day. In addition, to all of this she is also working on her Master's Degree.

She expects a lot from her students, she expects all of her students to do their work and pass math. Ms. Garlitz always makes sure that each and every one of her students understands their math. She wants us learn it so we can actually use the skills we are learning. That is one reason I understand math a lot more this year than I have in the past. Another reason that I admire Ms. Garlitz is because she has respect from most of her students. Ms. Garlitz doesn't get that respect by being nice or not giving homework. These types of teachers are the ones we will remember a lifetime for their dedication to teaching. The main purpose of school is learning skills to use in life, not just long enough

Ms. Garlitz is definitely a teacher who is dedicated to her student's accomplishments and successes. I know I will always look back with fond memories of her and her class



Roy Lawrence, TPW law enorcement director of field operations, said resident and nonresident recreational fishermen will be allowed to fish without a license and will not be required to have special stamps such as the saltwater sportfishing or freshwater trout stamps.

No fishing license will be required to fish in any state park waters on June 5, but normal entry and facility use fees apply. Camping reservations are recommended.

National Fishing Week will be observed across the nation May 31-June 6 with a variety of activities centered on fishing as family recreation. Nearly one in five Americans enjoy fishing, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

> "Treat all bees with respect," concluded Sansone. "Be familiar with bee nesting sites and check carefully for bees before starting any type of outdoor work. If bees are found, they should not be disturbed unless absolutely necessary. Remember, if you don't bother them, chances are, they won't bother you."


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
