EMERGENCY SIGNALS

To Be Given on the Fire Siren In Eldorado

-Cut This Out and Post By Your Telephone-

(As Established by Fire Department and GOC Post, May, 1957)

- FIRE SIGNAL-Several blasts on the fire siren will be given, and this signal will also be used to summon firemen for any other emergency where they are needed. All persons except firemen should clear the streets when this alarm is given. Motorists should pull over to the curb and stop; pedestrians should stay out of the streets.
- TORNADO ALERT —— A one-minute high pitch blast from fire siren, followed by a two-minute silence, and this followed by another one-minute high pitch blast.

TORNADO ALL-CLEAR SIGNAL-will be given by voice over the loudspeakers atop the Presbyterian church.
