Light Voter Turnout In General Election

The usual light turnout of voters was featured in the General Election here Tuesday, since in a one-party state like Texas the November election is considered a mere formality of renaming the candidates who won the Democratic nomination in the summer primaries.

About 360 Schleicher County voters went to the polls and went along with the state in re-electing Price Daniel governor and Ralph Yarborough senator.

Seven of the nine proposed amendments to the state constitution were rejected outright by county voters, and on the state level the first one, calling for annual sessions of the Legislature, was voted down along with one or two others. Returns began to come into Patton Enoch's office shortly after the polls closed at 7:00 p.m. and by 9:00 o'clock all returns had been received.

This was an "off year" in all

states, since there was no Presidential contest.

Funeral Held Saturday For D. C. O. Wilson

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon in St. Mark's Episcopal church in San Antonio for D. C. O. (Ogden) Wilson, 60, who died in his sleep sometime Thursday night in his suite at the St. Anthony hotel.

Mr. Wilson owned the well improved 28,000-acre Coraline ranch near Fort McKavett and made his home there. The ranch was the scene of many Schleicher county field programs over the years.

In addition to the Schleicher ranch, Mr. Wilson also owned a 30,000-acre ranch in Pecos county.

A strong advocate of soil, water and range conservation, Mr. Wilson had rangelands which were proof of his belief in proper care of grazing lands, especially during the recent years of drought in the West Texas area.

A Kimble county native, Mr. Wilson attended Seeleys School, now San Antonio Military Academy. He was a member of the Episcopal church and a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. During World War I, he served as a junior officer of field artillery with the 90th Division.

In addition to his wife, the former Miss Ann Probst of Mason, Mr. Wilson is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Walter C. Pope III of Midland, and a son, Duncan Wilson of Amarillo.

The station has recently been painted in the red and white Magnolia color scheme. The new premises are larger and more modern than the old location.

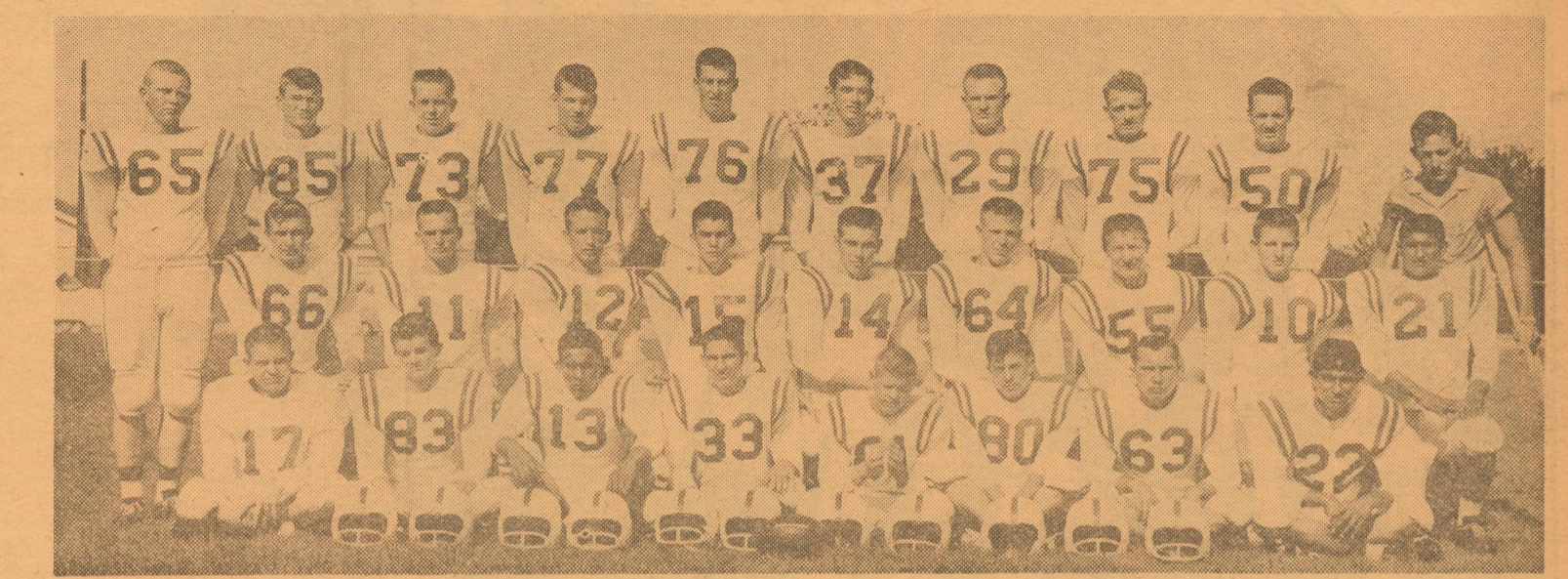
The Senior class will operate Boothe's Magnolia Station all day Saturday.

Eagles Bounce Back Into Dist. Contention With 37-14 Victory

The Eldorado Eagles were back in contention for the District Championship as they defeated Bronte 37 to 14 in their finest offensive display of the season. This win coupled with a 14-14 tie between Robert Lee and Trent, placed the Eagles a half of a game behind Robert Lee.

Lorraine meets Robert Lee in Lorraine tomorrow and the Eagles play host to Hermleigh in the final regular season game of the year.

If the Eagles and Lorraine both win, the two will tie for the district championship and the Eagle would represent the district since they defeated Lorraine 7-6. This all adds up to a very interesting Friday night for the Eagle fans.

The Eagles took charge early in the game with Bronte and were in control the entire game although the score was only 12-0 at the half. Early in the first quarter, fullback Carl Parker raced 21 yards over right tackle for the first score. The points try failed.

After a quarter of good defense by both teams, Farris Nixon dropped back and hit end Robbye Waldron for a total pass and run play of 54 yards for the second score. The half ended with the score 12-0.

In the third quarter, Farris Nixon went over it tackle for 10 yds and Eldorado's third score. The point after was missed leaving

the score 18-0. In the first of a wild fourth quarter, Duwain Sauer knocked the ball loose from Albert Grace, Bronte quarterback and Kyle Donaldson recovered the ball in the end zone for the fourth score. Bronte came back with Albert Grace going around left end for 14 yards for Bronte's first score making the count 24-6.

Eldorado raced back following the kickoff. Dan Mittel ran 43 yds. to Bronte's 15, and on the next play Carl Parker went up the middle for 15 yds. and his second touchdown. Demetrio Bellman kicked the extra point making the score 31-6.

Bronte came back to score for a 26-yard run by Alonzo Robbins. Grace passed to Jerry McCutchen for the two points. Score 31-14. On the second play after the kick-off, Dan Mittel raced 52 yards for Eldorado's sixth touchdown. This wound up the scoring and the Eldorado reserves did a fine job in finishing up the game. The Eagle offense rolled up 398 yards on the ground and 74 yards in the air for a total of 472 yards.

New FM Road Scheduled For This County

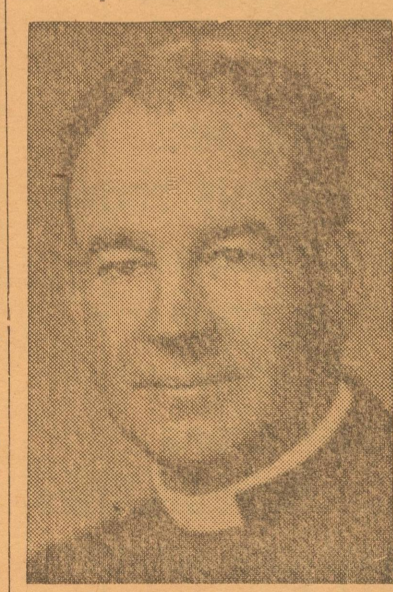
The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year farm-to-market road program for Texas. Marshall Formby, chairman of the Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this 1959 and 1960 program are derived from federal-aid highway funds, matched with state highway funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis. J. A. Snell, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department at San Angelo, has stated that the following farm-to-market road in Schleicher County is scheduled for work under this program:

From State Highway 29, 17 miles east of Eldorado, north a distance of approximately 7 miles.

Mr. Snell stated that the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of providing service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire state.

Schleicher county officials reported this week that the above project has not yet received the approval of the commissioners court, but will be acted upon one way or the other at the regular meeting of the court Monday.

Texas Governor Sets November RIAL Month

Heifer calves sold mainly from \$28 downward. Stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$22 to \$27 and a few stocker cows cashed at \$18 to \$20, and were medium or plain kinds.

Hogs Recover

Hogs were unevenly 25 to 75 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday, mostly 50 cents higher. Sows were steady to 25 cents higher. Choice hogs ranged from \$19 to \$19.50 in most sales, with medium and good butchers from \$17.50 to \$18.50. Some heavies scaling over 280 pounds sold at the top of \$19.50 and reflected the full advance. Sows were reported from \$17 to \$17.25.

Sheep and lambs were steady at Ft Worth Monday. Good to choice slaughter lambs sold from \$21 to \$22.50, the higher figure on some 98-pound woolled lambs and some lambs with No. 2 pelts sold at \$22. Stocker and feeder lambs in the wool sold from \$20 to \$21, and shorn feeders ranged from \$20 downward.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$7 to \$8, and slaughter goats sold at \$8. Slaughter aged bucks sold for \$7. Yearlings and older wethers were scarce.

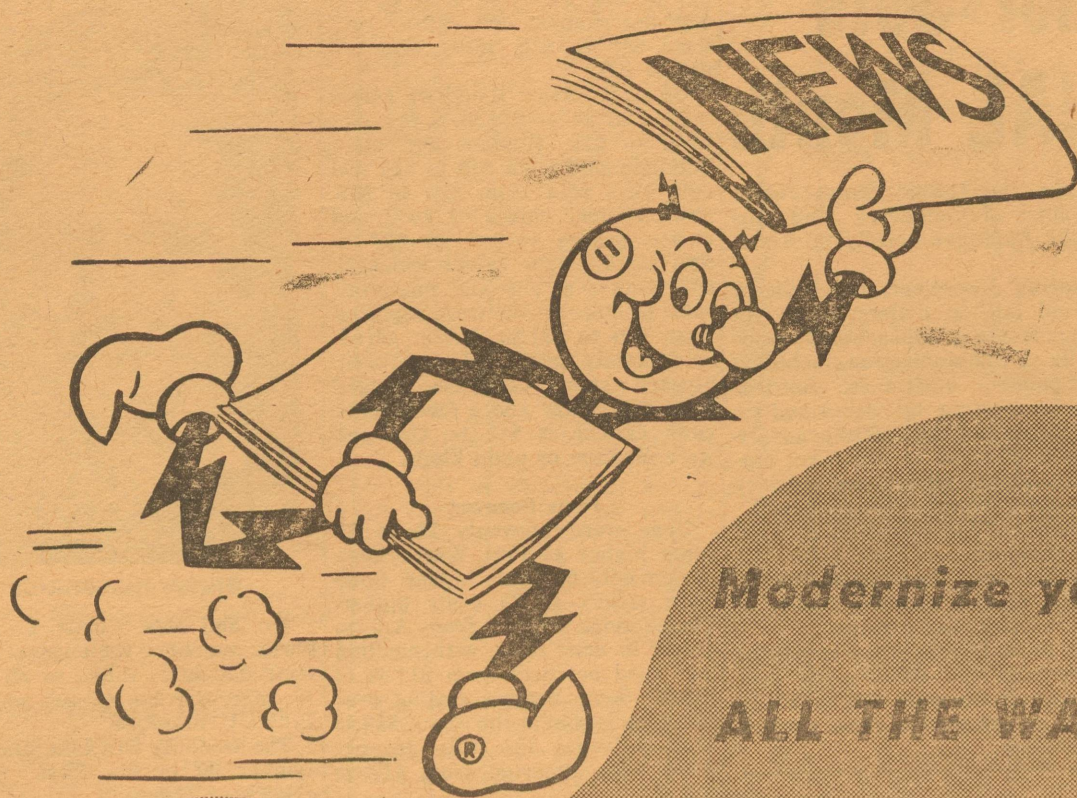

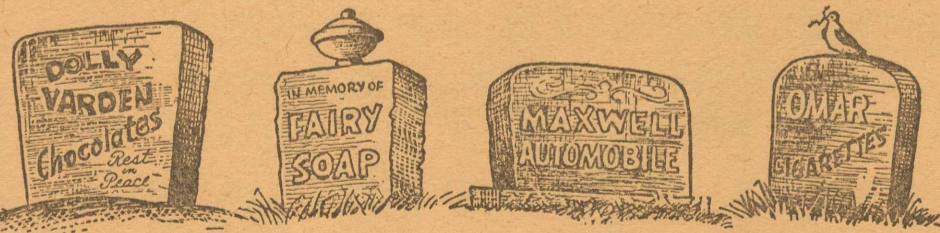

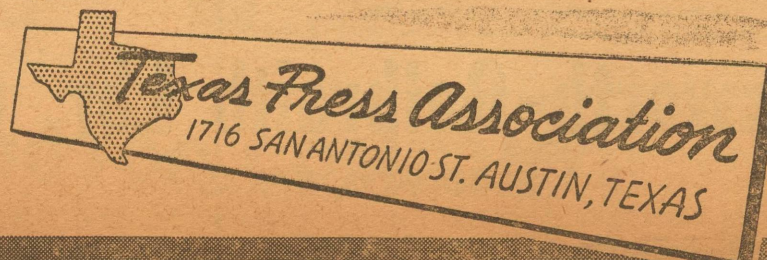

Fire Razed Landmark Building 10 Years Ago

(Ed. note: It was just 10 years ago today, on Saturday, Nov. 6, 1948, that the landmark Robinson store building was razed by fire. The building was a relic from early days, and in its heyday housed one of Eldorado's most thriving businesses.)

(From the Success, Nov 11, 1948)
The largest fire Eldorado has had since the Roy Andrews block burned, occurred early Saturday morning, when the Robinson store building, an old landmark, burned completely down.

The fire was discovered by night watchman Early at about 4:00 a.m. Due to the fact that the structure was built almost entirely of wood, it burned rapidly, making a blaze which was visible many miles away.

The Wiedenmann building at the north, and the garage at the rear of the lots were saved. The burning debris was blown east, and dropped on roofs in the L. M. Hoover, E. H. Topliffe and Bert Page neighborhoods, presenting a fire hazard. Firemen awakened all residents thus threatened, advising them to watch their property.

The fire caused wide-spread damage to telephone service, as it burned telephone wires serving 200 local and rural subscribers and toll lines from San Angelo to Del Rio. The fire occurred in the late hours of the night; by dawn the company had several crews on the job, by 10:00 toll lines were in working order and by 4:00 p.m. the local lines were again operating. A construction crew restored the toll lines to operating condition, and three cable crews worked on the local lines.

The building is one of Eldorado's old landmarks. Built in 1902, when the county was only a year old as an organized unit, it housed one of the most successful general stores in West Texas, operating long after others of that type had closed.

As shown in the above picture, the building had a northern addition which formerly housed the furniture department. On the second floor of the south half of the building, the family had their living quarters.

During the two years Dr. Robinson lived after arriving here, he had his drug store and office at the rear of the ground floor; the rest of the building accommodated the huge stock of feeds, grain, groceries, dry goods, and smaller hardware which the store carried.

At the height of her success Mrs. Robinson employed a number of clerks. She possessed business acumen which was rare in the average woman of her day, and developed business judgment which enabled her to buy wisely and at the right time, to judge the worth of a piece of merchandise and its appeal to the public, and—most important of all—to know when and to whom to give credit, in an age when credit was the mainstay (or the ruination) of the business world.

In 1935 she retired, after outlasting even such similar stores as Vanderstucken's, Sonora.

Until about two years ago she continued to live alone in her large building, moving then to occupy a garage apartment building at the rear of her lots adjoining the Methodist church property. The family have since donated one of these lots to that church (the lot adjoining the parsonage lot).

Two years ago the store building and corner lots were sold to Keno Ogden, and since he bought the property the building has been vacant much of the time.

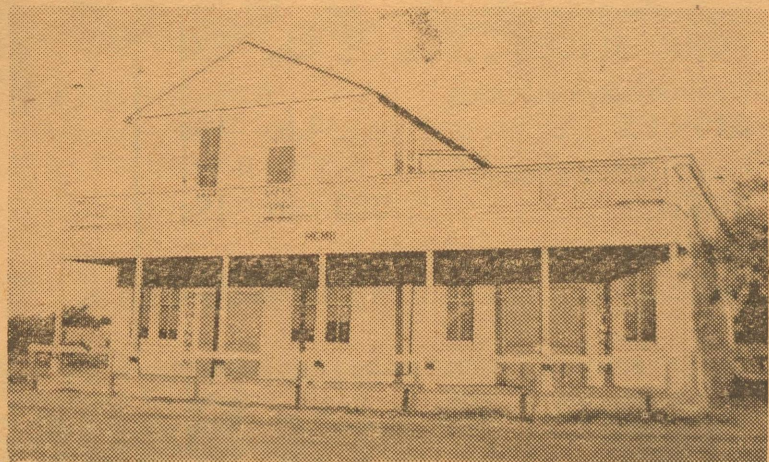
