# Soil Bank's Acreage

Any time a farmer harvests too ings this year. large an acreage of a "basic" crop covered by a Soil Bank Acreage Reserve agreement—such as wheat or corn or cotton, he not only loses his acreage reserve payment but also is subject to a civil penalty.

"Farmers should be very sure that they understand the provisions of the Acreage Reserve program regarding violations. We are most anxious that there be no confusion resulting from the recent identification of the 1958 program's penalty provision regarding 'permitted acreage.' '

There are two acreage limitations that any farmer must comply with if he is taking part in one or more of the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve programs. These limitations are: (1) The "maximum" acreage of the Acreage Reserve crop, such as wheat-which is the crop allotment less the crop acreage put in the Acreage Reserve, and (2) the "permitted acreage"—which is the farm's Soil Bank base less all the crop acreage put in the Acreage Reserve. If the land has been included in the Conservation Reserve, this also is deducted in determining the "permitted acreage."

The Soil Bank base for a farm is in general the average acreage of Soil Bank base crops harvested on the farm during the past two years. Soil Bank base crops include the basics, such as wheat and corn and cotton, and generally all crops produced on the farm except hay crops.

A recent modification of program regulations provides that if a farmer exceeds the overall "perexcess acreage of some crop other than the crop covered by an Acreage Reserve agreement, he loses the entire payment he would have earned by complying with all provisions of the Acreage Reserve program. No civil penalty applies in this case. (As originally announced, a civil penalty would also have applied in this case.)

However, if the farmer harvests more of the Acreage Reserve crop than his crop allotment less the crop land in the Acreage Reserve. the farmer is subject to both loss of his payment and a civil penalty of 50% of the payment.

The civil penalty also applies to such program violations as grazing or harvesting a crop from land designated under the Acreage Reserve agreement.

Farmers in commercial wheat states may sign agreements to take part in the 1958 winter wheat acreage reserve program from August 26 to October 4. The program for spring wheat and other spring-seeded crops will be announced before planting time.

Wheat growers are urged to furnish without delay all information. including their farm's production history for 1956 and 1957, necessary for the County ASC Committee to establish a Soil Bank base for the farm. This base must be determined before a 1958 winter wheat Acreage Reserve agreement may be signed.



Cyrus K. Holliday Recalls Pioneer Days of Railroading

# **Famous Antique Train To Be Shown** In Dallas At State Fair of Texas

An antique train reminiscent of the pioneering days of railroading will be exhibited by the Santa Fe Railway at the 1957 State Fair of

The famous old Cyrus K. Holliday locomotive, a replica of the original engine which hauled the first freight and passengers over the Santa Fe line in Kansas in 1869, will be brought to Dallas along with its two ancient wooden coaches.

The diminutive locomotive has the famous "diamond stack" with a brass eagle figurehead gracing the engine head, a big oil-burning headlight, brass fittings and other paraphernalia of the early days of

Although the locomotive is but a replica of the original, the present Cyrus K. Holliday ranks as a museum piece in its own right. Built in 1880, the old engine was subsequently downgraded to a switch locomotive and finally withdrawn after 60 years of active service.

Restored to its original appearance, the train has been used many times in movies of the old West. The engine still operates under its

With the Cyrus K. Holliday, the State Fair will have on exhibition trains spanning nearly 90 years of rail progress. The Texas & Pacific Railway Company will exhibit its old retired steam locomotive No. 909 and one of its crack modern Texas Eagle streamliners. In addition, the Fair's Monorail line, only such system operating in the U.S., offers a sample of yet another type of rail transportation said to hold great promise for the future.




