
Open House Sunday - Exhibition Game Tuesday - To Inaugurate New School Gymnasium

The Wink Wildcats won the flip Saturday night to break a three-way tie and the right to play the Eldorado Eagles in bi-district. The game will be played in Rankin which is half way between the two schools. Neither Wink nor Eldorado were willing to play on the opponent's home field so Rankin was picked to provide a place where the fans from both schools would have an opportunity to attend the game.

This marks the first time the Eagles have been in the state play-offs since 1950. The Eagles will enter the game a two-touchdown or more underdog due to the comparative scores. Wink's offense is centered around their hard-running fullback, Wendall Forga, a speed merchant halfback in Cleve Robinson and a splendid passer in their quarterback Jesse Blackwelder. The Wildcats are not big but are fast and very aggressive. Their pursuit on defense is tremendous. The Eagles will counter this with a well balanced attack, featuring the district's leading scorer in Dan Mittel.

Advance tickets will be on sale at Eldorado Drug Store and the High School office. A few inside-the-field parking spaces will be available. These will have to be purchased in advance. The Eagle fans will occupy the home stands at the Rankin field. A near sell-out crowd is expected. It is generally felt that most of Eldorado will turn out to back the Eagles in their first bi-district attempt in 8 years.

The recent influx of mice must be met with drastic measures. The first step is to take time to make the home, barn and garage as mouse proof as possible. The use of tin or screen wire should be used if at all possible. All openings that cannot be stopped with tin or screen wire—use a caulking material or roofing compound to make mouse proof. Step No. 2: place warfarin baits or other treated baits under the floors.





Home Demonstration Agent's Column

By MRS. VIDA KREKUGW

Thanksgiving day for this year should be a day of true thanksgiving. We have much to be thankful for every year, but this is a special year. Pastures are abundant in grass. Crop yields have been high, cattle and sheep are fat and the market is good. At last the scars of the drouth are beginning to heal. Big trees which were dying for want of water have taken another start. Some people will secretly admit that maybe we don't need much more rain—that is for right now, of course.

If, while reading this, the thought has passed through your mind that you don't have much to be thankful for; ask yourself this question: "How would I feel tomorrow if I were to lose every-thing I have, today?" You have more than you thought you had, don't you?

I, for one, am glad that the tradition of a thanksgiving feast has been so successfully carried on. It's a lot of fun to make preparations for a big family gathering or to even cook one item which may be your contribution to your hostess's dinner. Whatever you are going to do, do it well. Put a little of yourself into the day. A beautifully prepared meal is one thing but a meal prepared with love, imagination and care becomes a creation, a priceless memory.

And talking of turkey let's talk turkey for a few minutes. If the demands on your time are numerous why don't you plan to cook ahead of time and freeze the complete dinner? Or buy frozen foods

for quick preparation? Have you thought of these? Frozen oyster soup; frozen stuffed turkey; giblet gravy; frozen cranberry relish in orange cups; frozen broccoli and corn on the cob; frozen rolls; frozen mincemeat pie with hard sauce; coffee.

At least this may be used as a guide—vary in any way you like. ****

Don't let cooking a turkey throw you. Actually the turkey is the easiest part of the Thanksgiving meal to prepare today. The processors have done the dirty work for the housewife and long, tiring hours have been saved.

How to Roast a Turkey

Thaw a frozen turkey before roasting. (However, if you've purchased one of the Jr. pre-stuffed type, don't thaw; place in oven frozen.) Stuff with favorite stuffing. Truss and tie into shape.

Place breast side up on a rack in an open, low sided pan. Spoon melted shortening, butter or margarine over the bird. Dip a cheese cloth or any thin cloth in melted faat and spread over turkey. Roast Once or twice during roasting time spoon drippings over bird.

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


