

Full Program For Reservists Is Now Going On At Ft. Polk

Ft. Polk, La.—24 August 1957—once he has mastered the operation of his particular specialty. Some idea of the size of the undertaking may be gained from considering that the strip will be 3000 feet long. Approximately 40,000 yards of earth must be removed from the northern end of the strip in a cut reaching a depth of 11 feet for over 250 feet and moved an average of 300 yards to where it must be distributed, compacted with rollers and water distributors to carry load, and smoothed to the desired shape. Other men of the unit are also receiving training in their particular specialty field. Mechanics have been assigned to a Post Ordnance Repair shop for training, cooks are receiving practice in the operation of an Army mess, and a communications school within the battalion has been set up for the training of radio and telephone operators. Administrative personnel, such as the First Sergeant, Company Clerk, and supply personnel are actually discharging their duties and benefiting directly by the training which they are receiving in this manner. All training is under the supervision and direction of regular Army personnel whose primary job assignment within their own unit is the same as the training which they are supervising. 1st. Lt. Gerald B. Hartgraves, company commander, states that he is very well pleased with the performance of his men during the past week and that they have made much progress and learned a lot. Also, he is glad to report that his command was very successful in their range firing with the carbine during the past week. Plans for the remainder of the training for this year call for continued training operations on the airstrip from Monday through Friday morning. Included will be a night operation, when on Tuesday night equipment will be operated under the illumination of portable floodlight sets. Friday afternoon will be welcomed by all for that will be payday. The return home from Fort Polk is scheduled for Saturday morning.
