## Route Picked Extending Ranch Road 33 To Iraan

(Ozona Stockman, March 13.) — Impatient citizens of Iraan across the Pecos from Crockett county, will be glad to learn that final agreements have been reached between Crockett county officials and State Highway Department engineers for the route of a new road, an extension of Ranch Road 33 west across Crockett county to the Pecos county oil town.

County Judge Houston Smith and members of the Commissioners Court met with the Highway Department engineers on the site of the road early this week and virtual agreement on the route for the extension was reached and plans set in motion for surveying and securing right-of-way for early construction of the first ten miles of the extension.

The new road will serve as a paved outlet to some of the busiest oil field areas of Crockett county and at the same time afford Iraan a direct outlet to the east. By swinging the proposed road farther south than originally proposed, it will serve oil field areas in west Crockett county.

## Vehicle Inspection Continues To Lag

Approximately 35 per cent of the registered vehicles in Region Four have been inspected, it was announced by Captain R. M. Hammett, Texas Department of Public Safety. Region Four consists of 49 counties in southwest Texas.

Captain Hammett advised that motorists should take advantage of the next 30 days and have their vehicle inspected early in an effort to avoid a last minute rush to meet the April 15 deadline.

"A dollar for inspection now, may save a fine of \$16.50 after the deadline," warned Captain Hammett.

## L. Kent Observes His 78th Birthday

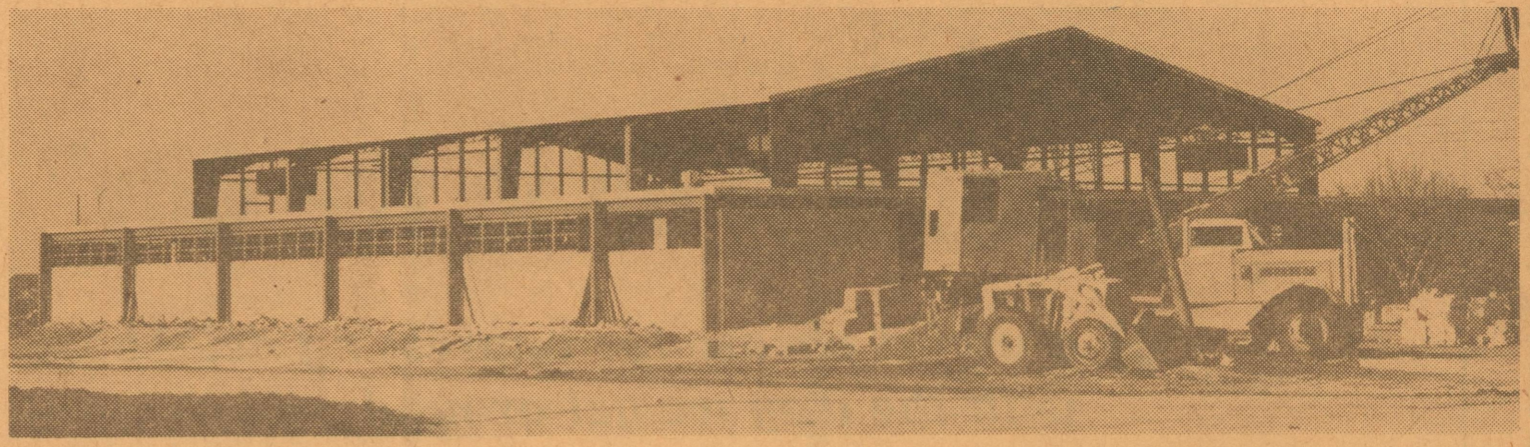
L. Kent celebrated his 78th birthday Sunday at his home with all his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren present. A covered dish luncheon was served at noon.

## Oil News

Standard of Texas 3 No. 5 Wilson ran a third drill stem test between 6,232-6,313 feet. Tool was open two hours with a weak blow increasing to a strong blow in 30 minutes. Recovery was 300 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and 3 feet of free oil.

Five and one-half inch casing was run to the total depth of 6,313 feet late Wednesday. Operator was preparing to perforate and try for completion as we go to press.

El Paso No. 1 Treadwell bottomed at 5323 feet, circulating for samples.

El Paso No. 1 Sheen, 30 miles east and 1 1/2 north of Eldorado was drilling surface hole at 350 feet. Wesley Young Drilling Co. of Sonora had the surface hole contract. Pico Drilling Co. of Breckenridge has the deep hole contract.

Liedtke & Liedtke No. 1 Thomsen had a diesel oil and cement squeeze job to try to shut off water after setting pipe and perforating at 5252-55 feet. A section between 5238-42 feet had been washed with acid and an undetermined amount of production had been found.

Miami Petroleum Co. of Abilene No. 1-C Roy Glass, Strawr wildcat, 1/2 mile east of the opener of the R. E. G. field of Schleicher county, 20 miles northeast of Eldorado set casing at 4525 feet Tuesday. The last test at 5304-23 feet recovered 4,400 feet of salt water. After pipe was set at the plugged-back depth, they were waiting on cement before attempting to complete.

Drilling contract for Pan-American No. 1 Mittel has been let to Great Western Drilling Co. of Midland, with operations to begin in four or five days.

It is rumored that a re-entry and try for gas completion will be started shortly on the Katie Harris well which was drilled in 1952 by Ray Harris Drilling Co. Tucker Drilling Co. of San Angelo has two wells in this vicinity and Phillips Petroleum Co. has five wells near there.

Mrs. Clovis Taylor's father, R. E. Johnson, of Rockwood, is confined to the hospital in Santa Anna with a recurrence of a heart condition. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor visited with him recently and report him to be improving.

## Tenth Annual Field Day Set At Sonora Ag. Experiment Station

The Tenth Annual Ram Progeny and Performance Test field day will be held at Substation No. 14, Sonora, Texas on April 16 according to an announcement received this week.

This field day will feature test results on 124 yearling rams. Although the great majority of the rams are Rambouillets, one group of Columias and several groups of commercial sheep will be represented. The program will begin in the morning and will be concluded shortly after lunch. A barbecue lunch will be served by the Sutton County 4-H Club at a nominal charge.

To Be Given on the Fire Siren In Eldorado

—Cut This Out and Post By Your Telephone—

(As Established by Fire Department and GOC Post, May, 1957)

**FIRE SIGNAL**—Several blasts on the fire siren will be given, and this signal will also be used to summon firemen for any other emergency where they are needed. All persons except firemen should clear the streets when this alarm is given. Motorists should pull over to the curb and stop; pedestrians should stay out of the streets.

**TORNADO ALERT**—A one-minute high pitch blast from fire siren, followed by a two-minute silence, and this followed by another one-minute high pitch blast.

**TORNADO ALL-CLEAR SIGNAL**—will be given by voice over the loudspeakers atop the Presbyterian church.

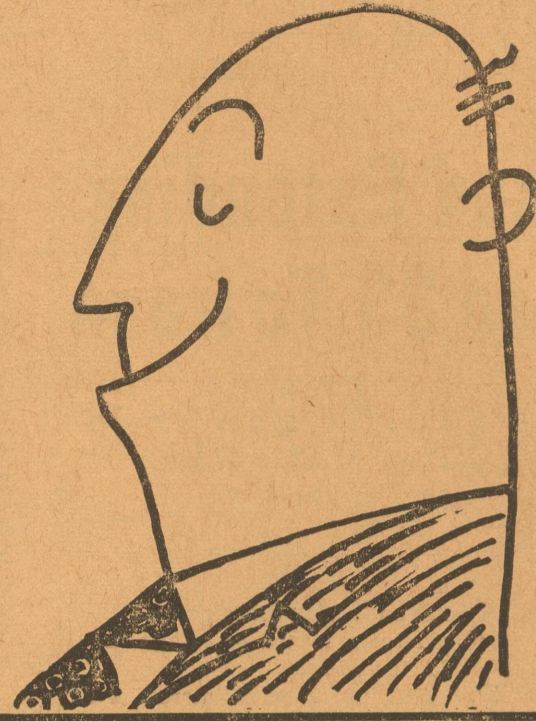

Austin—Two supercharged issues—taxation and recession—like two strands of a high-voltage electric fence, seem to be twined through every area of Texas government. Recession, though considered mild and temporary, is here and now. New taxation, in the light of official estimates, will be practically unavoidable next year.

Even though the recession is labeled "minor" and new state taxes the inevitable result of explosive growth, having both issues come up at the same time makes each seem worse. New tax talk, never popular, is even less so with people feeling the chill wind of a cut in income.

Barring an unexpectedly swift upturn in the economy, the twin issues will break through the middle of next summer's political campaigns. It'll be particularly rough campaigning for those who have to get on one side or the other of the taxation fence.

Some legislative candidates are already asked, "If there has to be a new tax, what kind will you vote for?" Some say they haven't decided what they'd vote for, but will say what they'd vote against. Others say they're making no decision until after the State Tax Study Commission completes its reports.

Lower, But Growing

Latest report by the Tax Study Commission shows some of the possible directions in which Texas may have to move to get additional money. It notes that: Besides Texas only two other states are without either a general sales tax, personal income tax or corporate income tax.

Texans in 1956 paid lower state and local taxes than the average for other states—\$129.50 per capita for Texas compared with \$157.50 per capita national average.

Rate of tax increase for Texas has been much faster than U. S. average. Texas rate of increase from 1953-56 was 23.4 per cent; national average, 19.4 per cent.

Commission's next report will deal with future pending needs, says Sen. William S. Fly, chairman.

Unemployment Up Again

Texas Employment Commission reports claims for unemployment compensation at a new high. There had been a slight drop for the previous week. But latest weekly tabulations showed TEC paid out \$1,435,448, compared to \$696,464 for the same week a year ago. Number of persons filing claims was 82,576, almost double the 42,705 who filed a year ago. Even so, most recent nationwide figures show Texas to be a highly favored area. Labor Department's Bureau of Employment Security says that Texas has the lowest rate of unemployment of insured workers of any state in the nation—3.6 per cent here compared to 7.9 per cent nationally.

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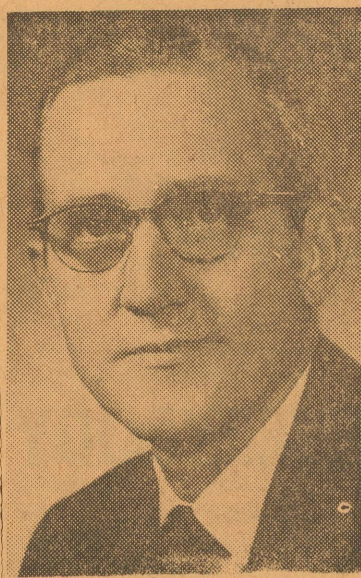

**Why Go To Church?**

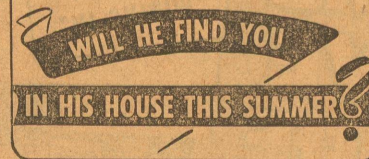

## COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

by Tiny Godwin

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

Your ASC county committee and seed man are co-operating in getting the very best possible price available by ordering in bulk; grass seeds to plant the conservation reserve. Good progress is being made in saving the producers money. See Joe Ed Hill of the Eldorado Wool Company to turn in your seed order.

The mixture of grass seed recommended and approved by the county committee is blue grama, blue panic, side oats grama, buffel grass and K.R. blue stem. 4 1/2 lbs. of this mixture to the acre will give you 2.47 pounds of pure live seed. You may want to eliminate some of the seed or plant a grass in rows. If this be the case, check with the ASC office.

Gerald Hartgraves purchased the second high Angus bull at the Blue Bonnet experiment station, at McGregor, Texas, which has charge of the selection through performance-tested and progeny breeding stock. This bull had a gain ratio of 113 and an overall gain of more pounds during the test. This bull will be used by Gerald on cows that are under the beef performance program. These cows and heifers have been selected for conformation and ability to gain by actual performance. Gaining ability has been

found to be highly heritable, therefore, ability to gain is another important tool to be used in selecting quality beef cattle.

Winter testing of hybrid grain sorghum in Mexico is one method used to find out exactly what to expect from seed planted on Texas soil. Many hundreds of hybrid samples were planted near Tampico, Mexico, for testing this past year. The planting was supervised by the foundation seed section of the Agronomy department of A and M College of Texas, and seed producers paid for conducting the test.

According to Dr. Lee Coffey, extension agronomist, in charge of the winter testing program "most lots of grain sorghum hybrid planting seed are improved over last year. However, several lots still had many tall off-type plants."

Your grain sorghum committee made the recommendation that all producers buying Texas 610 or 620, the adaptable hybrids for Schleicher county, demand that their retail seedsmen purchase seeds of sorghums which have been winter tested. Although sorghum hybrids are produced under strict standards of certification, these seed could have some tall-off-type plants unless winter tested to tell

the bad lots of seed. A reliable seed producer will not sell bad lots of seed.

Members of the committee are: Archie Mittel, W. O. Faull, Clyde Keeney, Milton Faught and Aaron Steward.

Once more, mid winter's cold wind and sleet, I wait my yearly spring-time treat. After the post-man brings this precious gift, I sit and scan until my hearts desire. It warms my breast and fills my need; this lovely catalog of seed. Pictured in perfection; tomatoes of giant size. Cantaloupes, every one a prize. Big bursting beans and luscious beets; sweet hybrid corn completes the list. Then as the wind blows outside, I plan my gardening with pride, not only have I this seed catalogue but I also have B-70 Vegetable Gardening sent by the county agents of my county which gives me the varieties recommended for the soil I have and a planting guide, for every vegetable grown. Then too, I have the outline in B-70 for making gardening plans. I know that other helpful hints are to follow as I sit and plan my garden—a winter dream come true.

Schleicher county will have two foreign agricultural visitors from Turkey in Eldorado March 31—April 4. Mr. Ertugraul and Mr. Guney will study sheep and goats, wool and mohair and Extension Service procedures during their stay. They are assigned to the county agent's office.

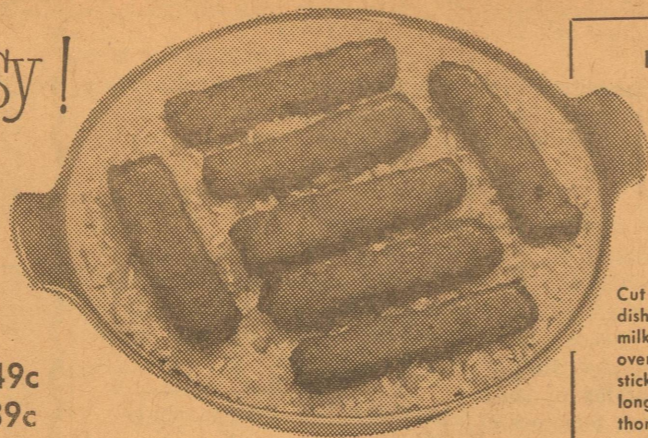

Arrange fish sticks over top of rice mixture. Bake 20 min. longer, or until rice is tender and fish sticks are thoroughly hot. Serve hot with catsup or chili sauce, if desired. Makes 4 servings.
