

Amarillo, Texas, has announced, according to Burton P. Smith, President, the signing of a gas purchase contract between Pioneer Gathering System, Inc., and Atlantic Refining Company covering the purchase of gas from Atlantic wells in the Buckhorn Field in Schleicher County, Texas.

The gas purchased by Pioneer Gathering System, Inc. is to be produced from wells which have been heretofore shut-in for lack of an available market.

Pioneer Gathering System, Inc., a subsidiary of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, is already buying gas in this area and delivering it to Permian Basin Pipeline Company in Schleicher County

To tie in Atlantic's wells to its present gathering system, Pioneer Gathering has made application to the Federal Power Commission for the construction of 6.5 miles of 41/2inch pipeline, purchase meter stations and a dehydration plant.

Construction is expected to begin as soon as a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity is granted by FPC.







To make: cook potatoes in small amount boiling, salted water until tender. Drain potatoes. Cook bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and chop. Using 2 tablespoons bacon fat, cook onions until golden. Blend. flour, mustard, salt and sugar into fat. Stir in the water and boil for two minutes. Add about 2 tablespoons hot mixture to beaten egg, then stir in rest of mixture. Add vinegar and reheat. 



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
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
