At long last it looks like there will be some action on the new Sonora road.

On another page in this issue the State Highway Department is calling for bids for the construction on this job which totals 11.154 miles. The bids will be opened in Austin at 9:00 a. m., on Wednesday, Sept. 17 and publicly read. If there is no delay in letting the contract, it would seem certain that dirt will be turning on this job in October-and continued through the winter. It will take nearly a year to complete.

The job seems to be divided into two lettings-first, from Murchison avenue in Eldorado and south for 4 miles; and second, from that point, and on south to the Sutton county line-which would be 7.154 miles.

According to the opinion of Highway engineers, work would be carried on simultaneously over the entire 11 miles on a job of this kind. The contractors usually bring in enough equipment, they said, to open the entire route in a short time.

Marion Owens and his crew have just about completed the job of fencing the new right-of-way from the county line on up to the city limits.

REYNOLDS ROAD MOVING RAPIDLY

Work on the $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles of Reynolds road has been moving along rapidly and it is likely to be completed before October 16th.

W. L. Barnes, the Austin contractor, moved his equipment here in July and brought in enough bulldozers to grade out the new highway in a short time. The road is now receiving its caliche base, which will be followed by the various other toppings and finally the asphalt black-top. The Highway Department allows no black-top to be applied after October 16, but it is predicted thatthe Austin contractor will have the job completely finished before that deadline date.

PLANS FOR IRAAN ROAD

R. A. McCulloch, resident engineer at Sonora, reports that plans and specifications have been set up in Austin for 10 miles of highway in Crockett county, leading toward Iraan from the present FM33. There will also be an additional 6 miles to be built under the farmto-market program.

There are approximately 29 miles of road to be built in Crockett county in order to close the gap and give Eldorado a direct route to Iraan. The engineer was of the opinion that one-half of it would be started this winter and the remainder, next year.
