

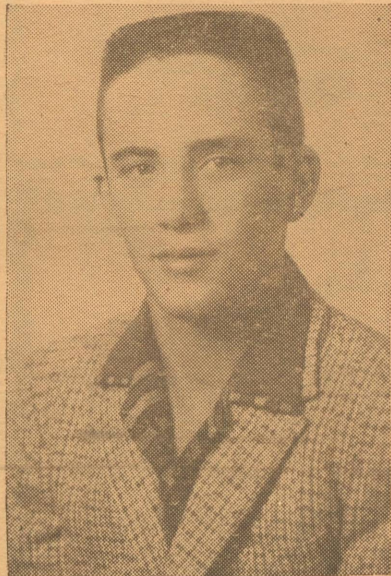

As this year's Seniors of Eldorado High School make plans for their careers following graduation, they can look back on 12 eventful and busy years spent in the local school system. Commencement Vesper Service will be held Sunday night at 8:00 in the school auditorium, and it will be followed Tuesday night by Commencement Exercises, highlighted by presentation of diplomas.

Of the 30 Seniors in this year's class, 18 have plans to go on to college. Three plan to enter trade and business schools. One is married and two others plan this step before long. Five of the young men graduating plan to enter the various branches of the Armed Forces.

### When The Class Started To School

Back in September of 1949, when most of this year's grads were starting to school, the big news was that construction was to start soon on the new school building, for which county voters had approved \$475,000 bond issue the preceding Spring. The fine school plant we have today is the result.

Leslie Baker completed 25 years in the bank. Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Dameron opened a cafe in the Bill Word building. Edgar Spencer brought in the county's first bale.

### On To High School

In the Fall of 1957, the class entered Eldorado High as Freshmen. The preceding summer, A. M. Whitis had succeeded T. E. Holcomb as superintendent and Curtis Humphries came to serve as new elementary principal. Jim Herridge and Earl Barnett arrived to be new coaches for the Eagles. Contract was let to Balfanz Construction Co. of Abilene for building the new high school gym, and construction was started.

Other news of interest included: promoters were pushing an all-weather airport for Eldorado, the county swimming pool closed its first season of operation with Jack Browning and Byrl Clayton as managers, and construction was going on at the site of the new Permian compressor plant in the Reynolds community of western Schleicher co.

### Application By County For Soil Program

A request for Schleicher County to be included in the Great Plains Conservation program has been filed with the State Soil Conservation committee. The application was signed by the local supervisors of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District.

Several discussions were held at different supervisors meetings and a meeting of land owners and operators was held to determine local interest prior to making the application.

An estimate was made that approximately 162 operating units would be in the high and medium priority group as relates to the Great Plains Conservation program.

This program is not a drought or disaster relief program. It is not intended to replace other programs, nor act as a production and adjustment program. It will give long-term assurance of needed financial aid through cost-sharing contracts to carry out a complete soil and water conservation program for the entire farm or ranch.

The practices are based on treating the land according to its needs and capabilities and is designed to supplement other conservation programs rather than replace them.

The program is not intended as an income supplement program but a program which if followed through the years, will result in increased profits. The results of soil, water and plant conservation will become apparent in increased yields and lower production costs.

They approved pledge contract of the First National Bank of Eldorado to protect Schleicher County Rural High School Funds for biennium 1961-63.

The Court ordered A. P. Thigpen paid \$2,308.90 for damages incurred in construction of F.M. Highway 1823 and purchase of 9.32 acres of land to be deeded by Mr. Thigpen to the county. This is in connection with the link of highway being built in Reynolds community.

The Court discharged Dr. M. D. Paul as county health officer, effective May 1.

Twenty-seven Seniors and eight teachers were honored with an ice cream supper at the First Christian church Tuesday night. The serving table carried out the graduation theme with a large cap as centerpiece and small caps lining the edge.

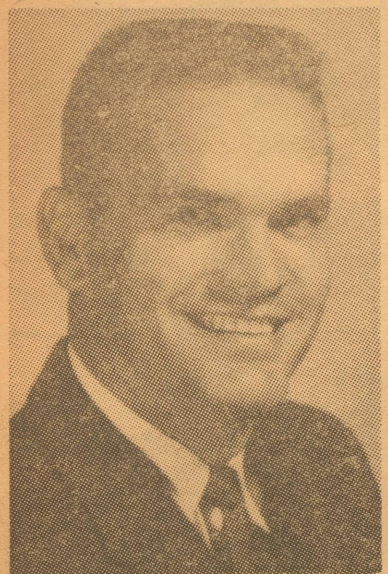

Faculty Sponsors Of This Year's Senior Class

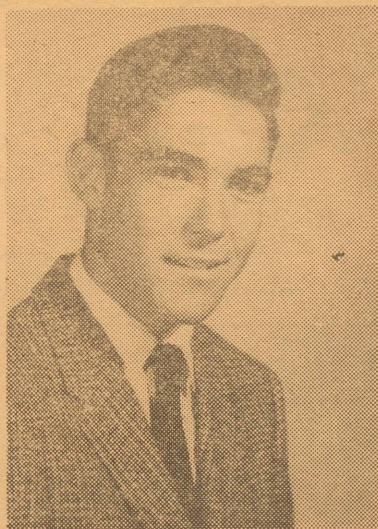

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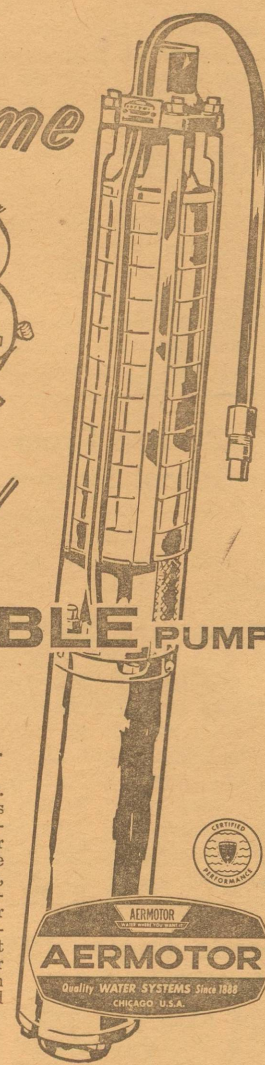

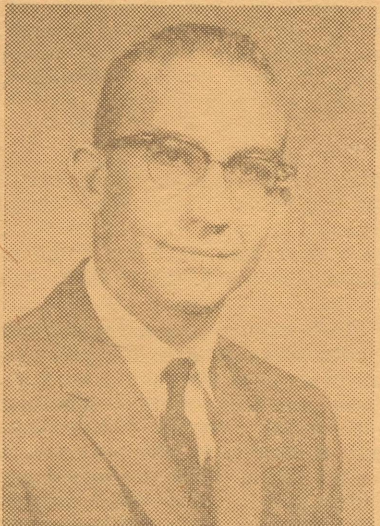
Mrs. Vera Faye Powell Bradshaw

Last week end, about 25 boys who are members of the E club in the high school made their annual fishing trip on Devil's River.

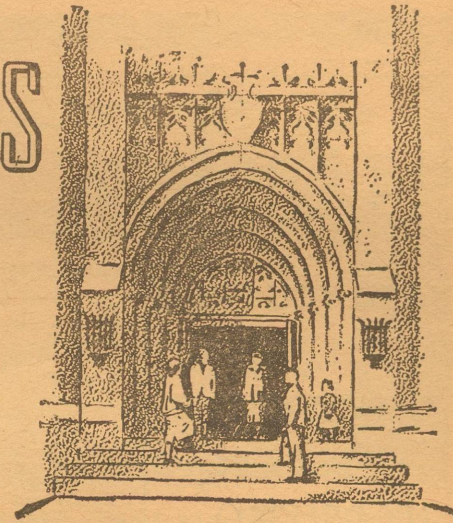

**Feed Grain Program**  
The final date for filing an application to participate in the 1961 Feed Grain Program is May 31st.

Corrected notices have been mailed to all grain sorghum producers that have reported any skip-row pattern in planting and also to all producers whose acreage was reduced below reported average acreage in order for total county grain sorghum history to conform with AMS acreage for the county.

An appeal must be mailed before the county committee can adjust yields and payment rates upward to compensate for the acreage reduction for skip-row planting patterns. No other written proof is required for this type of adjustment. All other appeals require reasonable proof be filed with the committee.

Those receiving these corrected notices have 15 days from the date of notice to appeal their base acres, yield or payment rate if adjustments are needed.  
All livestock must be removed from diverted acreage by May 31.

## A Bishop Looks At Life

By Everett H. Jones, Bishop of The Episcopal Diocese of West Texas

### What to Pray

Sometimes the problem is not that we lack the desire to pray or the need to pray—we have these, but we do not know how or where to begin. We are more tongue-tied in the presence of God than we would be before the Queen of England. This is not God's desire, and such frustration soon disappears with the regular practice of prayer. Nevertheless, what can be said to the person who sincerely wants to pray but cannot find the words to use?

I had this question in mind as I turned the pages of a well-known Christian hymnal. (It is interesting to note that in spite of our manifold denominational differences we sing many of the same historic and soul-satisfying hymns that have come down to us through the ages. We are never more united than we are in the act of singing praise to God.) As I turned these pages, I realized that many a hymn is in the form of a prayer, usually in simple words that express a universal need of the soul. Here, for example, are the words

Class sponsors are Sherwood Barker and Guy Whitaker. Mr. Whitaker auctioned the cakes between acts.

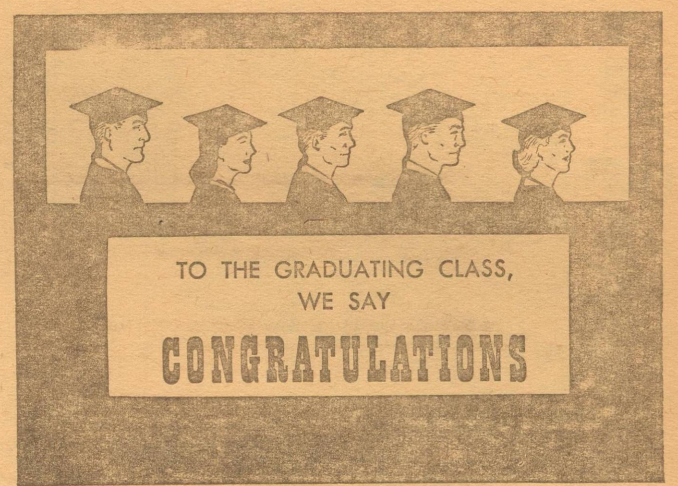
Proceeds from the play will go into the class treasury which will defray expenses of the trip that the classmen will make in May to Galveston.

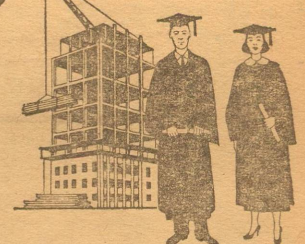

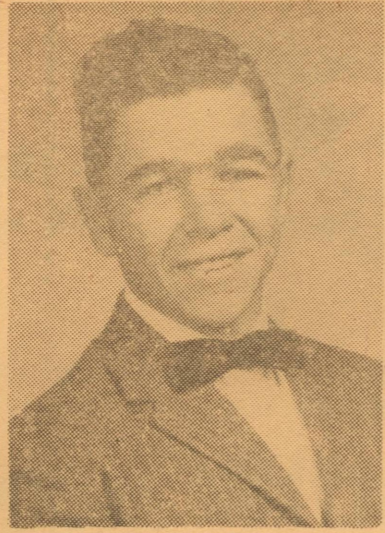

There was a picket fence and a rose trellis. Also a fish pond with fountain on which a multi-colored light shone. There was a moon in the ceiling shining down.

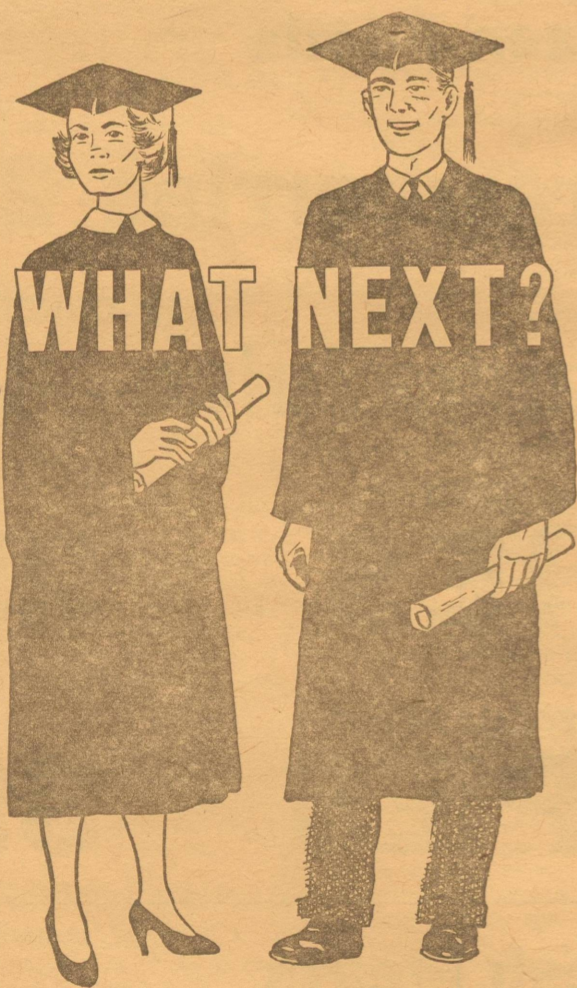
Chuck Taylor from Ozona provided entertainment at the banquet, after which Willie Luedicke and his band played for the prom.
