orders to the public will be discontinued at all first and second class post offices.

Postmaster Waller stated that the above cuts are the ones that will be felt in the Eldorado post office. There are far greater cuts in larger offices where city delivery service is maintained. Waller states that these cuts are being made by authority and order of the Postmaster General and that should the appropriations be granted the above cuts will not be necessary.

Seventeen counties, including Schleicher, with 204 club women and 20 HD agents were represented at this all-day session at McMurry college.

Mrs. John Williams, Schleicher County THDA chairman; Mrs. M. H. Woodward, county council chairman; Mrs. Arch Edmiston, council delegate; Mrs. M. L. Potter, council delegate; and Mrs. Joe Krecklow, HD agent, made the trip from our county.

Outstanding speakers for the day included Mrs. Florence Low, head of the Home Economics dept. of the Texas A&M College system, and Dr. John C. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian college. Mrs. Low interested her audience with reports on the latest research findings in the field of home making. "There has been more change in the last 10 years in the field of homemaking than in the past 30 years and signs point to more change in the next 10 years than in the previous 40 years," Mrs. Low said. She further pointed out that today's home maker must be a well rounded person with an interest in many areas of living before she can do her job with intelligence.

Dr. Stevens cited the story of Russian Communist efforts to abolish the home as an institution in Russia and the later frantic attempts to restore its being as results of complete human degradation began to show up. "Even the grossest Communist saw that Russia needed her homes in her diabolical effort to rule the world," Dr. Stevens said.

**Home Demonstration Agent's Column**  
By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

More and more people today are working on the problem of trying to lose weight. It isn't the following of a fad, either. Usually it is on the advice of a doctor or a simple realization that one is gaining poundage which is a health hazard. It is a health hazard because it puts an extra burden on the heart and blood vessels. Five pounds of extra fat calls for three additional miles of blood vessels. And come to think of it, how many extremely heavy old people can you name off hand? The answer is of great significance.

It is generally agreed that overweight is the result of eating more calories than the body burns. It is not caused by eating any one food. Eating less is the one accepted way to reduce weight.

This cut in the amount of food should be made with care. Simply cutting out everything suddenly causes body shock and throws the whole body process out of gear. The daily diet should include a wide variety of foods, just a little less of them all. The Texas Food Standard calls for at least one serving daily of each of these foods: meat, potatoes, green or yellow vegetables, citrus fruit or tomatoes, other fruits, whole grain (cereals or flour), enriched bread, butter or margarine, some sweets, one egg and milk. Ten per cent overweight is considered overweight enough to begin to do something about. If in doubt, check with your doctor. He should be consulted before going on a reducing diet, anyway.

One's judgment can be no better than his information.

Home Demonstrations clubs will be working on how to have better breakfasts during the month of April. Breakfast is a literal name. It describes what it is; breaking the fast of the night. If supper is eaten at six and breakfast is eaten at seven a.m., that makes about 13 hours of no eating. Then if the habit of breakfast skipping is carried out four or five more hours may be added to the fast. Not many people can go for 18 hours with no food and feel at their best. They can get along—but breakfast goes a long way to cushion the shocks of the day.

The Pennsylvania Dutch or the Plain People, as they are sometimes called, have used the English language in a way which has always fascinated me. "Throw Mama from the train, a kiss," so goes the title of a popular song and one of their sayings, too. Describing a freight train, "Comes the little red house and the train is all." "Aunt Josie is wonderful fat and sets too broad." "The shoofly pie is all, but the cake is yet." Quotations could go on and on. Their customs are as quaint as their expressions. No meal is ever eaten without seven sweets and seven sours being on the table.

When a daughter reaches a marriageable age the front gate is painted blue. Cars have never been accepted; they travel by buggy, one horse buggies at that. When a young man marries he puts up the side curtains on the buggy. He no longer needs to see out.

That many home makers with the same goals will leave its mark for good on the families of the nation. 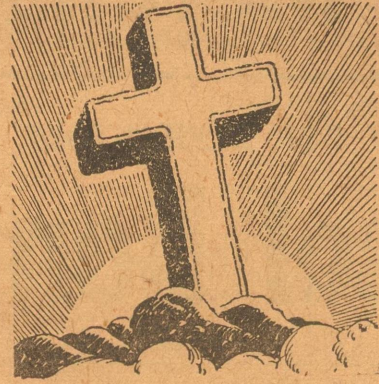

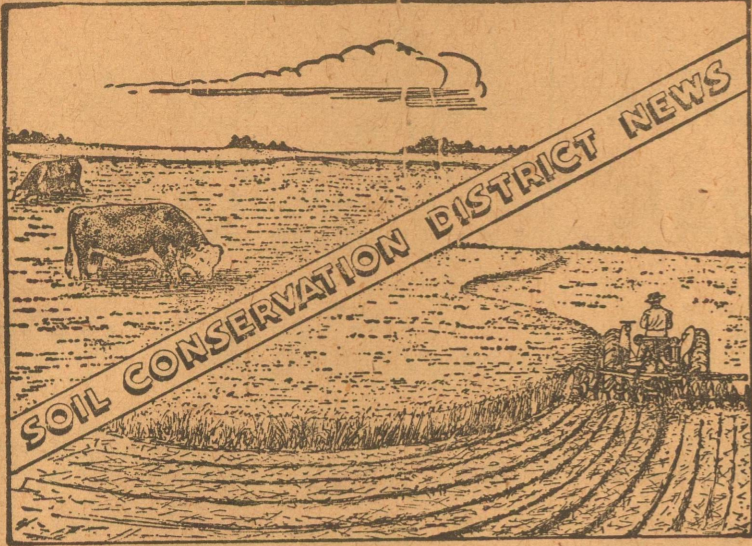

**9,087 Acres of Land Approved By Supervisors**

A total of four conservation plans, covering 9,087 acres of farm and ranch land, were approved by the supervisors of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district at their regular monthly meeting on April 5.

The pictures were taken with a camera which the district bought recently for the work unit to take pictures of good conservation practices on the land as well as pictures showing the needed application of conservation practices to the land.

Have you ever thought that the length of time of moisture retention in the soil is controlled directly by the insulation of the soil? Some protection for the moisture is afforded by shade and the plant itself; however, insulation is mostly furnished by the plant parts, such as fiber. And even with normal insulation the soil gradually loses its moisture; therefore, it is nip and tuck between soil evaporation and water use by the plant. A thin stand of plants with scattered weak buds will not use 1% of the rainfall before the remainder evaporates. This is tragic ranch economy.

In order to obtain rapid water use by plants it is necessary to have a complete stand of plants ready to grow when it rains. This practice does not make a big rain but it often makes a good crop out of a little rain.

Due to over use and below average rainfall, the native grass pastures are fast becoming less productive. The answer isn't altogether rainfall. Some of our ranges are becoming covered with low

producing annual plants. These annual grasses and weeds produce very little beef and wool per acre.

To have pastures at the highest carrying capacity, we must have the best type of vegetation our soil and climate will grow. To get these grasses back on our ranges, even with increased rainfall, we are going to have to defer proper use, and in some cases reseed with these better kinds of grasses.

Drouth is not a new occurrence to our country, as the rainfall records show. Some would believe that it does not rain like it used to. But the facts are that many ranchers are not making effective use of the rains that do come.

One of the serious things about a drouth is that livestock will remove every bit of the cover on the ground. When the rains do come, the ground is so bare that every bit of the badly needed moisture is lost as runoff. The little moisture that does sink into the soil is quickly lost by evaporation from the bare unprotected surface.

Heavy grazing of a large portion of our range land before the drouth started has a lot to do with it being in its present condition. The plants that survive heavy grazing are usually the least palatable and often the least productive and least drought resistant.

Grazing management has to be flexible to avoid killing the good grasses during dry weather. Ranges with vigorous grass and a shield of litter withstand drouth better than those scantily clad, or with no litter.

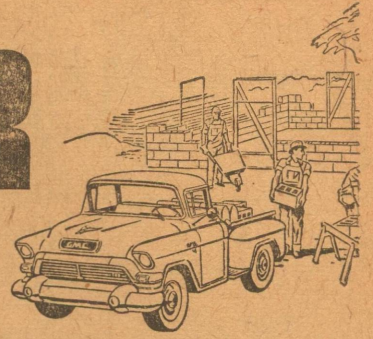

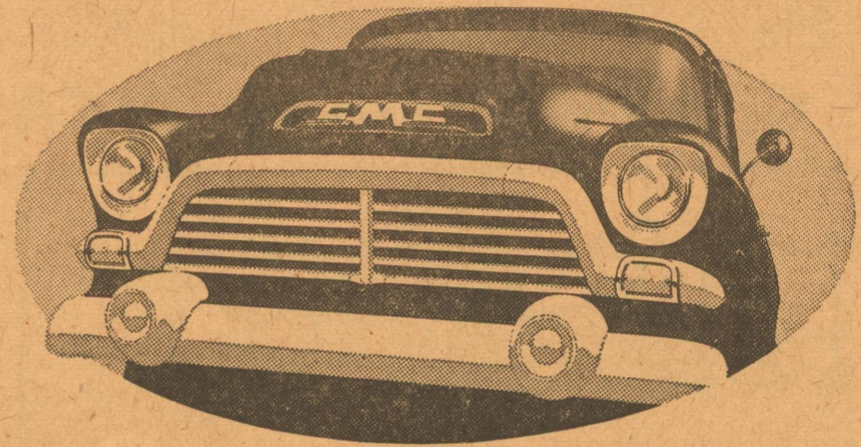

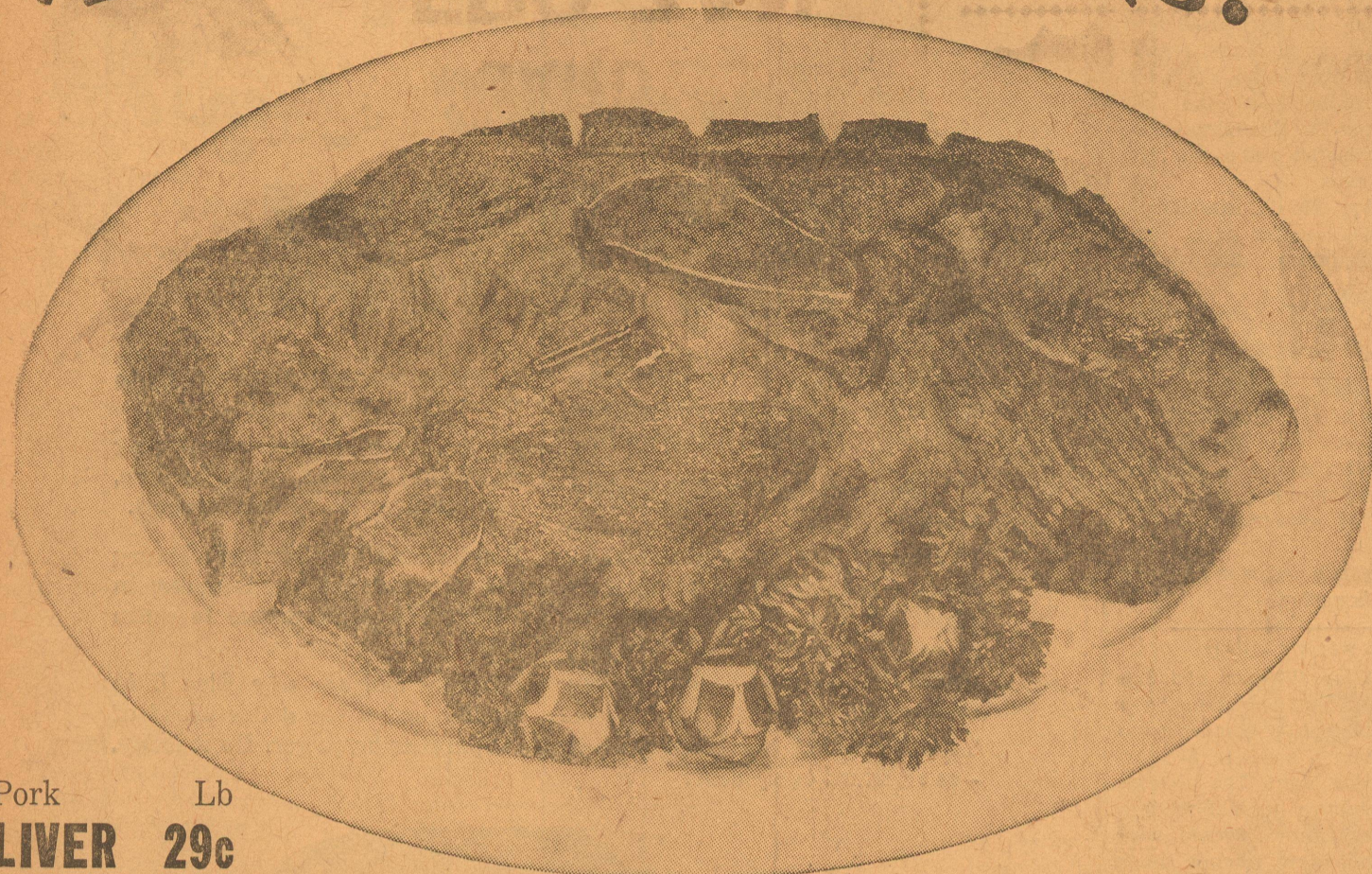
