## Traffic Safety Meeting Held Here Yesterday

In common with all counties in the state, a traffic safety meeting was held in Eldorado yesterday morning, attended by the county judge and other county and city officials.

The state-wide meetings were sponsored by the governor, and the Eldorado meeting started at 9:15 a. m. A radio address by the governor was heard from 9:30 to 9:45. One of the highlights was that there is a 12% decrease in state-wide accidents so far this year. Statistics showed that 56% of accidents were the result of speed, and 34% from drinking.

Following the governor's address there was a period of discussion and plans were made to erect warning signs on roads leading into the city.

According to Safety Patrolman Billy R. McElroy, the following is a record of Schleicher accidents for the first three months of this year:

4 personal injury accidents; 2 property damage accidents; 5 persons injured; no fatalities.

In 1957, according to the same source, there were three fatal accidents in which 3 were killed; 14 were injured in 6 accidents; five property damage accidents totaling \$17,385.00.

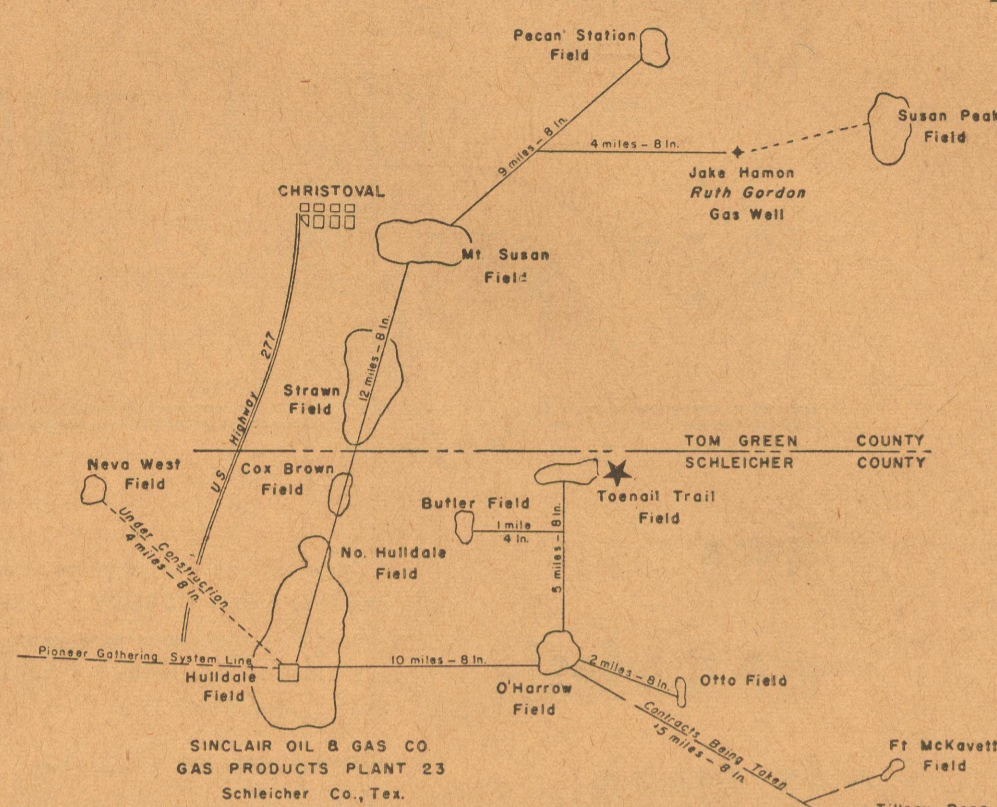
Other classmen will help backstage with make-up, sets, lighting, etc.

running lines for pipelines to the Fort McKavett and Tillery fields in the east part of the county. All people connected with the industry predict that Sinclair's Hulldale plant will continue to expand as the gas fields develop.

## New Prolific Gasser Brightens Schleicher County Oil Picture

The Toenail (Harkey sand) field of Schleicher County gained its second producer and a 3-4 mile extension with the completion of G. H. Stoddard of Midland No. 1 K. L. Harris, a re-entered 5,290 foot failure, 22 miles northeast of Eldorado.

It was finaled for a calculated absolute flow of 9,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily, plus 2½ barrels (per million) of 53.3 gravity distillate with gas-distillate with gas-distillate ratio of 519.6 to 1.

Production was through perforations between 4662-78 feet in 4½ inch casing cemented at 4,776 feet. Tubing pressure was 1,250 pounds; casing pressure was 1,586 pounds. It was predicted that drilling operations would continue immediately in that area.

The original test was drilled in 1954 by Dave R. Harris to a total depth of 5,290 feet. It was plugged and abandoned in January 1955.

**Extension Seen**  
El Paso Natural Gas Co. No. 1-B Sheen set 5½ inch casing at 4,540 feet for completion attempt. Casing was perforated at 4,120 feet and treated with 15,000 gallons of acid Tuesday. On a 12-hour actual flow, a potential of 7,300,000 cubic feet of gas daily was gauged through a 3/4-inch choke.

On an earlier drillstem test between 4,318-343 feet recovery was 6,440,000 cubic feet of gas daily. On a total of six drillstem tests gas was recovered on every test. The new gasser is about 28 miles east of Eldorado.

El Paso Natural has filed application to drill another Sutton county test, between Sonora and the Schleicher county line. It will be No. 1 Davis, a 1½ mile outpost to the Sonora (Canyon) field. Location is on a 704-acre lease and scheduled depth is 6,100 feet.

It has been many years since there was a garden club here and this year will be a good time to start one since the drought has been broken. It will give everyone an opportunity to beautify his premises and will help make the town more attractive.

Anyone wishing to take part in this club is urged to contact a member of the committee at once. In addition to growing flowers, shrubs, and trees, members will learn much about table decorations and flower arranging, also preparing flowers for all occasions.

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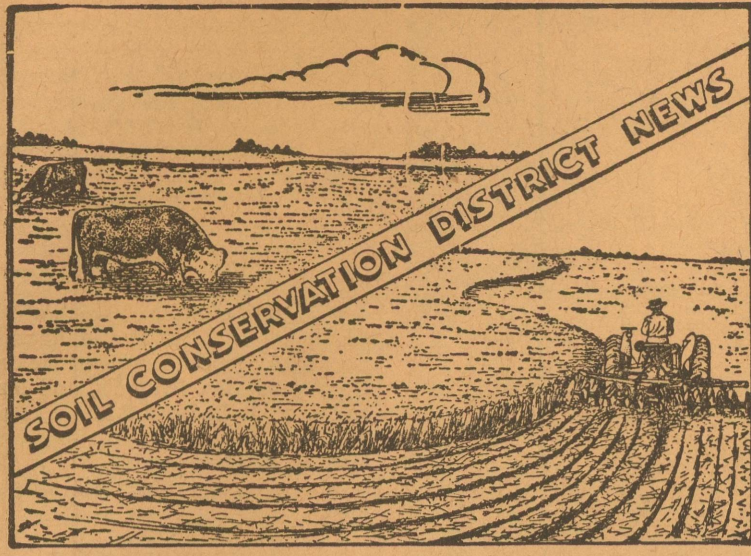

The district is to sponsor a joint field day with the North Concho Soil Conservation district Saturday, May 26, at Boys' Ranch of West Texas near Tankersly.

Root plowing, reseeded, grass planting on cultivated land and land leveling are some of the practices that can be seen during the day. These are some of the practices Boys Ranch has outlined and developed to build the fertility of the soil and increase productivity of their grazing land.

District cooperators have been quite busy the past few weeks carrying out some of their planned conservation practices. These practices include grass planting, clover planting, contour farming, terrace and diversion construction, and deferred grazing. Do you have a plan for your farm or ranch? For some reason or other we never seem to get things done unless we plan ahead and put forth an effort to carry out those plans.

What about wildlife-game on your farm or ranch? Game can be a major source of income for the rancher or farmer as well as our businessmen. Wild turkeys and quail will come back and can be raised provided the important things are present: In order for hens to nest on your place, you must have some tall grasses. Turkeys and quail nest on the ground and they won't pick your pasture if it's bare. Protected live oak motts are ideal places for nesting areas. If you are in turkey and quail country, and have few on the place, look for these two reasons: no brush protection and no tall grass.

With the apparent return of normal rainfall the conservation job of rebuilding drought depleted rangeland is evident. Annual weeds and grasses occupy thousands of acres of denuded rangeland and regardless of the amount of rainfall the forage production will be low.

Several years of conservation management will be required to obtain sufficient improvement to combat these annuals and restore ranges to a high productive level. Though the drought was instrumental in emphasizing the need for proper range management, the district is faced with the big job in helping ranchmen to remain

**Cotton Root Rot Is Subject Of New Leaflet**

College Station.—Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas. It generally is found throughout the state except in the Panhandle and High Plains, and is very prevalent in heavy, alkaline soils.

About 80% of the wild and cultivated plants in Texas are susceptible to the disease in varying degrees. It is combatted by growing resistant or immune plants drying-out and acidifying the soil and by certain agricultural practices. The disease seldom can be cured after it attacks a plant.

Plants suddenly die after the first symptoms of wilting. When pulled from the soil, the bark of the roots is decayed and brownish, and woolly strands of fungus frequently are on the surface. Under field conditions, the disease appears on spots which spread rapidly. Affected plants die suddenly, after after having made excellent growth. Large trees may die more slowly.

The Texas Agricultural Extension service has recently released a leaflet, "Cotton Root Rot," which gives much valuable information on the disease. Some of the sections in the leaflet are control on field crops, fruits and nuts, vegetables and ornamental plants.

It also contains a section on identification and has a chart which names trees, ornamentals, shrubs, and flowers that are resistant to the disease.

**Rural Traffic Accidents Show Slight Decrease**

Captain Ray B. Butler, commanding officer of the 24 county District 4-A, Texas Highway Patrol, Midland Region, released the rural traffic accident summary for March of 1958, today, with a word of caution to motorists. "Although our accident statistics reflect a slight reduction in deaths on our rural highways, we must not become optimistic as spring will bring more travel, and more chances of an accident.

"The Department of Public Safety earnestly solicits your cooperation in reducing the death toll on our streets and highways during 1958," Butler pointed out. The Highway Patrol investigated a total of 142 traffic accidents in March of 1958. Eighty-nine of these accidents were property damage accidents, 55 were personal injury accidents with 94 persons injured. There were eight fatal accidents in which 10 people died. Property damage in the 24 county Midland district was \$133,575 or an average of \$939.95 per accident.

### COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

by Tiny Godwin

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

4-H range and grass identification teams made a clean sweep of this division at the district elimination contest in San Angelo the past Saturday.

Fifty grasses were given each contestant to identify and give characteristics as to whether annual or perennial, cool season or warm season, climax or invading, and give the grazing value whether good, fair or poor.

The senior team was represented by Charles West, John McGregor, Jerry Don Johnson and James Sallee.

Charles West was second over all high in this contest, Jerry D. Johnson was third over all high.

The Juniors were represented by Ray Lewis Ballew, George Draper, Scott McGregor and Phil Edmiston.

Ray Lewis Ballew was high individual in the junior contest, while George Draper was second over all high.

The range team was represented by Farris Nixon, Ernest K. Nimitz, Judge Whitten and Jerry Thomerson.

Excellent scores were made by this team in a very close contest. This team had to know 100 grasses, herbs and weeds, degree of utilization of pasture, the type of soils, range condition and 16 recommended practices to improve range land.

Seniors teams will represent district 7, composed of 22 counties at the 4-H round-up June 11-12-13.

Ranchers are busy controlling bitterweed and hoarhound on the ranch. Some are using knapsack sprays or stock sprayers. James and Wilson Page and Gerald Hartgraves are using the airplane.

All are using one pound 2-4-D ester plus 1/2 cup of detergent to 50 gallons of water.

Where 2-4-D ester is being used it is a race with time—because bitterweed is blooming. After plants reach the full bloom stage and are poisoned, the seed will mature and are still viable.

Some 15 telephone calls have been made the past two days in regard to mildew on roses.

Use two ounces of sulphur to a gallon of water to spray for mildew on roses, violets, honeysuckle, phlox, zinnias, crape myrtle, euonymus, hydrangea, and such vegetables as cantaloupes, beans, pumpkins and squash.

Karathane may also be used or substituted for sulphur.

If you have wildlife—birds or animals—or if you enjoy hunting, the bulletin, "Wild Game of Texas," will be of special interest to you. A visit to your county agent's office or a telephone call will get you a copy. There's one waiting for you.

Schleicher county is getting set to harvest its second largest money crop, wool, ranking in value next to the lamb crop. 800,000 to one million pounds of wool will be shorn the next 45 days. This will be the finest wool that this county has

ever produced, regardless of price received. Producers have done an excellent job of cutting out ewes and lambs producing coarse wool the last few years. The average shrinkage should be the lowest ever.

Shearing crews have been trained to pack the flat bag, proper rolling of fleeces, proper tying and sewing of bags. Ranchers supervising in the pens pays dividends, sometimes 2 to 5 cents per pound of wool.

Prepared by your county agent and the horticultural department of A&M college, irrigation farmers will receive in the very near future, the vegetable situation and possibilities of the county becoming a vegetable producing county. This 8-page article in bulletin form will also discuss production costs, harvesting costs, and how and who to contact for market outlets.

Should sufficient acreage be committed in the future, much work is to be done.

Members of the agriculture committee of the chamber of commerce are Jo Ed Hill, Gus Love, Joe M. Christian and W. G. Godwin.

Seven 4-H boys will shear their registered sheep and prepare the fleeces to exhibit in the local, district and San Antonio shows in the near future. This demonstration will be held at the agricultural center, Saturday, April 26th.

John McGregor, Joe Charles Christian, Jimmy O'Harrow, Judge Whitten, Joe Stanford, Ernest K. Nimitz and Charles West will take part in the demonstration.
